# WP Report

#### C-3 1968 - 1982

The third generation Corvettes were patterned after the Mako Shark concept car designed by Larry Shinoda in 1965. The C-3's styling was flamboyant in overall shape, but restrained in details – no fake scoops or extra chrome anywhere on the car, unlike the C-1s where chrome was the order of the day. Although it replaced a beloved icon, the "Mako Shark" corvette proved to be a big hit during the '68 model year, building 9936 coupes with the new T-top roof panels and 18,630 convertibles for another year of record production. The bodies and interiors were new, but chassis and drive train were a carryover from 1967, base engine was the 300 327 cubic inch small block with 3 speed transmission. Options were 350 327ci, 4-427ci ranging in HP from 390-435, plus the legendary L-88. There was a new transmission option for Corvette with the new body style being able to handle the turbohydromatic 3-speed, replacing the 2-speed powerglide automatic from the 1950s. The Muncie 4-speeds were also still available. The '68 model suffered from build quality problems – poor fits and roof leaks. Their problems were vastly improved by the 69 model year.

The Stingray name returned in '69, now spelled as one word on the front fenders. Corvettes for 1969 received updated door panels for more passenger room, also base engine displacement went from 327ci to 350ci. Horsepower remained the same as in '68 for the new 350ci and all the 427ci engines. Transmission options remained the same for '69. One new option was a one year only item for the C-3, the side exhaust option. The last year for the L-88 engine option also included an all aluminum version called ZL-1. The special engine provided 585HP, but only 2 were delivered in production Corvettes. Total production for '69 was 38,762.

For 1970 the only body change was the four fender vents were now a crosshatch design, amber parking light lenses also appeared. Finally in 1970 the Corvette came with the Muncie 4-speed as standard equipment, doing away with the 3-speed that had been standard since 1956. A new solid lifter small block 350ci was introduced in '70, called the LT-1. It was rated at 370HP. Also new was big block displacement that increased to 454ci with the LS-5 rated at 390 and the LS-7 tripower rated at 460, though there is no record of LS-7s being installed in Corvettes, probably because it was a \$3000 option. Total production in 1970 was 17,316.

With stricter emission controls facing the automakers in 1971, all engines suffered horsepower losses after almost a decade of steady increases. The base 350ci was now rated at 270 and the LT-1 350ci at 330, the LS-5 454ci dropped to 365 and a new LS-6 was rated at 425. Total production for 1971 was 21,801.

The power drain would continue in 1972 and was exaggerated by the government mandate switch to reporting net horsepower instead of gross horsepower. The base 350ci now was rated at 200, the LT-1 at 255 and only one big block 454 rated at 270. Bodies and interior for Corvettes in 1971 & 72 were mostly unchanged. Total production of '72 Corvettes was 27,004.

Corvettes for 1973 had a new look with a rubber front bumper to withstand the mandated 5mph impact. Also gone was the crosshatch side vents, changed to a large single vent. Radial tires were now standard equipment for the first time. Only three engines were available for '73. The base 350ci now had 190 while the new L82 350ci was rated at 250. The sole 454 was an LS4 rated at 275 horsepower. Total production in 1973 was 30,464.

The 1974 Corvettes were the end of an era. It was the last year for true dual exhaust and the end of the 454ci big block. The rear of the Corvette shed its chrome bumper for a body color cone shaped bumper to meet new regulations. The same 3 engines were offered with the 454ci dropping to 270. Total production in '74 was 37,502. The horsepower losses would continue as catalytic converters came into play.

Next month the rest of the C-3s.

#### **Corvette Milestones for May**

May 1, 1953: Zora Arkus-Duntov starts work at Chevrolet as assistant staff engineer to Maurice Olley in Research and Development.

May 2, 1956: Zora Arkus-Duntov builds the Corvette SR-2 Sebring racer.

May 1, 1957: A fully-synchronized four-speed transmission is first made available on the 1957 model Corvette, as a \$188.30 option.

May 28, 1978: The 62<sup>nd</sup> Indianapolis 500 race is held. A 1978 Corvette is the official pace car, driven by Jim Rathmann. This is the first Indianapolis 500 pace car with a stock drivetrain. Corvette will go on to be the pace car a total of ten times to date.

May 3, 1993: Corvette chief engineer Dave Hill unveils the CERV-4 (Corvette Engineering Research Vehicle) test car at the General Motors Technical Center in Warren, MI. Most of the hundreds of people attending did not even know the test car was being built. It cost Chevrolet about \$1.2 million to build.

May 5, 1994: The two Corvette C5-R cars participate in a one-day test of the Paris Le Mans circuit, prior to the 24 Hours of Le Mans in June.

May 21, 2000: The Nevada Open Road Challenge is held on a 90 mile stretch of highway S.R. 318 between Lund and Hiko. 78 of over 200 cars are Corvettes. A modified 1992 Corvette takes top speed of 227 mph. Another Corvette averages 207 mph, taking first place.

Our meeting this month will be at Jocks & Jills, 4109 South Stream Blvd. in Charlotte. Off of Tyvola Road, across from the old coliseum site. Social hour will start at 5:30, with the meeting at 6:30. You can plan to get there earlier for dinner, so you're finished before the meeting, or stay after the meeting for dinner if you would like. They have a good assortment of appetizers.

