

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
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V P Report Bill Cruthis

When I first graduated college and bought my first Corvette (a 68 used one) the problem we all had was getting insurance. It seems they looked at us as young hooligans with hotrods. I was finally able to land coverage by Farm Bureau for a hefty fee. Six months later, (about January 1970), my bill came in the mail and the premiums had almost doubled. I thought this a little high for a 68 Corvette with a 327/350hp car and a very clean driving record. After writing my check I proceeded to draft a letter to Farm Bureau informing them of the wrongfulness in their process, and that they should view records more closely than the automobile. Welcome to QCCC / City Chevrolet All Chevy Car Show. We hope you have an entertaining and rewarding experience with us today. The following items are to help you through the judging process and to provide you with a path if you should have any questions or comments. Thank you for taking time with us today and we hope you enjoy the show.

- Registration will begin at 8:00 AM and end at 11:00 AM. Judging will start at 10:00 AM. Place your dash card, with your number on it, on the dash and visible through the windshield. <u>Have your judging sheet filled out and ready for the judges.</u> When your car is ready to be judged open your hood, trunk and doors. Please put your rags down when the judge approaches your car.
- You must be at your car during judging unless you are scheduled for the Hendrick Museum Tour, in which case you should assign someone to care for your car or leave your car unlocked, hood up and trunk up for judging. Make sure you leave your judging sheet on your seat and your dash card visible. Judges may ask you to show them areas not readily visible without your assistance. If you are not present when your car is being judged, your car will be judged as is and it will be your responsibility to contact the judges if you would like to be re-judged. Your car will be judged independently by two qualified judges. QCCC cars are judged separately in their own class and do not compete with non-members cars.
- Once your car has been judged we will place a small round dot on the driver's side windshield for identification.
- Should judging result in a tie, a second team of judges will resolve the issue.
- If you have a misunderstanding with a judge, do not argue the point with them. Please pass your concerns on to the chief judge or the chairman of the show.



With the Vintage Gang: Bill Cruthis, Richard Craig, Darrell Kirkley & Travis Meredith More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



THE ODD COUPLE

I have written before that when I moved from Illinois to Charlotte in December of 1974, the first person I met in all of Charlotte was Shad Alberty. As I progressed along Independence Boulevard in my Ranchero with the split window coupe on the trailer, I was as anxious as a long tail cat in a room full of rocking chairs. Coming from a town of 7000, I was in awe of the big city and looking back I probably would have turned tail and run for home in about six months as I would surely have had serious bouts of loneliness.

But at the corner of Hawthorne and Independence a vellow 71 Corvette convertible pulled up next to me and asked where I was going with that classic. I said just moved into town and was headed to a rental house. Shad said come by the Corvette Club Clubhouse Wednesday nite and I will buy you a beer. It is right down here on the left at the corner of Westover and Independence. I was so nervous that I went on Monday nite, knocked on the door, a young lady came to the door as they were having a baby shower. I was told to come back on Wednesday nite when the guys would be here having a beer. As you read this, remember, it happened at a red light. Check Chris Wood article in the last newsletter where he cites 49% of new members come from referrals by present members. Here is one from 1974 As I joined QCCC in 1974, the clubhouse became the watering hole where we would hang out and talk cars. There was a bar in the back bedroom with a keg, a kitchen devoid of furniture and likewise for the dining room. The front room housed only a juke box and a vinyl couch. I vividly remember the man in the yellow 71 Corvette was always dancing in the living room. He would Shag with all the ladies most often to the tune of 60 minute man. As I got to know Shad and Brenda Alberty it was apparent that they were our senior mentors. The average age of the membership was about 27 while they were pushing 40. Why did they hang with us? They were young at heart and always Shag Dancing. In fact it was Shad that got us to Shag Dancing in the west bound lanes of Independence Boulevard. Back in the mid 70's the boulevard was 4 lanes with a 2 foot median in the middle. There were many Saturday nites that we would stop by the clubhouse for a few beers, Shad and Brenda would crank the volume of the juke box up leave the front door open and we would Shag in the street until a car would come by. My how things have changed on the Boulevard.

