A motion was made, seconded, and approved to amend the August meeting minutes to read: ... "A motion was made, seconded, and tabled to make a donation to the National Corvette Museum (NCM). It was then stated that the NCM would be added to the list of charities the Charity Committee will consider."

- Asked *Dave Gregorino* to share his & *Jane*'s adventures on the NCM's Historic Motorama from Flint, MI to Bowling Green, KY in their 1967 along with 49 other Corvettes. Dave has a photo album to share, and a cap with significant autographs to view.
- Asked Vanessa Krimminger to share her & Robert's impressions of the Corvettes at Carlisle Show – "Overwhelming"
- Told us about the fantastic tour of the Pittsburgh Plate Glass factory arranged by Boyd Kurt.
- Has information on dual cup holders for C5s no drilling necessary.
- At the next meeting, nominations will be taken for the 2003 Officers. Elections will be held in November.

Robert Morgan, Automotive Events Director & Charity Committee Chairman reported:

6 of the 7 Charity Committee members met tonight to discuss where donations should be made. There is \$950 in the account with another \$500 coming from the City Chevrolet Car Show and possibly another car show later this year. We need to keep \$300 in the account for food for our Christmas families. Charities being considered (suggested by QCCC members) are: NCM, Hospice, Speedway Children's Charities, Loaves & Fishes, Thompson Children's Home, NC Wildlife Endowment, Disaster Relief of NC, MedAssist, & Spinal Bifida. A vote is needed tonight on a donation to the NCM since funds are needed by October 31 to assist in a land purchase. Dave Gregorino described the NCM's purpose and activities. Also discussed: (1) if not enough funds are donated, the Museum will have to borrow the balance to buy the land, (2) charities are not mentioned in the Purpose section of the QCCC Bylaws, so we are not obligated to make donations, (3) donations to the NCM can be made from the Charity Account and/or the General Fund. (4) a discrepancy in the Charity Account on the Treasurer's Report appears to be a donation made to the Stars & Stripes Caravan - Gary Artis, Treasurer will be notified. Motions were made, seconded, and approved to donate \$500 from the Charity Account, and \$500 from the General Fund to the National Corvette Museum to assist in their land purchase.

Speaking of charity causes, over the past month a charity committee has been formed from 6 members requesting to be part of the decision on who should receive monies from our charity fund. The committee met before the last club meeting to discuss suggestions sent to me in regards of possible charities to consider. The charity committee will continue to meet between now and the end of the year to discuss other needy charities that have been suggested. Thanks for everyone's help!






Quad exhausts, aligned at different angles for more thrust

PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME ENSHRINEMENT CEREMONIES AUGUST 3, 2002

For the second time, I participated in the Pro Football Hall of Fame parade and induction ceremonies in Canton, Ohio. Football is my favorite sport and rubbing elbows with the elite players of the game is quite a thrill for me. Last year I was not prepared for what was to happen, but this year I was fully prepared and looking forward to meeting some of my heroes.

Kay and I left Charlotte on Friday and traveled to Belpre, Ohio to the home of Dee and Connie Rader. Dee had gotten me my initial invitation last year to participate in the parade and festivities for the enshrinement ceremonies, and I requested a return trip. My request was granted and the day was finally here. We had to be in Canton by 6:30 am on Saturday, which means we had to leave by 4 am. I wasn't sure how much sleep I was going to get, but that didn't matter. I was about to meet some of my heroes, and to see the best the NFL had to offer. We traveled along a 2½-mile parade route with security on both sides of the car and 225,000 screaming fans along the route. It was the crowning moment of the day. This parade was over 2 ½ hours long and I loved every minute of it. It included several large floats, huge balloon figures, and several marching bands. It was truly a magnificent sight to see. After the parade, they herded all the corvettes with the players into a separate and secure parking lot. We were helped out of our vehicles, offered drinks and snacks, and a chance for a "potty break". After a brief rest, we took our Hall of Fame riders to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. When they saw us coming, the barriers and crowds parted like the Red Sea as we drove up to the front door. Our riders were whisked away and I was once again just a commoner and told to drive back out again. I went back to pick up Dee and we headed back to the Hall of Fame for the enshrinement ceremonies. Parking was at a premium and the local neighborhood was offering parking on their lawns for a fee. Dee and I found the same nice lady who owned the lot where we parked the car last year and she even remembered us. 

