Dues and donations are not tax deductible. In addition to various social activities for members, QCCC raises money for and participates with various local charities. We strive to promote exciting, safe and fun ways to enjoy our Corvettes. We hold business meetings on the second Saturday of each month. Our monthly business meeting usually incorporates social time. Our socials are always fun and are focused around fellowship, food & drink. We've had swimming parties, barbques, cookouts, day cruises and weekend trips. We participate in / conduct mountain tours, holiday parades and several homecoming parades at local area high schools. We also support and participate in local auto shows and hold charity Corvette shows each year. After an initiation fee of \$7.00, club dues are only \$8.00 a month, per family, and are to be paid quarterly or annually. These dues go to cover the costs of running the club, mailing newsletters, and subsidizing the costs of our meetings. Club officers and supporting staff serve as volunteers.

To become a member of the QUEEN CITY CORVETTE CLUB, you must own a Corvette and attend at least three (3) monthly business meetings and two (2) events within a six-month time period. Express your wishes for membership during a monthly business meeting, be voted in and begin paying dues.

As many of you know, I like automotive history, especially Corvettes. So here's a little story for you.

I've always wished I knew more about the background of my 1960 Corvette. As a sixteen year old in 1970, I didn't pay much attention to the details of buying it as a used car, I can just remember how excited I felt when the garage door popped open and I saw the rear end of it. I didn't care about the hole in the fiberglass or the rip in the canvas. Looking back, I have no idea where the owner lived, but remember exactly what the house looked like. Over the years I have tried to add documentation for the car. Many times I have told my wife, Laura, the story of buying the car, and she figured it would be a good Christmas present to track down the original ad for me.

She called *The Detroit News* to find out if they archived their old classifieds, and was told that the *Detroit Library* was the only place that had them. A follow up call to the library determined that they were only at the main library downtown, and on microfilm, not available online, so it would require a visit. This was no longer something she could do as a surprise for me, since we're 600 miles away. So she told me what she had found out, and we decided to make a trip to Michigan after Thanksqiving, since we had Friday off of work.

The library was only open 10-6 on Saturday, and we were there first thing looking through old classifieds on microfilm. After going through several Sunday papers, I found the ad in the March 15th, 1970 issue. Luckily it was distinctive - "Corvette '60 1st \$500 takes it" and the phone number. The ad was exactly as I remembered it.

CORVETTE '66 Fastback with power, \$2,250, 772-1791.

CORVETTE '60 — 1st \$500 takes it. 282-9144.

CORVETTE '66 Coupe—Low miles. Car show winner. \$2,400. Will trade for '68 or '69. 665-2520.

We printed it out, I was so excited, I finally had what I wanted. We were feeling pretty good, and Laura suggested that we cross reference the phone number to find the name & address, so I'll finally know where I bought the car. Would the information be available from 1970? Laura worked as a reference librarian assistant in college, and assured me that all the info is there, you just have to know where to look and have patience.

The librarians at the *Detroit Library* were extremely helpful. We looked up the info in *Bresser's Criss Cross*, but found that we needed the *Dearborn-Downriver* version, not the Detroit volumes. The librarian checked online and found the *Henry Ford Centennial Library* in Dearborn had the 1968 and '73 version, but not the 1970 version. We hoped that the previous car owner had lived there for at least a few years, so we could find his name. This library was only open until 5:00, and we only had that one day to be able to research it this trip. So we headed out on Michigan Avenue to Dearborn. We were excited and on a roll!To be continued next month.......

Secretary's Report – Linda Lewis


Announced the December birthdays.

I took my corvette out December 4 for its last run. I decided to leave the Boston area heading north on Interstate 3 and 93. Leaving the comforts of the interstate, I headed north into New Hampshire on Route 16 for the White Mountains. Temperature was around 35 in Conway NH. Heading further into the mountains, scenery rapidly changed, as did the weather. When I finally stopped (got pictures), temperature was now 24 degrees and snowing. I went about ten more miles up 16 when the ASR light came on. That was enough indication for me to turn around and head for warmer and snow free climate.



