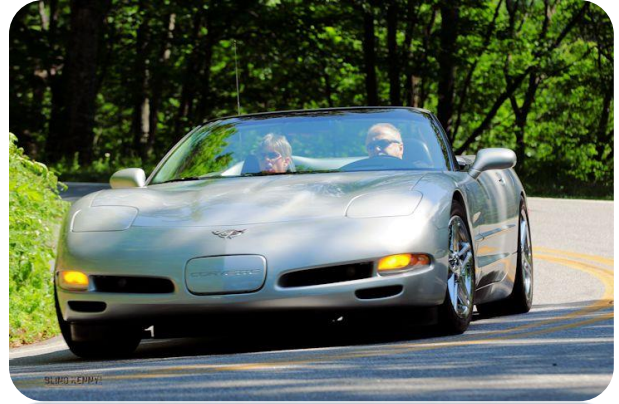
To become a member of the [QUEEN CITY CORVETTE CLUB](#), you must own

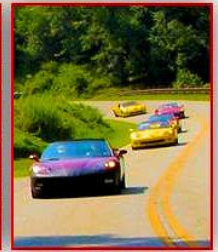

More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



BLAZING BIG-BLOCKS: THE 1972 NCCC CONVENTION

The year was 1971 and QCCC was an energetic group of about 20 young men, and their girl friends and wives. Events centered around social activities; an annual Christmas party, road trips to the beach and mountains and a fun rally. The only exposure to the National Council of Corvette Clubs was the articles in *Corvette News* magazine. That publication also listed all of the clubs in the country and that is how Don and Mary Francis found QCCC. Don and Mary had just moved to Charlotte from Michigan (our first token Yankee), where they were very active with a large Corvette club that participated on a national and regional level in NCCC. He immediately started a campaign to get us to join. QCCC member Billy Coates knew two Corvette racers from Greenville, SC who raced in SCCA and NCCC events. Sam Henderson raced a 64 fuel injected Corvette and Fitzhugh Williams a 67 big block. They agreed to meet with interested members of QCCC at a restaurant on South Tryon Street and presented all of the advantages of joining NCCC. A proposal to join was approved at the next club meeting and we were hooked. Soon QCCC purchased timing equipment and was hosting parking lot solo events, drag races, rallies, car shows and even an economy run, as well as attending similar events hosted by other clubs in the region. All were sanctioned by NCCC. It seemed like there was an event somewhere nearly every weekend and QCCC's involvement grew and grew.

The NCCC national convention was being held in Dallas, Texas in July of 1972 and it wasn't long before the road trip to Dallas was being planned. Enthusiasm soared but as the trip neared, the drop out rate of participants rose and QCCC wound up with five couples committing to go. Don and his very pregnant wife, Mary, were driving his Olds Delta 88 because Mary said she couldn't survive the trip in their 67 coupe with no air. Sharon and I decided to hitch a ride with them since my 64 was fun from stop light to stop light, but with 2-4's and a low rear gear, a bit much to take on a loooong road trip. Jim and Patty Whitley drove their 69 coupe, Buzz and Barbara Cagle drove their highly modified 67 427 coupe, and Robert and Sharon Scognamillo drove their 67 427/435 roadster. I might mention this is the same Robert that was the Corvette mechanic at City Chevrolet since the wheel was invented.

We set out early Saturday morning, thru the North Carolina Mountains, across Tennessee to Memphis, where we spent the night. The next morning we were back on I40 to Dallas. The trip was especially slow, trying to caravan without the aid of cell phones or CB radios and frequent gas and rest room stops (lots of those, remember, we're traveling with a very pregnant woman and cars that got 10mpg). The trip became very boring and we were all wondering if this was really such a good idea, especially those in the 427 cars.

We were about 120 miles from Dallas on a stretch of I40, which I swear was so straight you could see Mexico, when Robert faded back almost out of sight. Wondering if he was having trouble, we slowed up a bit. Then we saw the speck in the distance getting larger fast. What the hell was he doing? Turns out he was so bored cruising 5mph over the speed limit he decided to turn it loose. I might add he had installed a 3:08 rear end for the trip, so his big block had an amazing top end. He passed us like we were backing up with his side pipes singing at about 6 grand. When we caught him, many miles down the road, we saw that he had pulled over on the shoulder and had the hood up. Of course we all stopped and Robert informed us that the 427 had developed a terrible internal knock. He had spun a bearing. Now what?

As we pondered our options, it became obvious that Robert's 67 was not going to make it to Dallas under its own power. Buzz volunteered to go for help, so we all waited on the side of the road for what must have been over an hour. 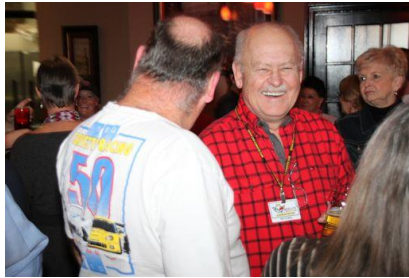

Finally, we were back on the road to Dallas.

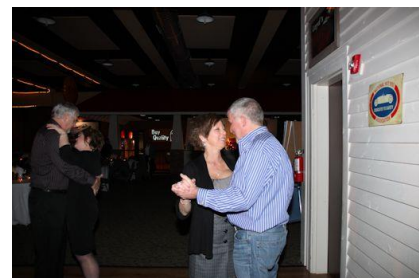
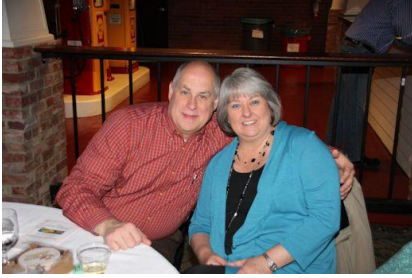

The new racing Corvette showed promise with impressive speed and economy ahead of its full-season campaign in North America's new sports car racing championship.

The No. 4 Corvette C7.R of Oliver Gavin, Tommy Milner and Robin Liddell led the Corvette Racing effort placed a disappointing fifth in the GT Le Mans class following a problem with the car's gearbox with less than three hours to go. Milner, running second at the time, was chasing the eventual race-winning car when the Corvette's gearbox temperature rose dramatically. Milner went directly to the garage where the team diagnosed the problem as a transmission bearing failure. The Corvette Racing crew switched out the gearbox in 30 minutes and sent Milner back to the race.
