We are a non-profit club (501-C7) which raises money for and participates with various local children's charities. Dues and donations are not tax deductible. We strive to promote exciting, safe and fun ways to enjoy our Corvettes. We hold business meetings on the second Saturday of each month. Our monthly business meeting usually incorporates a social time afterwards. Our socials are always fun and are focused around food and drink. We've had swimming parties, bar-b-ques, cookouts, day trips and weekend trips. We participate in mountain tours, holiday parades and several homecoming parades at local area high schools. We also participate with several sister Corvette clubs in car shows, drag racing, and autocrossing. After an initiation fee of \$7.00, club dues are only \$8.00 a month, per family, and are to be paid quarterly. These dues go to cover the costs of running the club, mailing newsletters, and subsidizing the costs of our meetings. Club officers serve as volunteers. NCCC dues are \$30.00 a year.

Minutes from March 21, 2000 QCCC Officers' Meeting

The QCCC Officers' meeting convened on Tuesday, evening, March 21, 2000, at Jeff Estridge's residence at 7:00 p.m. All officers were in attendance with the exception of Nancy Runnion. Jon Elliott was also in attendance.

Jon Elliott stated that Johnsonville Packing Co. needs QCCC members to man their trailer for upcoming race events at Lowe's Motor Speedway. Proceeds benefit Speedway Children's Charities. Members are needed May 26 through May 28. Johnsonville made over \$80,000 in contributions last year. Board decided unanimously to participate, to bring up as new business at next business meeting, and for Jon Elliott to be liaison with Johnsonville.

Board discussion of what contribution should be made this year to Speedway Children's Charities. Eddie Burt wants to continue "hands-on" charitable donations. Board agreed that donation will be made to Speedway Children's Charities. Motion made by Fred Fischer to donate \$500 at April club meeting to Speedway Children's Charities and possibly to donate another \$500 at September AutoFair. Board also decided to continue "hands-on" charitable donations to two families in need at Christmas. Charity program will be brought before the membership at April business meeting. Charity committee may be set up. Jon Elliott proposed challenging other car clubs at AutoFair to also donate to Speedway Children's Charities. Jeff Estridge will have announcement made at the speedway.

American LeMans -- John Larner contacted Jon Elliott regarding a pre-race parade lap before the LeMans race on April 1 and wants QCCC to participate. Needs 50-60 cars. Cars are to line up at 12 noon April 1 and will be lined up 2 x 2. Passes to see the race are included for participants. Jon Elliott will handle logistics. Board to call club members to sign up cars for parade lap.

Regarding the Balsam Mountain Inn, 19 of 30 rooms have been reserved. Information regarding the mountain trip will be rerun in the next newsletter. Information regarding departure times for Savannah will also be posted in next newsletter.

Jeff Estridge received letter thanking club for participating in Parade of Lights. Twenty cars participated last year and Jeff expects at least that many cars this year.

Community service books will be sold for \$10 by club members and club keeps \$5. Club returns unsold books. Board agreed to sell books and will place an initial order of 100 books. Possibility books will arrive in time for AutoFair. Jeff Estridge also informed Board that QCCC appears in the Mecklenburg Neighbors section of The Charlotte Observer every two weeks.

John Meadows owns two pace car models worth \$60 apiece. Board will buy two of these cars and raffle them off at AutoFair for \$1 per ticket. John will create the tickets. Proceeds will go to Children's Charities. John also informed Board that points system is coming along fine. Jon Elliott suggested having a points seminar for members who want to know more about the points system John has devised. There is also possibility of raffling off a go-cart, with tickets being sold at September and April AutoFairs.

Eddie will e-mail Board names of all new members. New preprinted sheet will be used to calculate votes at future business meetings. Eddie still has not received quarterly NCCC membership list and needs to receive it.

Discussion of how to work autocross scheduled for June 7. Need to send flyers out to advertise events. Pete Dawley, regional competition director, will be contacted for advice on running autocross in lieu of Jay Freeman's resignation as VP Competition.

Jeff has not yet designed club patches. Jon Elliott will create laminated signs with club logo on them and will be sold for \$5 apiece. Meeting adjourned at 10:00 p.m.


Thursday, March 23

Small Scale Corvettes

It's no secret that one of my hobbies is building and collecting models car kits, primarily Corvettes. So what is it about this collectable Corvette modelmania?

To begin, a little history is in order. Back in the very late 50's and early 60's, model kit manufacturers were producing what was termed annuals, kits for the current production year. Through the next several decades, many varieties and variations of kits were made and Corvette



were no exception. The companies that survived the decades, just like any other corporation, were those that responded to the market trends. SMP and MPC became AMT. Monogram and Revell recently merged to become Revell-Monogram. Aurora, Palmer and Johann went under. Lindburg hung on, but just barely. There are a few producers that hit the scene, but these were the primary players.

Since the late 50's an amazing little world of Corvette model kits emerged. Scale sizes varied between a tiny 1/72 all the way up to 1/8, which is well over 21 inches long! The most popular scale sizes were 1/24 and 1/25 and most recently the scale, adopted as the standard by major manufacturers is 1/25.

The most collectable Corvette models are the annuals and the typical factory stock kits. The most sought after kit is the 1961, mostly because very few were ever made. Of those that were made, two by AMT (#s K911 and K921), are the most desirable. I don't have either of these but, if you ever run across one of them, don't ask questions, just buy it. These kits in poor to moderate condition have a street value approaching \$100. A unit in nice condition with a good box may exceed \$200.00. An un-built kit in excellent condition with an excellent box will exceed \$500. Although this example is unusual, the average value for most other collectibles is between \$15 to perhaps \$150, depending on the car year, release date and kit condition.

What about quality and detail? For the most part the quality of the kits today is very good. Detail is another thing. Most of the kits are just plain wrong and some of the detail is out of proportion. But, this is what it is. I recently built a '62 Roadster for a friend, who just happens to be an expert on sold axle and mid year cars, and although he was very thankful for the model, he immediately pointed out all of the detail mistakes that AMT made for the '62 model car. On the other hand, Revell-Mongram has two versions of the '67 big block car, a Roadster and a Coupe. These two kits are very good, but if you want to build the '67 Roadster with stock Rally wheels, they come from the Coupe kit. Likewise if you want the Coupe to have the Knock Off wheels and the Sidepipes, they come from the Roadster kit. A little marketing plan here? All in all, this is a pretty fun little world to be in, and I am just talking about Corvettes! This little world gets bigger and bigger if you start looking at other cars, like Camaros and Chevelles, which I am presently doing. Does anyone happen to have a '69 / 396 Camaro Coupe model handy?

You must purchase a poker-sheet, however, to enter your car in the trophy winnings. You may participate in the auction and all other events free of charge. Keep in mind that all proceeds go to the National Corvette Museum. Corvette Only! is paying for the event. If your vehicle is in a state of repair, bring a current registration card and a picture of your Corvette, and you may drive the Poker Run in another vehicle (Pre-1962). This only applies to valid Corvette owners; no 4-bangers with coffee-can exhaust tips allowed.
