QCCC is a non-profit club (501-C7) whose members all share a common appreciation and love of America's Sports Car – the Corvette. Dues and donations are not tax deductible. In addition to various social activities for members, QCCC raises money for and participates with various local charities. We strive to promote exciting, safe and fun ways to enjoy our Corvettes. We hold business meetings on the second Saturday of each month. Our monthly business meeting usually incorporates social time. Our socials are always fun and are focused around fellowship, food & drink. We've had swimming parties, bar-b-ques, cookouts, day cruises and weekend trips. ### A man, a wish, and an Electron Blue Corvette



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# The Wave

## With the Vice President Bill Rambo



We begin the New Year with a new QCCC Board and a New C-7. First, I want to say how proud I am to be serving with this fine group and the best Corvette club in the area. I am amazed at every meeting of the number of guests and new members voted in. The generations of Corvettes are extensive, as the wealth of knowledge each person has of their cars.

But foremost, I want to personally thank everyone in the club for your outpouring of support, prayers, calls and wishes. When I decided to participate and be your VP, I knew this this was a great club to be in. But after what I just went through, you proved another thing...family! I was supported by all the families, and I will do my best for you. I am and will be forever grateful.

I will be working closely with our new President, Keith Cross, in assuring the best possible meeting places. I want to hear your ideas and I want the QCCC to be seen across the region. Our meetings are important; it brings fellowship to the club, especially in these cold months ahead, so the locations and activities should be exciting.

I found some interesting history to share. Astronaut Alan Shepard, a long time Corvette owner, was invited by then GM Chief Engineer Zora Arkus-Duntov to drive pre-production Corvette models. General Motors executives later gave Shepard a 1972 model with a Bill Mitchell interior. Jim Rathmann, a Melbourne, Florida Chevrolet dealer and winner of the 1960 Indy 500, befriended astronauts Shepard, Gus Grissom, and Gordon Cooper. Rathman convinced GM President Ed Cole to set up a program which supplied each astronaut with a pair of new cars each year. Most chose a family car for their wives and a Corvette for themselves. In his memoir, *Last Man On The Moon*, Gene Cernan describes how this worked. The astronauts received brand-new Corvettes which they were given the option to purchase at a 'used' price after they'd been driven 3000 miles. Alan Bean recalls Corvettes lined up in the parking lot outside the astronaut offices at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, and friendly races between Shepard and Grissom along the Florida beach roads and

beaches themselves as local police turned a blind eye. Shepard, Grissom and Cooper even pulled each other on skis in the shallow water. The Mercury and later astronauts were unofficially tied to the Corvette and appeared in official photographs with their cars and with mock-ups of space vehicles such as the Lunar Module or Lunar Rover. Cooper talked of the races along Cocoa Beach in his eulogy of Shepard at the Johnson Space Center in 1998.

## STRANDED

When Brillo Pad arrived in Charlotte in December 74, he immediately struck up friendships with the concourse group in QCCC. He had brought with him a pristine 70 coupe that was a multiple show winner including Bloomington Gold the second year of that shows existence. Dollar Bill Ingram was the club champion as a wheeler-dealer; he always could find great rare cars in excellent condition. As always, impromptu plans for adventure were derived at the clubhouse bar, on Wednesday keg night, without a lot of forethought or planning. In March of 75, Dollar had just obtained a terrific 67 big block coupe, silver with a black stinger, side pipes, aluminum wheels, the whole package. He approached Brillo and Turkley at the bar with what seemed like a splendid idea. There was a huge car show at Capital Chevrolet in Washington DC. Since his parents lived in Arlington Virginia, it would be perfect for us to drive up after work on Friday and use their house as base camp. We would get mom's home cooking and use the carport and driveway to prep the cars. To Brillo, it sounded like a great, cheap way to win another car show, since he was undefeated at that time. The plans were finalized (probably after a few too many brewskies) and it was agreed that Turkley would transport Dollar's 67 on his trailer behind Darrel's El Camino. Brillo would transport on his Ii-9 bulldozer trailer. (Trav is still humored by Brillo's 3500 lb Corvette on a 6000 lb trailer being pulled by a 74 Ranchero). We were to leave Dollar's place early afternoon and travel up I 85 toward DC. When Brillo arrived there was a hitch, and Dollar insisted we stop by Lapointe Chevrolet and see our guy Puckett in the parts department for a last minute need for his 67. Remember, Brillo had only been in Charlotte since December and was not very familiar with downtown Charlotte. So off we go, on Friday afternoon, to Lapointe Chevrolet where Turkley pulls right in with his rig but there is nowhere for Brillo to land. (Aren't these people supposed to work until 5 p.m.? Then what is all this traffic?) It seemed to Bill, the thing to do with all this traffic and no place to park, was to keep circling until they were ready to leave. But after several laps around all the one way streets the Kirkley rig was gone and nowhere to be found. Since this was before cell phones and we had no CB radios, Brillo had a small town panic attack and decided to find I-85 and try to catch up with them. Keep in mind, he was not driving a rig that was much good at high speed and he had no idea the address of Dollar's parents. Brillo tried speeding up and slowing down, but no sign of them. He then decided to pull off into a rest area where a state trooper was sitting. He told the trooper his tale and was assured via radio that the El Camino would be spotted and they would get us together. Now Darrel does not remember this part, but they lit him up with the blue lights and this time he could not run due to the trailer he was pulling. (Only someone who has seen a lot of blue lights would be able to forget such a thing--all true) It was decided Brillo was in the lead and would wait at the rest stop where they were united. We had a great time at Dollar's and spent Saturday detailing the cars. (See picture of Dollar and Brillo with a rally cap on his head, with the 70 and the enormous trailer). On Sunday a.m. we trailered down to Capital where we found a huge show. They were giving some great plaques to the winners. They photographed your car and somehow scanned the photo on the plaque so it looked like a negative. Brillo was excited about getting one of those plaques. Then Sunday late afternoon, the awards were handed out. Dollar got best of show, Brillo got nothing. We got back late Sunday night, and due to being 27 years old, we were not

even tired. Today we would need a week to recover. Brillo is not much on all this new technology but says a cell phone back then would have sure made life easier. Of course the next Wednesday night, at the clubhouse, Bill took it on the chin for his effort. There was much laughter at his expense but we believe Dollar bought a few rounds for the loser.



## Belk Scout Camp – Midland, NC

Belk Scout Camp is located east of Mint Hill on 286 acres of pines, hardwoods, and open fields with two major streams located on the property. The camp is located at the easternmost point of Mecklenburg County and has property located in Mecklenburg, Union and Cabarrus counties. We will be meeting in the Dining Hall that can seat 400 scouts. This is not an outdoor shelter but a very nice fully equipped facility that has full amenities. Yes that means lights, heat and indoor plumbing. The interior roads at the camp are well maintained gravel roads. But due to these roads being gravel your Corvettes are optional for this meeting.
