

In October we have the Beach Trip-10th-12th, Petit Lemans at Road Atlanta-18th and the Car Show at City Chevrolet-25th.



National Corvette Caravan/50th Nashville Celebration 50th Anniversary Block Party

Where do I start? I guess at the beginning would be proper. On Wednesday morning about 62 of us met at DEI for a private back shop tour and luncheon in the Trophy Room. I'm not going to give you any details about the 1-1/2 hour in depth tour and excellent lunch we had. Walt and his Corvettes in the Queen City committee need y'all to sign up for the September event that will include a tour of DEI and I don't want to take away from that event. On to Dale Earnhardt Chevrolet in Newton Wednesday night for a catered BBQ dinner with live music. What great food and great music.

Thursday morning we all met at Dale Earnhardt Chevrolet and had a police escort to I-40. On to

Asheville where we picked up some more Corvettes led by Donna Littlejohn (she has recovered fully from her broken back) from SC and on to Knoxville where we met up with the Mid-Atlantic Caravan. Sue and I took Friday afternoon to walk the waterfront. Nashville is on the Cumberland River with the city on east side and the NFL stadium, which Chevrolet had rented for the weekend, on the west side. In the river was a floating stage that faced a terraced lawn. Friday night started off with a parade from the stadium to downtown including 50 Corvettes, one of each year starting with 1953 along with marching bands and the marching Elvis' passed by. Once the parade ended we all walked to the riverfront where local musicians performed Motown hits. Then yellow Corvette convertibles drove up to the stage. Each one of the Corvettes was carrying one of the Temptations who were dressed in yellow suits. It was quite an entrance. The crowd enjoyed their music and their dancing as the Goodyear Blimp flew overhead flashing Happy Birthday Corvette. The paddle wheel riverboat, Jackson, cruised up the river behind the stage and shined its spotlight on the crowd. What an evening!

Saturday morning we were off to the car displays and events at the Coliseum (NFL Stadium). There was too much on display to list everything, but I must mention that John and Linda Meadows were there with their 1ST Love, their 1963 silver coupe. We headed back to the hotel to rest and get ready for the Saturday night concert. Thirteen of us met for dinner and then we headed to the concert. I believe everyone enjoyed the Temptations. I know everyone didn't enjoy ZZ Top. People started to leave during the first few songs and continued until those of us that were enjoying the concert were all able to move much closer to the stage. Again, the Goodyear Blimp flew overhead. We stayed to the end and rode the bus (Chevrolet provided buses to and from the events and hotels to all participants) back to the hotel with several QCCC club members. We walked across the street to Long Horn for last call and then to our rooms for the night.

Sunday morning it is off to Bowling Green for the Jubilee Road Tour and Baseball, Hot Dogs, Apple Pie and Corvette Block Party. For those of you that don't know, Sue and I sure didn't, we have quite a singer in our club. To start off the celebration Sunday night, **Bruce Goodrich** sang God Bless America. Bruce, what a great voice you have and what an excellent job you did with the arrangement. Bruce was also in charge of arranging for the musicians that performed on stage that evening.

During the festivities, the Museum officially announced and kicked off their building campaign. They are going to double the size of the museum. NCM Lifetime Member Bob Patrella announced that he would personally match all funds donated to the building fund Sunday evening. The leader from the Australian Corvette contingent took the shirt off his back and auctioned it off for \$1,500. In all, the crowd donated \$85,000 that evening and Monday morning at the 50th Birthday Cake cutting in front of the museum, Bob Patrella handed a personal check for \$85,000 to Wendell Strode. In all \$170,000 was raised. They estimate the building addition will cost \$6,000,000.

Monday we headed back to the museum to, among other things, sing Happy Birthday to the Corvette. (Our son is convinced that we all belong to a cult!) On the way to the museum we pass a bright yellow boat being pulled on I-65. What name do we see on the stern but EZ II SEA. We pull in front of the tow vehicle when the driver sees our Corvette's tag, EZ2C and he gives us a thumb's up.