Remember, real Corvettes have solid axles.

#### In Memoriam Carol Massfeller










# NCM Corner

#### Spot Light on Jerry Ferrell

This month, I had the pleasure of visiting and talking with Jerry Ferrell at City Chevrolet. Jerry is from Angier North Carolina, approximately eighteen miles from Raleigh. He grew up around cars and his father was in the car business. He was graduated from Old Dominion University in 1974 with a teaching certificate. His mother is 89 years old and lives in Virginia Beach, Virginia. He has been married to his wife Pamela for 37 years and they have one son who works at Chevrolet Cadillac in Monroe NC.

In 1982 he owned Capital Imports in Concord specializing in Volkswagens, Subaru and Isuzu. In 1984 he sponsored Ernie Irvin, who worked on cars and ran dirt track. In 1985 Irvin was the track champion in Charlotte and in 1986 Ernie went to work for Dale Earnhardt Senior and the rest is history. Jerry became personal friends with other drivers such as Alan Kuwikki, Ken Schrader and Dale Earnhardt.



Jerry met Rick Hendrick at the Charlotte Motor Speedway. He sold his dealership in Concord and moved back to Virginia and went to work at Colonial Chevy. In 1989 Rick bought the dealership and offered him the General Manager position at City Chevrolet. Jerry has worked for Rick for 21 years.

City Chevrolet has 172 employees and was founded in 1935. This year they will celebrate their 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary. In 1978 Rick took over City Chevrolet. The automotive group started here. He now owns 60 dealerships and the Motor Sports Center. Every Monday morning all dealerships have conference calls and share information and ideas with the automotive group. His dealerships also work with the Motorsports as a team. Jerry told me Rick is a great visionary and inspires all of his employees. Today, City Chevrolet is fifth in the nation for sales of Camaros. The Camaro comes with an engine package of a 6 cylinder 300hp, an 8 cylinder 400hp and an 8 cylinder manual shift 423hp. By demand, half of all Camaros purchased are personalized with pin stripes and performance wheels.

His personal car is a Suburban Tahoe and he has a passion for performance cars. His first car was a Vega with cowl hood. He had a 72 Nova Supersport, a 69 Chevelle SS 396, a 1974 Corvette, a Pontiac Bonneville 400hp and a number of GTO's. His main hobby is his work and he still enjoys teaching.

In the coming years, the government is going to mandate that all cars will get 35 miles per gallon. I asked Jerry how General Motors is going to comply with these new regulations. Jerry said, "This fall General Motors will introduce the Chevy Cruz, an aerodynamic coupe sedan, possibly with convertible top, that will get 41 miles per gallon." When I asked Jerry about the government owning 60% of General Motors, he replied, "The plans are to repay the loan, continue to grow the product line and meet the demands of the public."

Jerry attributes City Chevrolet's success to their employees, customers, vendors and lenders. There will be an insert in the Charlotte Observer on May 9<sup>th</sup> about their 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. On May 12<sup>th</sup> they will have cars from 1930's to the present day on display. On May 13<sup>th</sup>, they will have a customer appreciation day. At the end of the year, they are giving away a 2010 Camaro. City Chevrolet is proud to be the main sponsor and partner of the Queen City Corvette Club.

#### THE PHANTOM 61 CORVETTE.

Mid 70's saw Billy Coats as our go to guy for mechanics. Billy made a living repairing cars and had a shop around Shamrock and Eastway Drives in Charlotte. He was a thin man with long hair on the sides and back but none on top, and you never found him without a cigarette hanging from the corner of his mouth. He rented space in a large industrial building with a high ceiling, poor lighting, and he came with the scent of an auto repair shop. He was an excellent mechanic and built really STOUT motors for many of the QCCC members. He cut out many rear fenders so bigger tires would fit and, since we raced a lot, our cars were at his shop often.

His love of Corvettes clouded his business judgment resulting in many builds and repairs with him waiting for us to pay if we ever got the money. Often he would not charge for his labor only for the parts. As long as you were racing and helping QCCC win national championships he was just glad to help. His motors raced for QCCC in Richmond, New Orleans, Dallas, Orlando, Roebling Road and even Daytona. Billy was a major reason for our success. He would always stop and talk Corvettes with us and the customers cars would have to wait. I know he put a 3.70 and then later a 4.11 rear end in my 63 coupe for next to nothing. (Can you imagine leaving a split window coupe sitting outside a shop on Shamrock Road today.) Due to his struggling business two things come to mind. First he had a C3 roadster with side exhaust which was always in primer and it never got painted that we know of, but it would run like a scalded dog. He had another car, a 61 red roadster with white coves and two tops. The car never had any oil in it and Richard remembers pushing it around many times. As his business slipped there was interest from the IRS looking for collateral, so it went into hiding. It was moved many times, usually every few months to a different member's garage, always pushed on and off the trailer. As far as we know the IRS never found the car. Our last recollection was that a close friend of his added a bedroom on his house with patio doors on the back and the car was pushed in there before the doors were installed. Billy later worked for Sports Car Salvage on 273 toward Mt Holly. We have lost touch with him but hope he is well. He was a true friend and Corvette guy. We bet he still has that '61 somewhere. Talk about a barn find!!!!
