QCCC is a non-profit club (501-C7), which raises money for and participates with various local children's charities. Dues and donations are not tax deductible. We strive to promote exciting, safe & fun ways to enjoy our Corvettes. We hold business meetings on the second Saturday of each month. Our monthly business meeting usually incorporates a social time afterwards. Our socials are always fun and are focused around food & drink. We've had swimming parties, bar-b-ques, cookouts, day trips and weekend trips. We participate in mountain tours, holiday parades and several homecoming parades at local area high schools. We also participate with several sister Corvette clubs in car shows, drag racing, and autocrossing. In the Beginning - Continued

Production of the 1955 Corvette ends with just 700 built, because of the slow selling '54's. The big news for '56 was



body style change, both the '56 and little changed '57 Corvettes are considered the most beautiful Corvettes of all time. As great as the '56 Corvette looked, what really ignited the Corvette legend was that GM began racing it. The new V-8 265 cubic inch engine was now rated at 210HP with a Corvette first – an optional engine with two 4-barrel carburetors rated at 225HP.

Daytona Speedweek opened in February '56 with Zora Arkus-Duntov showing up with two drivers, John Fitch and Betty Skelton, along with two specially prepared Corvettes. John Fitch's Corvette went 145.5mph on the beach, while Skelton went 137.8 to win their class. The best Ford Thunderbird ran a 134.4. Production of the '56 Corvette ended with 3640 produced.

Visually the body of the '57 looked the same, but the option list grew. The most important were the new Borg-Warner T-10 4-speed transmission and the V-8's increase to 283 cubic inches. The base engine now produced 220HP, while the top engine, the new 283 with Rochester mechanical fuel injection, rated at 283HP - the first power plant to produce one HP per cubic inch. A '57 Corvette with the new "fuelie" between the frame rails could run 0-60 mph in 5.7 seconds. Production is strong in '57 with 6339 Corvettes produced.

Both the interior and exterior of the '58 were significantly restyled. All car manufacturers went to quad headlights in '58, as did the Corvette. There were now 5 variations of the 283 engine, with ratings from the 230HP base engine to 290HP for the fuelie engine. Changes to the interior gave a real cockpit feel, with all the gauges now directly in front of the driver, and the passenger getting a grab bar. Production for the '58 jumped to 9168.

The only changes in '59 were the removal of the fake louvers on the hood and removing the chrome trunk spears that were on the '58 Corvette. All five engine combinations returned for '59. Production of '59s moved up to 9670 units.

The new decade dawned with the Corvette standing pat. The changes were minor to the '60, it was the first year for anti-sway bars on the rear suspension. The top rated fuel injection engine now had 315HP with new aluminum heads. However, they were never installed on production cars because of casting problems, so the top fuelie stayed at the 290HP rating. This would also be the last year with the taillights in the top of the fender. Production in '60 finally topped 10,000 units with 10,261 produced.

There were big changes in the '61 Corvette exterior: gone was the traditional tooth grill and the new duck tail rear end hinted at things to come in '63. Interiors were almost unchanged from the '60, as were engine options. Production in '61 continued the steady climb since '56 to 10,939 units.

With the same body style as the '61, the news for the '62 was the growth of the small block V-8 to 327 cubic inches. The new base engine now was rated at 250HP, which in 1961 would have

been the 3rd highest rated engine. The fuel injection engine was rated at 360HP, a big 70 horse power jump for the fuelie. Things were good in 1962 for Chevrolet. It was their 50th anniversary and Corvette production showed the enthusiasm with 14,531 units produced. Total production for the solid axle C-1 Corvettes sat at 69,015 units at the end of 1962. The Corvette was flying high in '62, but the chassis was still closely related to the 1952 Chevrolet sedan. A new Corvette was long overdue.

Corvette Milestones for March

March 24, 1956: Four 1956 Corvettes take part in the Florida International 12-Hour Grand Prix of Endurance, at Sebring Florida. Car No. 1 with 307-ci engine, driven by John Fitch and Walt Hansgen, runs in SCCA class C/Modified, and finished the race, winning first in its class, and ninth overall.

