QCCC is a non-profit club (501-C7) whose members all share a common appreciation and love of America's Sports Car - the Corvette. Dues and donations are not tax deductible. 

Now another "Did You Know".

Corvette styling was substantially upgraded in 1961. Although enthusiasts at the time did not know it, they were being given a sneak peak of things to come. The rear would carry over to 1963, which would be a pivotal year in Corvette history. The "ducktail" design (below) of the 1961 (and '62) would be known as "transitional" years. The exhaust now exited below the body and not via an opening in the bumper as in previous years. The four round tail lights was the start of a Corvette tradition that would continue for more than 50 years.



Other changes for 1961: Body colored headlight bezels began to replace the chrome of 1960. The Corvette style was softened somewhat by the removal of the "teeth" in the grill. Sun visors, an aluminum radiator, parking brake warning lamp, interior lights and the windshield washer were standard equipment. The four speed transmission featured an aluminum case.





The Corvette badging was updated and featured a "V" over the crossed flag. As with previous years, Corvette buyers had a choice of either a hard or soft top. If they wanted both, option 419 was checked and the price went up \$236.75.

Merchandise for new member packets, other items that club might be interested in having available for purchase,



Discussed ways to raise money for the charity fund. Will ask for volunteers for the charity committee.







More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past

In the 70's nestled along East Blvd. was a great Italian restaurant, Riccios, veal and chicken were some of their outstanding dishes. It was a frequent hangout for several QCCC members and on a particular Saturday night Dollar Bill and Shaverstein and their spouses had partaken of a long leisurely meal. They even engaged the table next to them in conversation to a point that they flipped a coin to see which table would pick up both tabs. With Dollar's usual luck, they won so they had eaten and inbibed for free. Leaving the establishment they were headed to Shaverstein's home on Hillside Road with the usual no racing agreement. Of course stop lights resembled the tower at the drags and the rest is history. Joe Willie, a.k.a. Dollar Bill had his 72LT1 a/c (1 of 200 ever built) while Shaver was pedaling a big built rat motor in his 72 roadster. As was sometimes the case, we picked bad places to attempt such foolishness. Heading down Hwy 49 on a Saturday night is not the best place to earn bragging rights. Soon after the throttles were hammered the blue lights of an N.C. State Patrol car signaled an end to the fun. Shaverstein pulled over and as the trooper slowed next to him he motioned to stay put as he lit out after Dollar. Danny says he stayed long enough to hear Dollar go thru all the gears headed toward Buster Boyd Bridge, and then he did a U-turn and headed home to safety. Dollar never got caught that night, but on Wednesday, at the clubhouse we asked where his car was and he told us it was in the garage for a while.

At the time Dollar was living at the hot spot apartments on the east side which almost weekly had social events for the younger set. So Joe Willie decided to attend the gathering and, while standing at the bar, stuck up a conversation with a young fellow and the talk soon turned to cars. In the conversation the young man talked about his 911 Porsche. He told Dollar it was pretty fast and was told, by Dollar, that Corvettes were the way to go. At this time, he offered up that, until the previous Saturday, he did not think the new Corvette was that stout. In his patrol car, he had lit up a new gray coupe on Hwy 49, chased him all the way to the bridge but could not catch up to him.

Dollar's salesman skills came thru and he moved on with a deep inner smile, but we did not see the LT1 coupe for about 6 months. Sometimes it is better to be lucky than good.

All who survived the early days are thankful, probably not deserving, but thankful. How could 27 guys have so many close calls?

Corvette Racing Announces 2012 Driver Pairings

New Driver Alignment to Optimize Performance in Sprint and Endurance Events

A new alignment of drivers will pilot Corvette Racing's new Compuware Corvette C6.R race cars when they make their competition debut at the season-opening 60th Anniversary Mobil 1 Twelve Hours of Sebring. With additional testing following the announcement of the 2012 driver roster, the team has now finalized the lineups for the twin Corvettes.

Jan Magnussen and Antonio Garcia will be full-season drivers in the No. 3 Corvette C6.R, joined by Jordan Taylor as third driver in endurance events (Sebring, Le Mans, and Petit Le Mans). Oliver Gavin and Tommy Milner will co-drive the No. 4 Corvette C6.R, with Richard Westbrook joining them as third driver in the three long-distance races.