Sunday was spent cleaning both the interior and exterior to put the car up for the winter. She now sleeps in a garage, up on blocks (tires not on the ground), HEET and fuel stabilizer in the tank, battery removed and in the house, and radiator fluid to minus 30. Nice warm blanket protects the body. I will jump start her at least once every two weeks and hope that will keep everything lubricated. I have an oil warmer to install to at least keep the block warm.

Front tag had to be installed making the front end not look normal. But all is well, I have a corvette, others just wish they had one.

I will keep you posted on the hibernation of a corvette in New England in case another member decides to come this way.

To Pit or Not To Pit

The mid 70's saw QCCC very involved with the *National Council Of Corvette Clubs* and racing. Few would argue that *Darrell Kirkley* (a.k.a. Turkey or Turkley - the nickname came from Travis Meredith's 3 yr old daughter who could not say Kirkley so she called him Mr. Turkley which we all shortened to Turkey) was hands down the best we had on the track. He just seemed to have no fear and would push his cars to the limit. Plus he obviously had great skill. We often attributed it to his experience in Vietnam as a helicopter pilot.

Darrell is one of the most talented members QCCC has ever had with an array of auto skills. He could detail a car to better than showroom. His talents and time given to QCCC in the 70's were very instrumental in developing the club. We knew Darrell as always a happy go lucky fellow with a quick wit and full of pranks, but with a friendly side that was always there to help you with your Corvette. Everything Darrell did was all out, from detailing not only the corvette but also his old El Camino and trailer for racing.



In 1976 Darrell got the fever to go *SCCA* racing, having won everything at the club level. He took the *SCCA Drivers School* at the *Charlotte Motor Speedway* on April 17 of 76, and then acquired a semi restored '66 roadster from Richard Carter. The car was in primer and Richard had just put NOS fenders back on it, of course those got flared right back out for the big tires. It was a great looking race car, Sunfire Yellow with red accents and it was #66. He first took the car to Road Atlanta where he won his class and lapped everyone but the overall winner. Shortly thereafter he realized he needed a regular pit crew, so he enlisted *Bill Cruthis, Dollar Bill Ingram*, and *Dan Shaver*. We all agreed since he had great looking t-shirts for us with his car silk screened on the front. The four of us hung out a

lot and we were looking forward to the Road Atlanta trip. Over a beer at the clubhouse Dan Shaver asked Darrell on what laps would we be exchanging drivers? After a puzzled look, Darrell explained he drove and we changed the tires. So the pit crew disbanded before it got to the first race. It seems Shaver and Ingram did not care to only change tires. So Darrell continued on solo and finally tagged the wall head on which really destroyed the car. Since it was a self financing deal that put

an end to that and maybe a promising career. Today Darrell says he races for fun at the cart track at I-77 and I-85 where he still is top dog. The movies we have on disc now of the '70's show Turkley flying around in autocrosses and at the speedway. It is obvious he missed his calling. We will have future tales of Darrell where Charlotte's finest blue light squad also comes in second. He was a big part of QCCC in the 70's, a real character and a great friend. He has given us many laughs and a lot of fun memories. Darrell was a truly crazy "Corvetter" and Queen City Corvette Club is better off thanks to the Turkley.




Driving Spring Mountain

A First-Hand Account of Experiencing the Ron Fellows Performance Driving School


Last month we described our arrival and day one of our trip to Spring Mountain and spending three days driving ZR1s, Z06s and Grand Sports around the 2.2 mile 11 turn road course at the Ron Fellows Performance Driving School in Pahrump, Nevada. Day Two & Ron Fellows:



Bill Davidson's and my second day started out with a slightly faster pace than day one. Since we learned the rules, had toured the facilities and met the fine Spring Mountain staff on day one, we

jumped right in to class. More heel and toe practice, review of the 2.2 mile course, pointers on braking and shifting and visual skills review. This review time was obviously to allow the "students" to shake out the cobwebs from Monday night in Las Vegas (for those who indulged), ingest some




