

Nancy, your decision to proceed rain or shine was the right one. Thank you for making such a super fun day. You could have never planned a better trip or one that drew more belly laughs.


Those of you who either cancelled at the last minute or decided not to go in the first place ... well as usual with this Club, you missed a wonderful day.

WARNING: READ IF YOU'RE USING STEEL WOOL TO CLEAN YOUR WINDSHIELD!!

I tried using 0000 steel wool on my Suburban and it seemed to work great. It very easily removed all of those dried on bugs, etc. I've used it on my Corvette. Well, while driving my Suburban into the very bright setting sun this week I noticed long fine scratches in the glass that ran in the direction of the wiping motion I used. These scratches were not visible in normal daylight. *I would not recommend using steel wool to clean automotive glass*.

We would like to make you familiar with some of the modern technology the club uses to make life a little easier. When we go on caravans, which is frequently, we use the Family Channel Radios to communicate between cars. It isn't required equipment, but having one makes life a lot more fun and enjoyable on the road, kinda like a CD player. These radios have a range of about



2 miles and can be purchased at WalMart, Circuit City or like stores. A pair of these radios cost around \$50-\$100, depending on brand. The caravan leader will tell everyone which channel to monitor on the trip, usually it is channel 7.

We have found that holding the radio about 6 inches from the mouth when speaking makes the message easily understood, otherwise it sounds garbled and confusing. Be sure and speak clearly and distinctively so we can all understand what you are saying. Some of us from Tennessee have been told that all of our lives, so we're used to hearing "Huh? What did you say?"

Caravanning Procedures and Etiquette

As y'all know, we spend a good deal of our time on trips in caravans and we all sometimes wonder if everyone is on the same page. In an effort to assist our members in making caravanning a pleasant event, here are some tips:

- Bring all the appropriate items you'll need for the trip: Radio, camera, maps, sunglasses, sunblock, jackets, caps and any other items you think you'll need.
- Be on time. Give yourself sufficient time to get to the appointed place and time to meet and greet so as not to hold up the group.
- Show up at the start with a full tank of fuel. Don't make the other participants wait on someone's lack of preparation.
- Same goes for the bladder, only empty it.
- Keep up with the leader. It is their responsibility to maintain a safe, appropriate pace suitable to meet the schedule. Attempt to maintain a 2 second interval between you and the car in front. This minimizes the "rubberbanding" for those in the back.
- Pay attention to what is happening in front of you. A 2 second interval is only 176 feet at 60 MPH, so keep an eye on the car in front.
- Don't push the car in front of you. Leave a cushion, no one wants a car right on their bumper, it's unsafe and discourteous.
- When a traffic light or stop sign is encountered, don't push to make the yellow light or do a "slow and go" at a stop sign. Radio those in front that you are delayed, they will slow the pace. **Obey the law and use commonsense,** don't ruin a perfectly good day by being part of an avoidable crash.
- On divided highways, keep the left lane clear unless you're passing. Let's not alienate other people with a "bunch of 'Vettes" that tie up traffic.

....and remember, wave at other Corvettes.
