

C-5 1997-2000

The fifth-generation was the most wholly new Corvette since the '53, including the entire concept of how the car was built. Instead of bolting



the transmission directly behind the engine, the 1997 version split the transmission off and placed it in back of the car between the rear wheels, where its weight could be used to offset that of the engine. This transaxle arrangement had been used before on cars like the Porsche 928, but was a radical change for the Corvette. The suspension still used aluminum links and transverse leaf springs, but the wheels were now 18-inchers in the back and 17s up front. There was no provision for a spare tire since all tires would be run-flat design. The new frame used large, hydroformed rails and a thick backbone for extra strength, while relying on engineered wood products to make up part of the floor. The only body offered in '97 was the hatchback coupe, evoking styling themes from the previous two generations, but with reduced front and rear overhangs as the wheels moved out toward the corners of the car. The clamshell hood was gone in favor of a less expensive conventional hood. The C5's engine was completely different from any previous Corvette V8. Still displacing a nominal 5.7 liters, the C5's "Gen III" LS-1 was an all new, all aluminum design using all the latest production techniques, giving it a satisfying 345 horsepower. The rear-mounted transmissions were either a version of the Borg-Warner T56 six-speed manual or Chevy's own 4L60-E four speed automatic in a new case for this application. Production for '97 was only 9752 cars, because of a late production starting date.

For 1998, Chevy merely expanded the C5 Corvette range by adding a convertible model. For the first time since 1962, this convertible included a trunk that was accessible from outside. Magnesium wheels were offered as an option for the ultimate in unsprung weight savings. Corvette paced the Indianapolis 500, and again replicas were offered to the public, this time in bluish purple. 1998 production jumped up to 31,084, with a full year of production.

The 1999 Corvette lineup included a fixed roof coupe, which was lighter in weight than the hatchback coupe or convertible. The intent behind the fixed roof coupe was hinted at by the fact that it could only be had with the six-speed manual transmission. The most significant addition to the '99 option list was the head-up display unit that projected major information on the windshield in front of the driver. Production for the '99 was 33, 270.

The 2000 models had few changes. The elimination of the passenger-side door lock cylinder due to the keyless entry system. Five spoke forged aluminum wheels. Two new exterior colors, Millennium Yellow and Dark Bowling Green Metallic, and a new interior color, Torch Red. Production for the 2000 continued to increase, with 33,682.

Corvette Milestones for November

November 1960: The CERV I (Chevrolet Experimental Research Vehicle) is first shown in public at the Riverside International Raceway. It is a mid-engine, open wheel, single seat prototype racing car.

November 7, 1969: The 250,000th Corvette (a Riverside Gold convertible) rolls off the assembly line.

November 2, 1990: In a small shopping center in Bowling Green, Kentucky, the National Corvette Museum Annex is opened.

November 1992: Dave Hill, an engineer in General Motors' Cadillac program, accepts a job offer to become Corvette Chief Engineer.

November 1992: Mercury Marine, in Stillwater, OK, completes building all LT5 engines destined for Corvette ZR-1s for the year.

November 1992: The date of building 1997 Corvettes is planned to be September 3, 1996.


November 16, 1997: Corvette Designer, Larry Shinoda, (famous for the 1963 split window Corvette) dies of kidney failure.

November 2, 1999: Chevrolet announces that it will enter a C5R Corvette race car at the 68th annual 24 Hours of Le Mans in France in 2000.





ALMS & Road Atlanta - QCCC Members Attend Petit Le Mans and Get Hooked!

The **LAST RACE** of the Season was a thriller right down to the last lap! Many of you who have Corvettes already know the *Corvette WON* on the very last lap of the race.

Riding the approximately 250 miles down and the same route home was a ball. Have any of you traveled with Fred McCoy to any event? It was terrific. The ride seemed like a 30 minute trip down and back, as we talked about everything in the world and were excited to boot. The conversation between us never stopped. We left Charlotte early Friday morning and arrived at *Road Atlanta* early in the day as well and beat most of the crowd. We arrived in style in my 2008 Z06 (*Orange Crush*). We parked right in front of the "will-call" ticket booth which was only about 100 feet from where we entered. With tickets in hand, our



next stop was the *CORVETTE CORRAL*. At the main tent, we were checked in by extremely nice people from the *Corvette Club in Atlanta*. We registered and received a Goodie Bag. The tent was huge, with plenty of chairs, coffee, Pepsi, water to drink, candy chips, etc., and, best of all, *Corvette people everywhere*.

There were two flat screen TV's set up to watch the race in the tent should it rain. But the



weather was perfect the entire weekend. **Doug Fehan**, Director of the Corvette Race Team, spoke and had a Q&A session answering questions from the Corvette only crowd. After he spoke, all the drivers of the Corvette Race Team came to sign autographs, again for only Corvette people. The line was long but they were all so friendly and down to earth and a pleasure to meet. This takes place on Friday so that is the day to be there if you want autographs.



Vendor's Village is a myriad of Corvette stuff including a huge GM display of Corvettes. Also on display was the new *Chevy Volt*. There were Ferrari Vendors, Porsche Vendors, a very big Peugeot display, vendors who sold all kinds of car items, art work, tire displays, other paraphernalia of your choosing. There were bars to get a brew or two, all kinds of food to eat, it was a virtual circus.



Next stop was a visit to the *Paddock and Pit area*. That's right, your tickets include visiting the paddock area at any time and a special time to see all the cars and drivers "up close and very personal" and ask the drivers questions (see photos). The cars were available for approximately an hour, which I thought was great. Corvette drivers, especially *Johnny O'Connell*, seem to be the friendliest of all. I took about 70 or 80 pictures (Fred was a bit upset as I couldn't help but take lots of pictures of the Michelin Tires).

