# The President's Vault

See you all on August 11<sup>th</sup>, all details for the meeting are on the website. Now, here is another story about a first Corvette.

In 1964 John Walton was stationed at Edwards AFB in California. In August of '64, John and Beth had only been married a few months; when John totaled their only car, a 1960 MG Midget. John's two previous cars had been plain Jane cars like the MG (John's words) – a '49 Chevrolet with no heater and a '55 Chevrolet. John had to bum rides to work for the next two months while they waited for the insurance settlement. When they received the check, John was on the hunt for another sports car, but wanted something larger than the MG Midget.

John noticed an ad in the base paper for a '59 Corvette. John and Beth lived off base at the time and, with no car, he asked the Corvette owner to drive the car to their apartment. He arrived at dusk and parked in front of the apartment building. As the owner was showing John the car, he opened the door to see the interior. That's when the courtesy light came on and lit up the interior, and John was sold. He had never owned a car so fancy as to have courtesy lights. Finances would be a little tough; they paid \$1,200 for the Corvette, and John only made about \$2,200 per year in the Air Force.

Now, about the Corvette: It had a base engine 283ci 230HP, 3 speed manual, silver coves, heater, Wonderbar radio and those courtesy lights. The exterior was Tuxedo Black with Inca Silver coves and red interior. It also had the optional hardtop that should have been black, but some past owner had painted it red. This gave the car its nickname, "The Woodpecker". The Corvette would be John and Beth's daily driver for the next 8 years. They rebuilt the engine once and repainted the exterior twice. Before one of the repaints, John decided to change the interior to a tan color. So it was off to Tijuana, because it was so much cheaper than San Diego.

They drove to Tijuana with another couple following in their VW bug. The shop could not complete the Corvette in a day, so they had to leave it overnight, and all four rode back to San Diego in the bug. The next day Beth and their friends didn't want to go back into Mexico and all the customs hassles that went along with it, so they dropped John off at the border and he had to walk to the interior shop. The Corvette looked really good, so he paid them and got ready to leave, when he discovered he didn't have the keys. They were in the VW on their way back to San Diego.

The upholstery shop didn't have any wire but were able to hotwire the Corvette with a coat hanger straight to the distributor, so the car had to have a push to start. John was on the way back to the border when the coat hanger started to heat up. That caused resistance, which caused voltage loss, and the car stalled out in an intersection. He had to wait a couple of minutes for the coat hanger to cool down before it would start again. He saw some 12 year old kids selling their wares on the corner, so he motioned them over to push the car. They started running after him, which made John nervous, since he saw a police car at the next intersection. He had a pocketful of change, so he tossed it out the window, which kept the kids busy. He safely made it across the border, even with the car hotwired. John and Beth sold the '59 Corvette in 1972 for \$600 and used that for a down payment on a new Chevrolet Vega.

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
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




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

### Crossroads

The Corvette was 25 years old in 1978 and the celebration was on. All 1978s featured a commemorative badge (right) on the front nose. A special two tone paint scheme consisting of dark silver on the lower body and light silver above separated by a dark silver stripe was offered. The production quantity was not limited and 15,283 were sold.

1978 was a year of significant changes to the C3 Corvette. A new "fastback" design which made for a smoother silhouette and answered criticisms of limited luggage space; owners now had storage similar to the mid-years Corvette coupes. Also like the mid-years coupes, access to the area was through the seats and inconvenient. A hatchback opening would be available in 1982. A retractable cover provided sun protection and security. One drawback to the new design was that the interior would heat up on sunny days, placing increased demands on the air conditioning.

A new temporary space saving spare tire enabled the installation of a new 24 gallon (previously 17 gallon) fuel tank, increasing the driving range between fill-ups, a previous Corvette complaint.



The interior, which was starting to look dated, was upgraded for 1978. The gauges, while still round, were set in a more squared off area. A glove box replaced the map pockets located in front of the passenger. CB (Citizens Band) radios were a booming fad in 1978 and a AM-FM stereo with CB (RPO UP6; \$638.00 - ouch!) was available. One antenna was called on to provide for the AM-FM and CB functions, so its performance was compromised.



A Corvette paced the Indy 500 race and a special edition paint consisting of light silver on the lower body and black above, separated by a red stripe and special seats marked the occasion. Originally production was to be limited to 300, a nod to the production quantity of the 1953 'vette. But demand increased and soon Chevrolet had a problem: which dealers would be allocated one of these special Corvettes? The problem was solved by producing 6,502 Indianapolis 500 pace car replicas, enough so that each dealer would get one and a few promotional extras.

Despite the fact that a production quantity of 6,502 removes any potential for a "rare" designation, a buying frenzy ensued and the sticker price of \$13,653.21 was often doubled. The Wall Street Journal entered the fray with a prominent article outlining the situation and hints that prices would be higher in the future. The result was that the general public entered the market, making buying decisions that were illogical.

Purchasers who thought that profitability was part of the special edition Corvette ownership were disappointed. This often happens when the public gets interested in collector cars as investments. One problem was the high production quantity of 6,502. The other was that the option was only a badge, paint job and decal exercise. There wasn't a special engine or even suspension in the story, so future enthusiasts passed in favor of Corvettes with something worthwhile to offer.



