After an initiation fee of \$7.00, club dues are only \$8.00 a month, per family, and are to be paid quarterly. These dues go to cover the costs of running the club, mailing newsletters, and subsidizing the costs of our meetings. Club officers serve as volunteers.

To become a member of the QUEEN CITY CORVETTE CLUB, you must own a Corvette and attend at least two (2) monthly business meetings within a six-month time period. Express your wishes for membership during a monthly business meeting, be voted in and begin paying dues.



We are still trying to get more information on the Petite Lemans Race at the Lowes' Motor Speedway. We will be sending out more information as soon as we have it.




TECH TIP

How difficult is it to replace the battery on a C4? Not hard. I captured these instructions from the web and had it done very quickly and easily.

-Use a grease pencil to lightly scribe the "gill panel" orientation (saves alignment time during reassembly)

-Remove the 10mm bolt on top at the rear (don't lose the shims that may be there)



-Remove the torx screws that secure the inner fender well to the panel (5 of them, and you'll want to have your tires turned to the left for better tool clearance).

- -If you peer along the lower edge of the panel, towards the rear you'll be able to see another bolt. Use a 10mm open end wrench to loosen it (the panel is slotted, so there's no need to remove the lower bolt). Put some silicone or heavy-duty grease on the slot after disassembly so it will slide back on easily.
- -Remove the battery hold-down (13mm bolt I think...could be 14mm though)
- -Remove the battery cables (5/16)
- -Slide the battery out
- -Reassemble the reverse of above

QCCC Classics

CHARLOTTE, NC - When we think back to the year 1963, we can all agree that this was a year that will be remembered forever in American History. The foremost event being the assassination



of President John F. Kennedy. Other events that obviously had a less significant impact were the arrival of the Beatles (who could forget Beatlemania?), the arrival of the Rolling Stones, still pumping out music after 40 years, the 4 cent postage stamp, and certainly we were all glued to our TV's as French Chef Julia Childs made her debut on educational TV.

1963 also marked the year of possibly the most famous Corvette of all times. The 1963 Split Window Coupe. John and Linda Meadows would agree. They bought their first '63 Split Window Coupe about 25 years ago. The car was Silver with Red Interior and they paid a whopping \$1,300 for it! That car was sold but never forgotten.

About 8 years ago John and Linda started the search to obtain another '63 Split Window Coupe and it took 3 years to find it. In 1996 they purchased another '63 Coupe but this one according to John was in terrible shape, it didn't run, it was painted the wrong color and it basically needed everything. The good news was it was an all numbers matching original Silver colored car with Power Steering, Power Brakes and Power windows. So let the work begin. Restoration on this car began and the car was completely dismantled. The next 4 years saw this car go from totally dismantled to totally restored. John and Linda's '63 Split Window Coupe is the result of a 4 year full ground up restoration project.

The restoration of this car was completed 3 days before the Spring 2000 Autofair. John told me that they started the car for the first time on the Wednesday night before the Saturday event. He put 2 or 3 gallons of gas in the car and drove it around town a little bit before bringing the car up to Autofair in his trailer. The good news is John won the award for the best Corvette in the QCCC display but the bad news is he had to forfeit the award because he couldn't drive the car to the display area, it was out of gas! I'm thinking he should have budgeted some gas money as part of the restoration!

Asking John about the project, 'Would you do it again?" **No**, was the rapid reply. The long-term plan for this car is that it will be passed down to John and Linda's grandson, Jayden, who at a year and a half old is most likely very anxious to get behind the wheel.

There were only 10,954 Coupes built in 1963, and the base sticker price was \$4,257. Only 3,516 '63 Vettes were Sebring Silver, and that was an \$80 option. Boy, times have changed!

"To memorialize the valor, fidelity, and sacrifices of the Allied Forces on D-Day, June 6, 1944"

Do you ever think what your life would have been like if you had been born in another time? If many of us had been born one generation earlier, we could have been one of those men who had to go ashore at Normandy on June 6, 1944. How would we have handled it? If you've ever watched "Saving Private Ryan" you get a small sample of the terror they must have faced. During the week of July 4, I went to Bedford, VA to visit the D-Day memorial dedicated there on June 6, 2001. Bedford is a small, picturesque town in the Blue Ridge Mountains, about midways between Lynchburg and Roanoke, VA, on highway 221.

If you know the history of the invasion of Europe by the Allied forces in World War II, then you might know that the town of Bedford, VA, lost more men per capita during the assault than any other place in the United States. 35 men from the small town of Bedford were sent onto the beach during the first wave and 19 were killed within the first 15 minutes and 2 more died shortly thereafter from wounds sustained during the invasion. 21 out of 35! That is a staggering loss for a community of 3,200 people. In 1948 the graduating class at Bedford High School was only 19. Can you imagine if your community suddenly lost the equivalent of a graduating class?

As we all know, many books have been written about that generation who was asked to invade a foreign land and face almost sure death in the name of freedom. Those of you my age, that generation would be our parents, those younger, that would be your grandparents. What these men from Bedford, and other small towns throughout America, did, deserve our undying gratitude. They lived through a depression, we can't imagine how difficult that was, and then they were asked to sacrifice years of their lives to liberate the world of horrific acts done by the Germans and Japanese.

I've often asked myself whether my generation, and particularly me, could have endured those unselfish sacrifices, remembering, that like those brave soldiers from Bedford, some gave the ultimate price, they *gave all*. They make me, as it should you, proud to be an American.
