QCCC is sanctioned by the National Council of Corvette Clubs (NCCC), which has over 14,000 members in the USA. We are a non-profit club (501-C7) which raises money for and participates with various local children's charities. Dues and donations are not tax deductible. We strive to promote exciting, safe and fun ways to enjoy our Corvettes. We hold business meetings on the second Saturday of each month. Our monthly business meeting usually incorporates a social time afterwards. Our socials are always fun and are focused around food and drink. We've had swimming parties, bar-b-ques, cookouts, day trips and weekend trips. We participate in mountain tours, holiday parades and several homecoming parades at local area high schools. We also participate with several sister Corvette clubs in car shows, drag racing, and autocrossing. After an initiation fee of \$7.00, club dues are only \$8.00 a month, per family, and are to be paid quarterly. These dues go to cover the costs of running the club, mailing newsletters, and substitizing the costs of our meetings. Club officers serve as volunteers. NCCC dues are \$30.00 a year.

To become a member of the QUEEN CITY CORVETTE CLUB, you must own a Corvette and attend at least two (2) monthly business meetings within a six-month time period. Express your wishes for membership during a monthly business meeting, be voted in and begin paying dues.

Stay tuned to this channel – February's gonna be a knock out! Rolex 24, PJ's, Progressive Dinner and tons of fun for all.




Welcome to a New Year with the Queen City Corvette Club.





Minutes from January 14, 2000 QCCC Officers' Meeting

The QCCC Officers' meeting convened on Friday evening, January 14, 2000, at Fred Fischer's office at 7:00 p.m.. All officers were in attendance. Scott Hamilton was also in attendance.

The officers decided to formalize a travel expense reimbursement policy. Although within bylaws limits, it was agreed that club-sponsored travel must be pre-approved by the officers and limited to reimbursement for gas, hotel up to \$90 per night and food up to \$25 per day. Eddie Burt requested a rewording of the allowable expenditures statement in the bylaws to read "up to 30 percent, not to exceed \$500." This will be voted on at the next business meeting. NCCC requirements of the club's VP Competition/Club Governor were reviewed. The Club Governor should attend 3 out of 4 national meetings but may attend by proxy or through an alternate NCCC member. The VP Competition position is currently open and needs to be filled.

Regarding family announcements, it was agreed that sympathy cards would be sent in all situations, and a donation of \$50 for immediate family (parents, siblings and children) would be made. Regarding births, the club will send a card and \$25 gift certificate to Babies-R-Us, along with a mention in the newsletter. Members are requested to call Candy Lake with any news of deaths or births.

In response to a member request, it was decided to continue printing NCCC membership numbers in the quarterly membership directory. It was agreed to support the new Foothills Corvette Club by sending a copy of our bylaws for their use as an example. Foothills Corvette Club is to contact Eddie Burt for any NCCC information they need. Regarding club inventory, it was agreed that nothing under \$25 in value should be inventoried.

John Meadows, Vice President, informed Board that J.R. Gaete would continue maintaining the QCCC website. Costs will be absorbed by CMG, John's company. Emphasis will be on improving the website by making it more dynamic, current and correcting any errors. Jeff Estridge, VP Public Relations, will be in charge of updating the website. Jeff Estridge, reported he was provided 30 car passes for each day of the Spring AutoFair. He emphasized these should be given out only if they are used. It was agreed to encourage members for ideas in club improvement and enjoyment on all fronts. Members are requested to contact the appropriate club officer for assistance and support.

Eddie Burt, Treasurer, received notice that the Parade of Lights is Tuesday, May 23, and that the Knights Stadium autocross is June 17 and June 18 (Father's Day). Eddie has arranged rental of the site.

Nancy Runnion, VP Social, announced that 64 people will attend banquet. There will be live and silent auction, and it was agreed that Jon Elliott will be the emcee and live auctioneer. Nancy reviewed future business meeting locations and received officer approval. Nancy will publish events calendar 6 months in advance and will forward the club calendar to J.R. Gaete for posting on the website. Regarding the Savannah trip, there will be 155 people at the pizza party Friday night. There will also be a catered low country boil and cocktails available.

No new business was discussed. The next officers' meeting will be on February 18 at Nancy Runnion's residence. Meeting adjourned at 10:10 p.m.

Corvette Insurance Survey

How much is enough?

Many thanks to those of you that replied to the Insurance Survey and shared your Corvette car insurance information.