We obviously had the choice area to watch the race. On Friday, we met other **QCCC Members Jim and Beth Cerniglia, Ed Williams and our QCCC President Boyd Kurt**, who came over to visit us. Boyd was at turn 5 and we were at the finish line. When it was time to go to the hotel Friday night, we were worn out and went to Commerce Georgia for the night's stay after visiting Ryan's Steak House.

We arrived just at the right time on Saturday as we missed most of the crowd arriving at 7:30AM and we whisked

right into our spot once again with very little trouble. We were amazed at the hundreds (and most likely thousands) of cars that were pouring into the race. They served sandwiches and plenty of drinks.

We settled down and watched the race, periodically walking to check out other areas. It all came down to the last lap. The Ferrari was the "baddest" car I have ever heard. The BMWs were tough as well. As we watched the race, and as the laps ticked away the Ferrari was



kicking our butts. You can tell who is in the lead because each car has lights (1, 2 and 3) designating the class. We could tell when the Vettes were coming as there is the distinctive sound of the Kaltech V-8 coming down the hill and around the corners. The loud speakers disappointed the entire Corvette Corral: ..."the Ferrari is in front and has a good lead on the Corvettes". But on the last lap, as Fred and I were hoping the Vettes could pull it off we heard the announcer say "There is something wrong with the Ferrari." Can the Vette catch and pass him? Yes! We learned from the pits that the Ferrari ran out of gas on the last lap... **CORVETTE WINS!!!!!** A huge "YEAH" moved through the track....CORVETTE HAD WON! So if you haven't been to an **ALMS** event, please do yourself a favor and go see the Corvettes race, as there in nothing like it!




A Tale of 3 Ex-Presidents

Jim Whitley, President '73, Tommy Mitchem, President '74 and Travis Meredith, President '72 and '76.

Jim found the clubhouse in '73 and negotiated the rent. Tommy was instrumental in managing our racing at Charlotte Motor Speedway, and Trav was a huge calming influence on the group, did most of the newsletter artwork and made the newsletter a go.

As we noted, the 70's were a raucous time for QCCC, with the average age 27, member count around 25. Finances were very tight and looking back it was a time that we might not have survived as a club. While all 3 of the fellows were instrumental, we feel Travis was as responsible as anyone for us pulling through this era and moving forward. A two time president, Trav had great ability and timing in both his story telling and dead pan humor. He displayed tremendous common sense in guiding us thru many a crisis.



This story comes from the clubhouse. The front room was hardwood flooring, a juke box, and a sofa. Every Wednesday night there was a keg on tap for camaraderie and dancing. There were 2 records on the jukebox that had to be warped from overplay. First was "60 Minute Man", which was Shad Alberty's (of shag dance fame) favorite song. The other was "Blue Moon" which was Trav's song. Trav would lead us in the dagety, dagety, dagety, dag gone blue moon, which today makes no sense at all. While President, Trav had proclaimed "Blue Moon" to be the club song with only Linda Pace objecting (she objected to everything). This all went away with the loss of the clubhouse but resurfaced at the 20th year QCCC reunion in 1988. Vetters Mitchem and Whitley awarded Trav a plaque which read "May the twin moons of life shine on your 64 Car forever". The plaque (see photo) had a picture attached of Trav's 64 coupe in his garage. Inside were Tommy and Jim. How they got in that position is anybody's guess. In Trav's usual humor he accepted the award, paused a minute, then asked who took the photo. Answer, wife Sharon. If you knew Sharon you would know she was glad to help only having trouble holding the camera still while laughing. Trav has just restored the '64, 4spd, a/c, 365 hp, less the moons. 

- New ALMS Apps for iPhone Two new apps are now available on the Apple App Store to keep up with the American Le Mans Series. One of the Apps actually tracks where each Team / Car is running during the races so we can keep up with our Corvette Race Team. The standings are updated every 30 seconds. Both Apps are free. Another indicator that the ALMS is growing in popularity.
- New NC law prohibits state name, stickers being hidden on license plates We've Got 30 Days A new law went into effect December 1, 2009 requiring the state's name across the bottom of the plate as well as the year and month stickers on the license plate to be fully visible. Warning tickets can be issued through November 30, 2010. On December 1, 2010, vehicle owners can be cited \$100 for each violation. Better check that license plate frame on your Corvette! For more info, go to New NC Plate Requirements.
- Speaking of Laws Consumer Advocate David Horowitz recently wrote an article on the cost of traffic tickets. He found that, on average, more than 100,000 people per day receive a speeding ticket in this country, or close to 40 million per year. The average speeding ticket costs \$150. More than 95% of people who receive speeding tickets never contest them and simply pay the fine. The average traffic officer will make a city an average of \$200,000 per year in traffic ticket fines. The average increase in insurance costs for one speeding ticket over the course of three years is \$900. This amounts to about \$12 billion extra the insurance industry makes in a single year just from speeding tickets. Whether or not these fees (or hidden taxes) actually make us drive safer is a question that has been debated for years. What do you think? More information at Costco Consumer Connection.
- "Top Gear" Fans An American Version is coming It appears the "on again, off again" American version of the BBC's Top Gear is on again. It premieres Sunday, November 21st at 9:00 PM on the History Channel. Hosts are professional racing and stunt drive Tanner Foust, Comedian / Movie Actor Adam Ferrara and SPEED Channel's racing analyst Rutledge Wood. Whether this threesome will prove to be as irreverent as the BBC's Clarkson, Hammond and May is yet to be seen. But it sounds like good TV for car guys. Details.