"As part of our comprehensive review of Corvette Racing, we considered every element of the program, from the chassis and engine to the driver pairings," said GM Racing Director Mark Kent. "Preseason testing and data analysis suggested that a revised driver alignment could improve the team's overall performance. Certainly physical size is a factor in minimizing the time required for driver changes during pit stops, but we also evaluated the drivers' individual styles and their preferences on chassis setups. With these pairings, we can minimize compromises and maximize driver confidence.

"This new alignment also combines experienced and younger drivers," Kent added. "We expect the veteran drivers to mentor the younger drivers, accelerating the process of learning and development."

This new driver alignment sees Magnussen, 38, return to the No. 3 Corvette C6.R that he drove from March 2007 to August 2010. The Dane will co-drive with Garcia, 31, who moves from the third-driver role he began in 2009 to a full-season campaign in the American Le Mans Series and the 24 Hours of Le Mans. The team's newest member, Jordan Taylor, a 20-year-old from Apopka, Fla., joins Magnussen and Garcia as the third driver in the No. 3 Corvette C6.R.












THIS ONE-TIME HIGH-SCHOOL RIDE IS NOW A RESTORED CRUISER

emember when you were 16? Can you recall what you drove back in those days—or do you want to? Steve Pelchat remembers very well what he drove back then: It's the '60 Corvette you see here.

While a student at Novi (Michigan) High School, Pelchat bought it from its second owner. "That's why I think it didn't get all ragged out," he says from his Charlotte, North Carolina. home. "He bought it from a guy who was a little bit older than him. He said he purchased it in 1964, and I bought it from him in 1970."

That 10-year-old C1 still wore its original

Horizon Blue/Ermine White two-tone paint, and it had its original, numbers-matching 283 under the hood. It wasn't one of the optional 2x4-barrel or fuel-injected ones, but its 230 horsepower at the flywheel was plenty to move the 2,985-pound Vette around.

It also didn't have many factory options, other than a signal-seeking "Wonderbar" AM radio, a Borg-Warner T10 four-speed transmission, and a heater/defroster.

Unlike many young car guys' rides, Pelchat's '60 stayed with him over the years, accompanying him as he relocated from Michigan, eventually settling in North Carolina.

In 1992, he decided that the 32-year-old C1 deserved a restoration, so he began a body-off resto project. "I had it painted, and I had someone rebuild the engine," Pelchat recalls. "But my brother and I put the car back together, hung all the chrome and stainless, and put the interior in it. With Corvettes, you can pretty much buy the kits, and you put it all in."

Like many Corvette restorers, he had a deadline to get the project completed. Unlike many restorers, that deadline didn't involve a show like Corvettes at Carlisle or Bloomington Gold. "My wife and I dated in that car while we were in high school, we both graduated from Novi in '72, and 2002 was going to be our 30-year class reunion," says Pelchat. "So, I was pushing to get it done for that, and we did. We trailered it up to Michigan and drove it to our 30th reunion. It was a pretty big deal, because a few of my buddies knew I still had the car, and they flipped out

when they saw us come driving up in it."

How's this restored first-gen Corvette to drive? Pelchat says it's fun. "It's a way-back machine. The first time we went for a ride in it after it was completed, my wife said, 'I feel like we're 16 again!' and I said, 'Yeah, so do I. Just

don't look in the rearview mirror!"

Like many a C1, Pelchat's '60 rides rougher than a modern-day car does. He's installed Coker's wide-whitewall radials in place of the original-size 6.70-15 bias plies, and he says

signal-seeking radio and a heater/defroster are among the few interior options. 05
Restored stock shifter kept its reverse-lockout toggle. "Salt-and-pepper" coloring was common to all 1960 Chevrolet factory carpets, not just those on Corvettes.



those make a big difference, especially on long trips to shows or club runs.

"I'm in a couple of Corvette clubs here in Charlotte, and we drive the car," he says. "It doesn't sit in the garage. If there's an event, and it's within 100 miles, I'll jump in the car and go." He also takes it to some farther-away events, like Corvettes at Carlisle, which is where contributor Jerry Heasley saw and photographed it.

Pelchat's advice for anyone planning to buy or build a Corvette? Get one you can drive and enjoy. "The one thing I hate is, when people get so tied up with keeping it perfectly original that they're afraid to do anything with it," he says. "I have a buddy who just recently did that. He was so scared to death that he'd do something to it, that he didn't use the car, so he sold it. I don't see doing that.

"I'm enjoying this car, and I have a 27-yearold son, and his name's on the title. When I'm gone, it's his car, and we'll have to find another one for my daughter." VETTE

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
