These dues go to cover the costs of running the club, mailing newsletters, and subsidizing the costs of our meetings. Club officers serve as volunteers.



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

Sahara Challenge. That's what it said. Just a red bumper plaque on a '65 Mustang.

But wait, there's another on a '29 Bentley. And a '57 Mercedes. And more on the Volvos, the Porsche, and the Jaguar.

The doorman was keeping his eye on the stable and the folks that were tinkering with the precious steeds. Their tool boxes wide open, we could see an array of vintage parts and shop manuals. "Hey, nice car you've got there!" Tousled hair, mustache, a grin. He pulled his head out of the engine compartment. We were in.



"Couldn't help but notice your 'plate. Don't see too many from Arizona in Spain."

"Nope. Just shipped her over a few days ago." The smooth Southern accent sounded like music to us. "We're waiting for another couple to catch up with us. They had road trouble in France and they're waiting on a couple of parts."

What about those red bumper plaques? We're in Granada, Spain; the Sahara's a long way from here. Charlie and I had been intrigued when we saw the red plaques. The antique cars were beautiful. Riding high and proud, with simple mechanics, elegant machines. We readily accepted an invitation to join the group for dinner (in the QCCC tradition: dinner and cars!)

For the next few hours, we were privy to a world unknown to us. Selecting the rally. Choosing the right car, finding the right mechanic, shipping the cars overseas by container.

"Tomorrow we head to Algeria to put the cars on the ferry to Morocco. Then another day or so to finish the last minute details, and we're off to run an endurance rally across the Saharan desert." Three thousand miles west to east, all the way to the Red Sea. Three inches of rain per year. A sand dune the size of France. Night time in the fifties, daytime over a hundred-thirty. Open cars. Brutal.

"Bloody awful, you know." A tall fellow in khakis and shirt spoke now. "The sand gets in everything. First the air cleaner, then your teeth." Bright blue eyes, an impish expression. "And these guys drive to win. They push it to the limit." I wondered which car was his. With his clipped British English, could it be the 'Bentley? How do you get a '29 Bentley to race across the Sahara." I envisioned Hidalgo, a modern version with goggles, willing his steed to the finish line. Armed with a computer and FedEx numbers for the inevitable search for parts. The trunks were filled with replacements, fuel pumps, gas lines, belts, whatever the team deemed of highest

priority. The engines were modified, and selected with an eye toward which had the better chance of getting that needed part in the event of a breakdown.

"Last year we ran from Peking to Paris. That was tough going. Those old silk roads were rough on the cars."

"Rough on people, too. We lost one." A quick glance, he was dead serious. They did push it to the limit.

Early morning, a round of photos, and we said "good bye" and "god speed" to our new friends. We would return from Spain as they set out on their adventure. Now they were winding through torturous cliff-hanging roads through the Atlas mountains, south and east to the Oasis of Zagora on the road to Timbuktu. Thirty two teams of two. Driver and mechanic, owner and modifier, or husband and wife. The sign says 52 days by camel but they will do the round trip in fourteen.

News from the Internet today. "A hectic time in the car park for a number of cars in need of fettling and running repairs, with the big '52 Daimler tourer having the cylinder head removed, taken away to be machined in a local workshop, and replaced using a makeshift head-gasket



hammered from a sheet of copper. Will it hold? Can it now rejoin the rally and make it back to Tangier? Alas, the answer was given within minutes of the morning re-start, and the Daimler was declared hors-de-combat and soon on the back of a truck. The crew, undaunted, have switched to a Renault hire-car."

Are you ready to add the final touch to your vette?

Iris has found this advertisement for replacement interior and exterior bulbs. The headline says Colored Replacement Bulbs: don't settle for ordinary lighting. All right, you've got the strobes, the under car LEDs, the neon lights around your license plate, the custom light lenses, and the performance intake, but something's still missing. You open your door, and aha...the old white dome light's still there. So replace it with a colored Eurolite bulb. You can use these bulbs to replace the standard ones used for turn signals, side markers, parking, back up, stop, trunk, tail, and dome lights. Pop 'em behind your clear corner and bumper lenses to put on a great show.*

*Sure you could do that, but the asterisk indicates that you can only use the external colored bulbs when parked. For street legality you'll have to replace the original bulbs before you get on the road.

Seems you'll be spending a lot of time inserting and removing bulbs.

A former supervisor I once had might have done this his instructions were just as clear!