March 1960: A Corvette finishes first in class at the 12 Hours of Sebring race. Two Corvettes of the Camoradi racing team, driven by Jim Jeffords and Fred Gamble, finish second and third in GT class.

March 1961: At the 12 Hours of Sebring race, Corvette drivers Delmo Johnson and Dave Morgan finish 1st in GT class and 11th overall.

March 27, 1962: At the 12 Hours of Endurance race at Sebring, M.J.R. Wylie and Duncan Black drive Gulf Oil's 1962 Corvette to 2nd in A/Production class, and 18th overall.

March 1966: Roger Penske, in his 1966 Corvette with 427 ci engine, finishes first in GT class at the 12 Hours of Sebring race.

March 1967: At the 12 Hours of Sebring race, Dave Morgan and Don Yenko compete in a 1967 L88 Corvette, finishing 1st in GT class and 10th overall.

March 8, 1970: Steve buys a Horizon Blue 1960 Corvette for \$500.

March 1972: At the 12 Hours of Sebring, Dave Heinz and Bob Johnson race Toye English's 1969 L88 convertible to first in GT class.

March 1973: The driving team of John Greenwood, Ron Grable, and Mike Brockman drive a Corvette to a win in its class at Sebring, and taking third place overall, the best ever showing for a Corvette at Sebring.

March 14, 1977: The 500,000th Corvette drives off the assembly line.

March 27, 1978: The Wall Street Journal runs a front-page article about the 1978 Corvette Indianapolis 500 Pace Cars, indicating they would be excellent investments.

March 1989: Chevrolet introduces the Corvette ZR-1 at the Geneva Auto Show in Switzerland.

March 2, 1990: At the Firestone Test Center near Fort Stockton, Texas, a team of drivers set a dozen land speed records with a Corvette ZR-1 and a Corvette L-09. Cars were in near stock condition, minus mufflers and catalytic converters. Records include 5000 miles in a time of 28:46:12.462, - 5000km in a time of 17:40:53.748, and 4221.256 miles in 24 hours. Average speed for all record runs was 170-175mph.

March 1992: Ground-breaking ceremony is held next to the Corvette plant for a permanent home for the National Corvette Museum.

Back when we were younger, circa 1974, QCCC rented a clubhouse on the corner of Independence Blvd and Commonwealth Ave. It was about 5 blocks west of the Merchandise Mart. The boulevard at that time was the main road thru Charlotte so we had a lot of activity there. The house was a 2 bedroom small brick ranch. There was a front living room with a big arch to the dining room; both with hardwood floors. These two rooms were filled with only a couch and juke box. One bedroom housed all the club paraphernalia and timing equipment for racing. The back bedroom was converted into a complete bar which ran the length of one wall. The front two rooms were painted white with a red and blue Corvette racing stripe up one wall over the ceiling, around the arch, and down the wall of the dining room. There was an old garage out back with no door (complete with a resident wino on most occasions). The back yard was flat with no ditch so it was often full of Corvettes.

We held our meetings in the attic and sat on barrels and make shift chairs. Those meetings were very hot in the summer and chilly in the winter. At the time there were 27 members: some with wives some with girlfriends and some with both. Maybe it was the beginning of the current Wednesday night dinners, but every Wednesday anyone who could, stopped by the house and on those nights there was always a cold keg of beer in the bar maintained and distributed by Harry "action Jackson," a great friend who could have been on Hee Haw. After imbibing until the wee hours we would shut down and go to the I-hop on Central Avenue for breakfast, usually around 2 a.m., then home for a shower and off to work. Remember we were all in our late 20's.

We have a rich and storied history which with Boyd's blessing we would like to share with the current membership. We will try to keep it short and interesting and as time permits send info to Charlie for the news letter. There were many colorful characters that kept things going and entertaining; it was a racing and rowdy bunch, but the same love of the Corvette has not changed. Anyone having old photos or stories send them to us to add to our endeavor. We are in touch with Martha Ferrell who along with her late husband Earl were charter members. We hope this will be interesting and entertaining to you.