We had a great trip and enjoyed spending time with some of our club's newer members. We have met many wonderful people in our club and made many friends. I had planned this trip since before it was officially announced. Our Caravan registration numbers were 24 & 25 out of 11,000. But some joined in at the last minute. P.S. I learned from a friend on the museum board that something special is going to be introduced or announced at the museum during Birthday Bash in April 2004. 

FAQs – Part II

Is gasoline dyed?

Many, many years ago it was. I'm not aware of any gas being dyed now. (Anybody remember Purple Martin high octane from the 60s? It looked like grape Kool Aid and was quite a marketing gimmick)

What gives gasoline color?

Many different things. Some bad, like PNAs (polynuclear aromatics), some not so bad. A lot of companies add anti-oxidants to keep down gum formation and that also helps color. However, a lot of gas stations are re-filled daily, so storage time isn't a problem. Premium is generally less colored due to how it's made (little or no PNAs, etc). Regular and midgrade are made from many things and generally have some color. I'd be concerned with any gas that was bright yellow or premium that was anything other than white or faintly yellow.

What about fuel injector additives?

Give the money to charity where it'll do some good; your fuel injectors will never know the difference. Other than a narrow window in 86-87 where some fuel injectors fouled, the modern (meaning post 87) injectors are of a design that won't foul unless you put some really old rotten gas through them. We had one guy in our group whose job it was to test our gas and competitors brands for injector fouling. He couldn't do it with '88 and newer injectors (with any brand of gas!). I mean he couldn't even get these injectors to foul a little. The only way he could run fouling tests was to buy a specific type and brand of pre-88 injectors (and he had a really hard time finding them. He bought up all he could find. – Sorry can't tell you type and brand, but I doubt any of you have them). If you store your Vette over the winter and start it on gas that's been in the tank all those months, you will likely foul your injectors some. But if you can get it started and put fresh gas in it, all the additive packages (in the gas you buy) I've seen to date will clean the injectors in 1-2 tanks.

What about valve cleaner additives?


Can't recommend any specific brands, but there's one I know of that you add to your gas tank and it works pretty well. There is a downside to what is essentially adding a large overdose of additive to your gas, however. Additives are heavy molecules and as such they tend to end up in your oil. If you use this method, you will add a greater than normal amount of additive to your oil and that will affect its properties. The way around this is to use the valve cleaner additive and then change your oil after you're done with that tank of gas. In other words do this only when you're near an oil change. There is another possibility, and that's that the valve cleaner additive you use is the same as what's in the gas you use; in which case it will do little good.

Overall, I'd just buy gas from a major brand, and then switch at 5000 miles (or use the 5000 and 1000 mile method). If you have to store your Vette (thank God I live in Texas), leave as little gas in it as possible.





Tech Tip

The correct way to raise a C5



You'd think the dealerships would know how to raise a C5 to prevent damage to the rocker panel, but they don't seem to know. Oh, it's only been out 7 years, so maybe it's too new.

We have 3 pictures here, A, B & C. These show the correct way of raising the C5 without damaging the rocker panels, which are subject to cracking (expensive) if not done properly.



Picture **A** shows an aluminum plug with an ear machined on it. Picture **B** is the underside of a C5 that shows the shipping slots built into the cars and are structurally sound enough to hold the weight of the car. There are 4 of these shipping slots, 2 just behind the front wheels on either side of the car on the bottom of the rocker panel, and 2 just in front of the rear wheels, also on the bottom of the rocker panels. Picture **C** shows the plug inserted into the shipping slot. The plug is inserted and turned 90 degrees so that it is locked into position. Hockey pucks can also be used to act as a cushion for lifting. The jack pad of the lift is placed on these plugs and the car is lifted with no danger of damage. Most dealerships have no idea what you're talking about when you ask them what they will be using when lifting the car, so be aware and have some ready for them to use.

Following are a couple of pictures I took of a C5 at a local, popular dealership that had raised the car incorrectly. If the rocker panels are cracked you can bet they will deny any liability.



Notice all of the contact the lift pad is making with surfaces not intended to hold the car's weight. I'd be pretty angry if this were my car.