DOING THE HEEL & TOE (AND A DO-SI-DO) IN TROUTMAN, NC!

As told by Billy Bob Bigblock and translated by your newsletter staff



TROUTMAN, NC - Contrary to popular belief, it really isn't a new line dance. Although, I know some who say moving your feet, correctly, between 3 pedals is much more difficult than any dance. Let's discuss some of the secrets of "Heel and Toe."

The first secret is that it is only used on manual shift vehicles. Automatics only have 2 pedals, so this maneuver isn't needed in those cars.

The second secret is that it is only necessary for downshifting. The balance of the car is so critical during high-speed maneuvering that heel and toe downshifting is essential because, when done properly, it allows the balance to be maintained while slowing quickly, turning and then allowing maximum acceleration out of the turn.


"By definition, when you downshift, you are braking - usually hard. When you snatch the rear tires while braking hard, the car snaps into oversteer." (Because the heel & toe wasn't done smoothly.) "This is not what you want in a braking area. You must "blip" the throttle for every downshift. Until you learn to downshift properly" (heel and toe) "and consistently, there is no way that you can use your brakes to their maximum potential" when slowing for a turn.

The purpose of downshifting is to select the proper gear for the forthcoming corner, and, sometimes, to stabilize the car – not to slow the car."1

"Downshifting is difficult because it has to be coordinated with braking and, simultaneously, you have to rev the engine so the car doesn't become unbalanced by a sudden change in engine

speed. The time for the downshift is while braking before a turn. You will want to come out of the turn in the lower gear, ready for acceleration. Since you may be accelerating as early as the turn in, you have to get in the lower gear before you enter the turn.

The engine must be revved up so, when you let the clutch out, the rear tires won't have to do the work of getting the engine up to the speed that matches how fast the rear wheels are turning. The tires already have

their plate full, trying to cope with the aggressive braking you are doing and you don't want to make them undertake the extra work of revving up the engine." (Remember, we covered the available traction in the Traction Budget in an earlier edition of *The Club's Monthly Croaker*.)

So, you ask, how in the devil are we supposed to "get that throttle tapped for an instant to get the

revs up" and still smoothly brake the car? We only have two feet, one on the brake and the other on the clutch... Hell, I ain't got no more feet to "tap" the throttle, Mr. Know-it-all! Well, read on my precious little 'Vette dudes and dudettes, Uncle Billy Bob is here to help.

Heel and toe shifting "is the method in which the left foot depresses the clutch and the right foot operates the brake **and** the throttle. The throttle must be depressed to get the engine speed up to match the revs required at the current car speed in the newly selected gear.

The approach is to use the ball of the right foot on the right side of the brake pedal" (**d. in diagram on prior page**) "and then rotate the foot over to the right, allowing the right edge of the right foot to depress the throttle briefly. The right foot is actually placed so the ball of the foot is on the brake pedal and the right side of the foot is over the throttle pedal, but not yet touching the throttle. Then, when you need to blip the throttle, a rotation (or rolling over) of the foot will blip the throttle while allowing you to maintain pressure on the brake pedal. The foot doesn't move from side to side, only the *right side* of the foot moves up and down as needed." ²

You, too, can do this. I practice it each time I drive my car. The transition from one gear to the next lower gear should feel seamless and be noticeable only by the sound of the "blip." If you can feel the shift, i.e. the engine slowing the car down with a jerk, then the shift hasn't been done correctly. If you can feel it, rest assured the car will feel it, also, and it will react accordingly, probably with "tail lights first off of the asphalt." Remember, smooth is good, smooth is your friend, and smooth makes speed.

Tune in again next time when we visit with the Bigblock's, as they have a family gathering to discuss "Identifying Gourmet Road-Kill while traveling 75 MPH" and, later, a symposium on "ABS Braking" and what it means to your tax return. 'Til then, remember, "Only a fool learns exclusively for his own experience." - Bismark.