We learned very quickly that large quantities of water and Gatorade, coupled with the excitement of being where we were, made us forget about the heat and sun in the desert. We spent our longest period of time in the sun at the skid-pad. But with the humidity around 18% - 25%, the heat was really not a factor. There were two exercises and only one of our group of nine could be completing each at a time. The remaining seven watched our classmates skid and slide and patiently awaited our turns. The skip-pad was a large paved area on a very slight incline which allowed the water to run across the pad evenly. The Corvettes we drove had a thick coating of wax covering them. This was to keep the water from the skip-pad from spotting the finishes on the shiny Corvettes. One exercise was negotiating a figure-eight; the other was forcing the Corvette into a skid. Both were accomplished (and I use this term loosely) with the fuse to the Active Handling System removed. This was to familiarize



us with how the Corvette handled with no computer assistance...in other words, just how good we could handle the Corvette and manage a skid on our own. And this became a little interesting. Without going into great detail, I will say Bill did a very good job during his turn and only hit one or two cones if I remember correctly. I, on the other hand, unintentionally found out what the Nevada Mountain scenery looked like out the windshield during a full 360° spin. Too bad it happened so fast I couldn't enjoy it. But all in all, I think we were surprised at how well we could maintain control of the Corvette in a skid without computer assist. I will also note here that, luckily, no instructors were lost during this exercise either.

Next came some shadow-lapping. A longer track session allowed us to "shadow" an instructor by following him around the course to observe exactly how he hit the apexes and negotiated each turn. The instructor also "shadowed" each of us, all the while talking to us via the in-car radios giving pointers on how we could improve our track-time by tweaking this and



adjusting that. Now the class was really getting interesting because the pace continued to pick up each time we took laps. Shadowing the instructors "at speed" was an eye-opener and really helped confidence levels. We also took a few laps with an instructor driving. And I thought we were fast! Watching the instructor using all the techniques we were learning at what appeared to be wide open, all the while talking us through each turn was a great experience. It showed us just how slow we were really going! I asked the instructor to estimate how close to the limit he pushed the Corvette around the course and his answer was "about 60%"! Oh my! For a little taste of how the instructors drive the course, click here to watch Ron Fellows take a lap in a ZR1. Make sure you watch it in full-screen mode with your sound turned way up!



At this point, I need to comment on how welcomed the wives were by the Spring Mountain staff during the 3 day course. The wives could eat lunch with us each day in the clubhouse and watch us drive from various points around the track. This allowed them to snap many photos and capture the experience in an even more memorable way. The wives also had the opportunity, if they chose to, to take a few laps with an instructor "at speed". This was very interesting. Julia and Peggy had a blast and the experience gave them an even better appreciation of the Corvette's capability.

Day two turned out to be more strenuous, more intense, and with more techniques to absorb into our already full slate of things to remember. But it was a joy and again, we hated for it to end even though we were very tired, physically and mentally. The class did end with a small disappointment, however. As I said in the Day One coverage, our instructor told us Ron Fellows may be stopping by because he had to be in Las Vegas Wednesday for the Barrett-Jackson Auction. He did not make it to our class on Tuesday. But we were in for a pleasant surprise later that afternoon.

Late Tuesday afternoon, the four of us sat on the patio at the condos enjoying "dust cutters" and sharing opinions of the day's activities with a few other students and their wives. We noticed an SUV pull up to our building and a very familiar figure get out of the driver's seat. Ron Fellows and his brother Rob, a professional driver and artist, arrived to spend the night at the condo two doors down from us. Both were to be at the Barrett-Jackson Auction in Las Vegas the next day. They stopped to chat with us, pose for pictures, and sign a few autographs. After meeting Ron and Rob Fellows and seeing how personable and appreciative they are it became even easier to understand why we are such fans of the Corvette, Corvette Racing and everything associated with it. Corvette folks are just special folks!


