WP Report

The Mid-Years

More than four decades have passed since the introduction of the 1963 Sting Ray. It is still one of the most iconic cars. The Sting Ray name was first used in 1959 on a purpose



built race car that was designed by GM Design Chief Bill Mitchell and his assistant Larry Shinoda. When design work was started for the '63 Corvettes, they decided to use the Sting Ray racer as their concept. At the same time Zora Arkus-Duntov was hard at work on a new chassis. Remember, the C-1 corvettes basically had the chassis of a 1952 Chevrolet sedan. The new chassis was shortened 4 inches to a 98 inch wheel base, and Duntov built a ladder frame that was much stiffer than the old X-member frame. It allowed the passenger compartment to be sunk down between the frame rails. He also designed a new independent rear suspension, another first for the Corvette. The joining of the Mitchell / Shinoda body design and Duntov's new chassis resulted in the 1963 Corvette roadster, and for the first time a fastback coupe. With the hide-away headlights and the boat tail-shaped rear window the '63 coupe was outrageously attractive. The thick center bar going through the rear window earned this car the nickname "split window coupe." The only carryover from the '62 model were the 327 cubic inch engines, of which four were offered in '63: 250HP base engine up to the 360HP fuel injection engine. A '63 Corvette with the "fuelie" and a 4-speed transmission went 0-60 in 5.8 seconds and the ¼ mile in 14.5 seconds at 102 mph. The public loved the new Sting Rays. 10594 coupe and 10919 convertibles were sold, a big jump from the '62 production run.

The '64 Corvettes were little changed. They eliminated the dummy vent from the hood, restyled the roof vents, and removed the center bar from the rear window for better visibility. New to the option list was a 360HP 4-barrel engine and the fuelie was now rated at 375HP. The transmission stayed the same, 3-speed standard with option of 4-speed or Power Glide automatic. There were 22,229 Corvettes built in '64.

The easiest way to tell a '65 Corvette from the '64 is the three functional vertical louvers in the front fender, but there were changes under the hood. Chevrolet offered the 396 cu. in. big block, putting out 425 HP. Also, to help it stop, they made 4-wheel disc brakes standard equipment. There were 23562 Corvettes built in '65.

Few changes were made to the '66 Corvettes, all the news was under the hood. The big block engine was increased to 427 cubic inches, a 390HP engine and 425HP. The standard 327 was increased to 300HP and a 350HP version. There were 27,720 Corvettes build in '66.

In 1967 the front fender louver count went up to 5 and the parking brake moved from under the dash to between the bucket seats. Chevrolet kept adding to the engine power. Several new 427s were offered, one rated at 435P with 3 2-barrel carburetors ("tri-power"), and the awesome L-88 427 with 500+ HP. Although Chevrolet only rated them at 430HP, this option was for racing. If ordered, the car automatically was heater, radio, and fan shroud delete. They were expensive, with only 20 L-88 Corvettes built. There were a total of 22,940 Corvettes built for '67. The

Corvette was at its peak in '67. For no apparent reason Chevrolet had a new design coming in '68. The total number of C-2 Corvettes produced in five years was 117,966 – far exceeding the ten year production of the C-1 Corvette.

Corvette Milestones for April

April 18, 1958: The Sting Ray makes its debut at the President's Cup Race at Maryland's Marlboro Raceway. The car is Bill Mitchell's personal vehicle for style testing of the Corvette. Richard Thompson races it to fourth place. The car was made from the last Corvette SS mule chassis, and given a new body by Bill Mitchell and Larry Shinoda.

April 1965: The Mako Shark II (project XP-830), formerly called the Mako Shark, make its debut appearance at the New York International Auto Show. The non-running full-size model cost nearly \$3 million to create.

April 1970: Chevrolet unveils the experimental mid-engine XP-895 Corvette at the New York Auto Show. The car is the restyled XP-882 prototype.

April 1994: General Motors holds a marketing clinic in Los Angeles, to ascertain how well the new 1997 model Corvette might sell. 60% of the clinic attendees say they would buy the Corvette over the competition.

April 28, 1995: The last ZR-1 Corvette rolls off the assembly line. During its six year lifetime, 6939 ZR-1 Corvettes were built. Chevrolet general manager Jim Perkins and Chief Corvette Engineer Dave McLellan deliver the car to the National Corvette Museum.

April 21, 1996: Zora Arkus-Duntov dies at age 86, in Grosse Pointe, Michigan.

April 30, 2000: Dave Hill, Chief Engineer of Corvette, unveils the 2001 Z06 model Corvette, with new 385HP LS6 engine.










NCM Corner
























Vintage QCCC by Vintage Guys

Circa 1975: QCCC was a member of NCCC (National Council of Corvette Clubs) which required us to sponsor and attend various racing events. At the time we had 27 members, all of whom autocrossed and drag raced locally and even on Myrtle Beach. Timing equipment was out of our budget so we borrowed it from a neighboring club. We strived to be the national points champions and did retain that title for several years, drawing interest in the club and driving membership to 47 by the 1977 era. We were lucky



to be in the heart of NASCAR and raced several of their tracks. Our favorite was Charlotte Motor Speedway which at the time could be rented for \$200 for the entire weekend. Of course we did not often have \$200 in the budget. More about that later.

In 1975 the speedway was less than glamorous. The pits were covered with a carport awning and the left half of the infield was a huge crater where they had taken the dirt to build the high banks. Bruton Smith had contracted with Charlotte to use the hole as a landfill. Access for the garbage trucks was thru the gate in the back straight. They piled 2 feet of dirt over the track so the trucks would not damage the surface as they crossed to the landfill. Because the dirt blocked the back straight we ran a course backwards down pit road, around a barrel, down the front straight, thru the road course and back down the front straight.

In November of 75 we sanctioned the Southeast Sectional for NCCC with over 200 corvettes. We always arrived early (6 a.m. dark in Nov) to set up the timing lights. Now there was a good ol' boy in the club, Charlie Nash, who had a 66 coupe. That morning in '75 we were about done setting the equipment with the sun just coming up when Charlie roared thru the tunnel entrance, whipped out of the pits and lit off toward turn one. We ran out on the track to try to flag him down, but he would have none of it. He was going to get in a hot lap. All we could do was watch and listen as he wound that coupe up all the way thru turn 2 and started down the back straight until he saw the dirt. There was a screeching of tires that seemed never ending. When we got over there he was still attached tightly to the steering wheel and had stopped just in the edge of the dirt. Every time

the story got told it got funnier and I think more distorted, even to a point where it was said he wet himself. Such was the way it was for QCCC in 1975.