Why the Survey was taken:

Last year Kemper Insurance Co. informed me that they would no longer honor my Corvette insurance with collision. The car is an 89, with no tickets and no accidents. I just pay the insurance and drive; you get the point. I was paying around \$800 per year with a \$250 deductible. Kemper was willing, get this, to maintain the insurance coverage without collision for the same premium! What a deal! I declined and requested that our insurance agent sharpen her pencil.

Coincident with pencil sharpening, I asked Club members to respond to a Corvette Insurance Survey. The Survey results follow.

How did I end up?

My agent moved the Corvette to our home insurance carrier who now will cover the Corvette with collision along with Bonnie's '99 Jeep Cherokee. This company is called Auto-Owners Insurance Co. (our home has been with them since '89) and, compared to the Survey feedback, this company is very competitive. My rate on the Corvette after all of the multi-discounts is \$698 yearly with the \$250 deductible.

Now the Survey results:

Several of the nation's leading insurance companies were represented, which included: State Farm, Allstate, Nationwide, Geico and Auto-Owners Insurance Co. (gee, where's Kemper?)

The majority of respondents are paying \$700 to \$800 for 12-month coverage with typical 100,000/300,000 limits. Deductibles range from \$250 to 500. There were a few that were a little lower and a couple paying over \$1000, but those had different circumstances. It did not appear that the year of the Corvette had any great bearing on the cost, although one member had a young son on the policy of a '99 and the cost increase was greater than 50% higher.

So what does all this mean?

If you're paying in the \$700 to \$800 per year range for your Corvette insurance with a deductible of around \$250 to \$500 with the typical \$100,000/\$300,000 limits, your cost is average, based on the results received. If you're paying more, it may be worth another look!

Travel Tales By Jon Elliott

December 7th, 1941 may be a day that lives in infamy for many, but for me, January 26, 2000 is a date I will never forget. Why? Because I was given the opportunity to visit the Corvette Assembly Plant in Bowling Green, KY, and actually take a part in the final assembly of my new Navy 2000. Here is a brief summation of my "Travel Tale."

The odds were stacked against me to make this trip in the first place. Snow storms and unpredictable winter weather caused flight delays nationwide. I wasn't even sure until Tuesday afternoon that I was going to be able to arrive on the actual day that my car was scheduled to come off of the assembly line.

A personal friend that works with the UAW team in Bowling Green made arrangements for my unique tour. I walked into the plant with all 1,020 UAW workers at 6:00 am. Outside the temperature was a cold and dark 17 degrees (with wind chill –2 degrees). At 6:12 the buzzer sounded and the assembly line began rolling. The first set of QF5 polished wheels that descended from the conveyor belt were for mounting on my car. The Supervisor asked if I would like to have the tire mounting honors and I gladly accepted. At this point, the car begins to descend allowing me to accompany the final stages of the assembly process. I was allowed to help & assist at other stations along the way, including dispersing the first 6.2 gallons of gasoline into the dual tanks, fastening the windshield washer reservoir and connecting the battery terminal. Now it was time to perform the first start of the engine. Unfortunately the first start failed due to an unusually rare defective fuel pump. The UAW team continued with placing the window sticker and other option code labels, and then gave it a final cosmetic inspection. The car proceeded to the re-work area where immediate steps were taken to determine the probable cause of the defective fuel pump problem.

I have a new respect and appreciation for the UAW workers. They were all so friendly and seemed to enjoy their labor-intensive jobs. They have a sincere sense of pride and are extremely quality conscious working on Corvettes. Several folks even autographed their name to the parts on my car that they were responsible for. I received a copy of the build manifest and a Certificate of Appreciation "For assisting in the birth of a new Corvette: VIN # 118572."

I departed the plant at 10:30 and after a brief visit to the National Corvette Museum I headed back to Nashville, TN to catch a plane home. This entire trip was less than 26 hours. Seems like a short time to make so many cherished lifetime memories.



Beech Mountain Chamber of Commerce, 403-A Beech Mountain Plwy., Beech Mountain, NC 28604

The Beech Mountain Chamber of Commerce will be hosting is fifth annual Sports Car Hillclimb on May 19 - 21, 2,000. This Solo I hillclimb, the only one in the south, is conducted by the Central Carolina's Region of the Sports Car Club of America. The course is 1.2 miles and includes 12 hair-pin turns with an elevation rise of 500 feet. The North Carolina Department of Transportation allows the town to close state route 184, which dead-ends here, during this exciting event.
