
Enjoy the summer and watch for the activities planned in the upcoming months. Remember to sign up and let the event planners know you are participating. You don't want to miss any of the fun times.

#### C-3 - Continued....

An extensive 1980 redesign of the front and rear bumper caps resulted in integral spoilers for each, instead of the add-ons of the



earlier models. The Feds were at it again, mandating a top speedometer reading of 85 mph. California's tough emission standards resulted in all Corvettes sold in California to have only the 305 cubic inch engine rated at 180 horsepower. All the rest of the states received Corvettes with 350 ci rated at 190 horsepower, or the optional L-82 rated at 230 HP. In 1980 air conditioning became standard equipment on all Corvettes. Production dropped significantly in '80 to 40,614 units. Corvette interior and exteriors for 1981 were unchanged from 1980 with only one engine offered, a 350 ci designated L-81 rated at 190 horsepower. This was also the last year for the manually shifted 4 speed. A new computer became standard equipment on the L-81 to control ignition timing and carbureted fuel / air mixtures. Mid way through the model year production moved to the new assembly plant in Bowling Green, Kentucky. Production remained about the same as 1980 at 40,606 units.

In its last year of production the C-3 was showing its age: the basic body dated to 1968 and the basic chassis dated to 1963. A 1982 collector's edition was built with special badging, two-tone paint, aluminum wheels styled after the bolt on 1967 aluminum wheels and a lifting rear glass for easy storage access, 6759 collector edition would be built in 1982. Only one engine was available the new L-83 with "cross fire injection" rated at 200 horsepower this was the first fuel injected engine for the Corvette since 1965. In 1982 all Corvettes were built at the new assembly plant in Bowling Green. The next generation Corvette design was started in 1981, with customers anxious for a new Corvette production dropped to only 25,407 units the lowest number of units since 1971. Next month the highly anticipated C-4 would arrive six months late, but better late than never.

#### **Corvette Milestones for July**

July, 1953: Zora Arkus-Duntov begins working on the Corvette.

**July, 1956:** Richard Thompson races a production Corvette to first place in C class – Production, in the Seattle Seafair race, the first SCCA National title for the Corvette.

**July, 1958:** Bill Mitchell assembles the XP-700, a highly modified Corvette with a long oval nose, and twin-bubble plastic roof. The rear design is later adopted for the 1961 model.

**July, 1962:** Production begins on the Grand Sport, designed for racing in World Championship races. Production is intended to be 125.

July, 1975: The last 1975 model-year convertible Stingray rolls off the assembly line.

July, 1977: Bill Mitchell resigns from General Motors.

July 2, 1992: The one millionth Corvette is built. It is a white LT1 roadster, with red interior.

July 17, 1999: At Knebworth House in Essex, England, 120 Corvettes take part in the longest convoy of Corvettes ever in England. 344 cars in total take part in the main event, the 20<sup>th</sup> Annual Corvette Nationals of the Classic Corvette Club United Kingdom.

# Vintage QCCC

#### '78 Pace Car Mania

In 1977 the club Corvette guru and visionary was "Dollar" Bill Ingram, a CPA whose real passion was cars. Ole "Dollar" had a photographic memory and being a CPA he could spout Corvette data endlessly. He was always ahead of the game. Just a few of the fleet that passed thru his garage that I recall were, '67 big block silver coupe with a black stinger, a '72 LT1 with air (one of 250 made), a red '65 roadster taken on trade from pro golfer Jay Haas for a '78 308 red Ferrari, and his wife's (a real sweetheart) '77 black L82 with saddle that Richard bought. (Don't feel sorry for Richard, he later sold that car for a big time profit) Bill left the CPA business in '77 and started selling cars out of his basement on Summerhill Drive (between Monroe Road and Independence Blvd. in Charlotte). He was so successful that he later built Southern Imports on the Boulevard. (Note: he retired and sold that business to someone else and that man was later busted for selling drugs.)

He was working from his home in '77 where the basement housed 5 Corvettes and an office with the long wall covered with a billboard poster of a '78 silver anniversary (several of us at his guidance bought the billboards for \$10 each from GM, I sold mine in 2001 for \$100). Being a student of Corvettes he early on noted that GM would make one '78 Indy Pace Car for each of their 6502 dealers. Bill figured that they would be hard to come by very quickly, and never hesitant to spend and make money he pounced on the opportunity. He visited local dealers and put a down payment on their pace car at sticker price, acquiring the allotment from City Chevrolet, LaPoint Chevrolet, Larry Jay Chevrolet and 2 other dealerships. With those commitments in hand he advertised in "Vette Vues Magazine" and sold the cars sight unseen with blank titles. Then he went to the bank and laid out the plans to borrow money to buy more.

Around this time I was at his home and noticed a map of the southeast in his office with red, green and yellow push pins. I inquired what was up with that, and he informed me the red pins were dealers who refused to sell him their pace car, the green ones he had successfully bought and the yellow pins he was still negotiating. The final tally was 28 pace cars bought in 90 days and sold within 60 more days. He never laid eyes on any of the cars, net profit to him for 5 months work was \$125,000 less a little interest to the bank, quite a tidy sum in 1977. This was only rivaled years later at Southern Imports when he would buy Mercedes in Germany, ship them to Charleston port, straight onto a truck to avoid the \$10,000 U.S. pollution upgrade, then driven to Mexico and sold there. (Richard

helped hatch this plan as he was selling for a German company at the time). Dollar Bill always had cars that later we would say "why didn't we buy one of those?" He was a money making machine, a great fun person and a walking Corvette Black Book. We think he may still be in Charlotte and would love to hear from him. He kind of reminds us of what we saw at Charley O's.

SC. It is always nicely organized and a safe, fun time. We have participated before so once again we signed up and trekked down that way to enjoy attacking the asphalt without worrying about tickets, cross traffic, or what's around the next corner. This particular event is unique in that it allows convertible cars to participate without the requirement of a roll-bar, so if you drive a drop top you may want to make a note for next year.

Each of us was assigned an instructor, and put in a class group based on experience. Saturday morning was beautifully clear and after a driver's meeting to reinforce safety, we started the cycle of each group going to class, grid the car, OUT ON TRACK!! Come back in, get some water (very warm temperatures but a good breeze), and after what seems like a fairly short period, it's time to go again (WOO HOO). There were big smiles all around, to be sure. Driving the car is a ton of fun and enjoying the dynamic performance is built-in. Our cars are fast, handle nicely and have great brakes - good stuff.





There were four sessions per group each day - averaging about 25-30 minutes on track per session. Each day at noon the track was open for parade laps so folks not driving in the event, or just visiting for the day could take their car out and experience the track first hand. Several folks from the club stopped by to visit and check out the event making the between session times go even faster.

Sunday was another pretty day with everyone getting more comfortable with their cars and getting around the track a little bit quicker. Both Tom Marron and I were declared sufficiently experienced to solo towards the end of the weekend and got a chance to do it by ourselves – it was exciting and feels good to know you're getting the hang of things.


