



Here is what Elvira, a world famous palmist and seer here in downtown Troutman, saw in her crystal ball after a couple of Miller Lites (We'll check back next month and see how accurate she was):

According to GM, the vehicle wears a carbon fiber hood, marking the first use of carbon fiber as a painted exterior panel on a vehicle produced in North America.

The new hood weighs 20.5 pounds, 10.6 pounds lighter than the standard piece. The 5.7-liter V8 remains untouched, but Corvette engineers spent

considerable time revising the Z06's shock damping, with much development done at the Nurburgring. The revised suspension will appear on all 2004 Z06s, but the hood will not. Commemorative Edition base coupes and convertibles will also be available, but with cosmetic changes only.

Due to production issues surrounding the carbon fiber hood, Chevrolet is still working out how many Commemorative Z06s will be made, estimating the figure to be "a couple thousand." The company will tack on a \$3,000-to-\$5,000 price hike over the standard Z06 when the car goes on sale in August—by which time Chevy hopes to have another Le Mans victory under its belt.

<u>TECH TIP</u>

Pssst! Your Wife/Girlfriend Has Been Lying To You,

Size Does Matter!

Remember the old saying, "There's no replacement for displacement!" It's true, "the more displacement, the more power. However, tuning issues associated with bore and stroke definitely influence the type of power a given displacement can give. Large bore, short stoke design (oversquare) tend to be good breathers because larger intake and exhaust valves fit in the bore, and less valve area is shrouded by the cylinder walls. The short stroke supports higher rpm because the piston doesn't have to travel as far per stroke, and longer connecting rods are easier to package into such an engine by the designer without having overall engine height grow clumsily high. Long rods slow piston acceleration at the top and bottom of each stroke, which allows higher rpm before critical stresses are reached. Thus, oversquare engines are associated with sporty, higher-revving applications.

"Long-stroke, small-bore engines (undersquare) keep the engine from growing overly long because the cylinders are that much closer together. Furthermore, when trying to package truly large displacement, it's also normally easier to add stroke (height) than bore (length). That's because a half-inch of stroke means just a half-inch of increased engine height, while a half-inch larger bore is multiplied by the number of cylinders in each bank of cylinders. Thus, engine length grows faster than engine height when adding displacement. Long engine lengths can be difficult as crankshaft rigidity can be an issue, plus engine weight grows, especially if more and smaller cylinders are added.

"Smaller bores can be a hindrance to breathing, so typically long-stroke designs favor lower rpm. In practice, we've come to associate such undersquare designs with lower rpm, larger displacement, higher torque applications."

As you've just read, whether it's oversquare or undersquare, more power is developed in bigger engines. There's *no replacement for displacement*. So, regardless of what your wife/girlfriend

has told you, **SIZE** does matter.

We hope you paid attention to the details of this article because we will have a pop quiz at the next meeting.

Once the PWC is afloat and the SUV is half filled with water, drive the SUV back onto the ramp. It helps to have someone stand on the walkway and point toward shore.



If at any point the SUV starts to disappear from view, you may be fairly certain that the operation is not going as planned. However, this is a viable alternative to crowded parking conditions at most ramps.



With your craft safely launched and engine revved, you're now ready for a great day on the lake.




Due to the high risk of danger to women in secluded parking



A CHEMIST'S VIEW ON OCTANE

BLENDING COMPONENTS VS. ADDITIVES:

MTBE (methyl tertiary butyl ether) and ethanol are blending components, not additives. However, you'll see them called additives in many places by many people. Blending components are part of base gasoline. The simplest differentiation between an additive and a blending component is that the former are added in ppm (parts-per-million) levels; whereas, the latter are added in percentage quantities.

BRAND OF GASOLINE:

Some of you probably know this; others may be shocked by it. Oil companies swap base gasoline all the time. Let's say I have a refinery in Houston and you have one in Dallas. It makes little sense for me to truck my Houston gasoline to Dallas and for you to truck your gasoline from Dallas to Houston when gasoline is a commodity product. So, I let you draw 100,000 gallons of base gasoline from my storage tank in Houston for your Houston gas stations, and you let me draw 100,000 gallons of base gasoline from your Dallas holding tanks for my Dallas gas stations. That way, we both save on shipping. Yup, Texaco gasoline may have come from a Shell refinery and vice-versa. At a gasoline terminal you may see trucks from up to six different companies all loading at the SAME terminal (that for example may be supplied exclusively by Shell). What comes next, however, is what makes Texaco Texaco and Shell Shell. *Additives!!* Each company has its own additive package and adds it to the base gasoline. So while the base gasoline may be the same, the additive is different, and hence the brand of gasoline you use is different because of the additive, not the base gasoline.

WHICH ADDITIVE IS BETTER?:

Given the above discourse, it's obvious that we all want the gasoline with the best additive. Unfortunately, it's not that simple. Additives respond differently in different base gasolines (even of the same grade). Also, some additives work better with gasolines used in a carbureted car vs. one that uses fuel injection. On a practical level, additives are going to be developed today for today's cars -- meaning fuel injected cars. For Corvette owners who have carbureted Vettes (like me), this is unfortunate. Carbureted engines leave a LOT more deposits behind than fuel injected cars. From a regulatory standpoint, California was the first to call for all gasolines to pass the BMW test (port-fuel-injected engine) in all grades of gasoline. Like all regulations, this one had various massages put to it, but the net effect was that all oil companies went to work developing additives that are a LOT better today than 10 years ago AND they are used in all grades (not just premium -- hence the argument to use premium to get a better additive went out the window).

No more phone calls, we have a winner!!!!