Above and below are two of the decals commemorating the event that were shipped with all 6,502 replicas, and it was up to the buyer to make the installation decision. The pace car replicas had their own VIN number sequence.



More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past

ONE OF NINE LIVES LOST

This month's story comes from Travis. It would be best told by him, as he is the champion of such tales and could have been the president of the Spit and Whittle club down at McBees gas station on North Davidson Street.

In the late 60's, as the club was in its infancy, Trav was driving a 64 Coupe, 375 hp, 4spd, with air (which he still owns). Before that he was known around the street scene in North Charlotte for his Comet. He soon discovered the Corvette was a little too quiet for his liking and he acquired a set of side pipes. The Meredith's were living on Tipperary off Shamrock Drive where, today, such a car left alone would not last long. Back then QCCC rules requirements for a project like installing side exhaust were a minimum of two cases of beer, one friend to help and one friend to supervise. As usual working on a C-2 project meant at least one stuck bolt, so the clocked ticked on. The job was done at 2 a.m. on a weeknight and, as usual, you must sample your work when done. Now at 2 a.m. 375 hp side-exhaust does draw attention. We will change the friends' names to protect the innocent and appropriately call them Moe and Larry. So as the car sat at idle in the driveway, Moe says let's take her for a spin. Larry climbed in behind the seats while Moe claimed shotgun and somehow a few more brewskies went along for the ride. After circling a few blocks it was apparent to Tray that more throttle meant more good sounds; they were soon joined by the flashing blue lights of one of Charlotte's finest. Officer Fred approached, and shining his light into the back of the car, asked Trav what the heck he thought he was doing. Larry, hearing Officer Fred's voice, said" Fred is that you". Fred lit up Larry's face and said" What are you doing crunched up back there?" Turns out Fred and Larry served in the war together. Officer Fred bellowed" #\$%@#\$, Larry you got me in a spot here, my boss is riding with me tonight, let me see what I can do." After a painfully long delay, Fred returned and lighting up Trav's face said, "Son you get this hotrod home, and I mean straight home, and I don't want to hear it above idle, do you understand me?" Yes Sir, was the reply and Trav says that was the longest 4 block trip of his life. He never knew how Officer Fred saved his hide that night.

Trav still says most of what we did back then would be a felony today. The early days of QCCC were a good time to be young and get all our wildness over with as today it just would not work. So such was the night that Trav burned up one of his nine lives.

Corvette Racing's next event is the Mid-Ohio Sports Car Challenge at the Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course in Lexington, Ohio, on Saturday, August 4. The two-hour, 45-minute Mid-Ohio Sports Car Challenge, the sixth round of the 2012 American Le Mans Series, will start at 1:05 p.m. ET on Saturday, August 4, and will be broadcast on ABC at 2 p.m. ET.

Corvette Racing at Mid-Ohio: Midterm Report and a Rivalry Renewed



2011 Mid-Ohio: Racing in the rain With five races completed and five to go, Corvette Racing will be halfway home at its home track. Saturday's Mid-Ohio Sports Car Challenge at the Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course signals the start of the second half of the 2012 American Le Mans Series. At the season's midpoint, Corvette Racing and Chevrolet stand atop the driver, team, and manufacturer championship standings. The fierce competition that has been the hallmark of the GT category is about to become more intense with the return of one of Corvette's longstanding rivals to ALMS competition.

In the first five races, Corvette Racing scored back-to-back wins with Oliver Gavin and Tommy Milner in the No. 4 Compuware Corvette C6.R in Long Beach and Laguna Seca. Third-place finishes in Sebring and Lime Rock put the pair in the championship lead after the first four rounds. Then a setback in Mosport, combined with the No. 3 Compuware Corvette's fourth runner-up finish in five starts, saw Corvette aces Antonio Garcia and Jan Magnussen take the lead in the championship chase by seven points over their teammates.

In today's Charlotte Observer more of Steve's story is told. He explains how he had the idea to this year include those cancer survivors who are unable to ride bikes by recruiting Queen City Corvette Club to carry them. This allows even more survivors to participate and QCCC to help in this very important cause. Steve said:

"The survivor's lap will be different this year: Some cancer survivors will be cruising the Booty Loop in 16 Corvette convertibles, while those who are able will ride bikes behind them. The Corvettes will be borrowed from the Queen City Corvette Club, which has about 275 members, said Steve Kravitz, who is a member. He came up with the idea. The two-time cancer survivor always dreamed of having a Corvette, and when he beat cancer in 2009, he bought a 1980 red coupe. He had a relapse in 2011, and after a second victory, bought a 2008 black convertible. Kravitz said the club loved his idea. "We're always in parades carrying beauty queens, and I thought, how cool would it be to carry cancer survivors that can't bike?" he said. Jenni Walker, a spokeswoman for the 24 Hours of Booty, said she's excited that all 150 survivors will get to participate. "Seeing that tangible aspect of it is so powerful," Walker said. "It makes me feel so proud to be here in Charlotte and say we have this event."