One particular Wednesday nite (could have been any Wednesday nite) I had stopped by for our usual kegger nite. I had come from my basketball league and was dressed in sweats and sneakers. Many beers later we were all preparing to leave and standing by the Corvettes. Shad was taking his usual ribbing about being an old man and not able to hang at the bar or anywhere else with us young athletic types. At which time he proceeded to challenge ol' Brillo Pad to a foot race. Now the "Shadster" was wearing his penny loafers (perfect for shaggin' but not so good in a foot race). So the Brillo Pad accepted the challenge and a wager was made of who could be the first to reach the next intersection up Westover Road. A city block at age 27, even with beer on board, vs a 40 year old dancing queen should not be much of a challenge. So Brillo Pad thought this would be a cake walk until the word go was hollered. Yikes that old man can flat out run. Brillo got beat by at least a third of a block and had to pay up. I will tell you, if you want to lose weight just shag dance for about 4 hours a nite. Now it was Brillo's turn to take the ribbing which did go on for months. Relief finally came that summer when QCCC had its annual river party. At that time Jeff Tater (Silver Cloud) who also fancied himself an athlete decided to mess with Shad. During the egg toss he purposefully pelted Shad with a raw egg,

at which time Shad proceeded to pick up a hand full of watermelon, chase down the Silver Cloud, and wash his face with it. I think from that point on our senior couple became our heroes and we were always proud to have them as our substitute parents. Both were remarkably funny and entertaining, yet they kept us on the straight and narrow.

We have been in touch with Brenda lately and hope to have her attend an event soon. Sadly we lost Shad many years ago. But if you get to Myrtle Beach and get into Shag Dancing you will meet many, many folks that he taught to dance and he is in the Shag Dancer's hall of fame. He was the best and because he worked at it, although he smoked heavily, he was still in good enough shape to shame a couple of athlete wanna' bees almost 15 years younger. I am tellin' you this man could flat out run. He could not drive a lick and Brenda won all the autocross trophies as she was outstanding. So the early days of QCCC we learned to respect our elders and what fun they brought to the new and fledgling group.

So today we salute the Alberty's. What a great and fun couple, a huge part of the success of QCCC in the 70's.

The Camaro lost its luster quickly. It seemed everywhere we went there were Corvettes - at the beach, at the shopping malls, and even in the parking lots at Disney World. There were Corvette car shows almost every weekend from September through April, and it seemed we'd happen on them no matter where we went – on the pier in St. Pete, at St. Armand's Circle in Sarasota, and even at the BBQ Festival at the Vinoy.

As he checked out the Corvettes, Jack's eyes would get large – just like a kid admiring all of the presents under the Christmas tree. It wasn't long before he was coming home with Corvette magazines and our coffee table was a display of Corvette literature. Jack was putting together his wish list of option packages, color preferences, and articles on the C5. Before I could ask him whether or not he was going to "bite the bullet" and get one, he presented me with the sales order signed and sealed – just waiting for the delivery. So long Camaro, HELLO Corvette!

Jack was like a Dad-to-be waiting for his first child to be born. He was checking with the dealer constantly to find out where his car was in the production schedule. In early September 2001, Jack drove his "hot off the assembly line" Magnetic Red 5C Convertible into the driveway. I'd never seen a more proud Papa! He was beaming from ear-to-ear.

The Fever didn't stop there! Jack wanted his car personalized, one that would stand out in a crowd and be noticed. After all, in Florida it seemed that the highly customized cars won the trophies. He painstakingly checked out all of the winning cars and researched which shops had the best ratings and performed the best work. Walter Ahrens BD: 11-16-14. Born and raised in Canada. Came to the US in his early years to work for the Fischer Body division of General Motors.

My Dad also started his own insurance agency, Ahrens Mutual Agency, which sold car and home insurance from Michigan Millers Insurance Company. He would work at his job at GM during the day, then come home, have dinner, and work in his home office. He has been retired from GM, collecting a pension for more years than he ever worked there.

He bought his first C3 Corvette Stingray, a blue convertible, sometime between 1969 and 1973. My Mother, Marge, was mad he bought it. She refused to drive it or ride in it, referring to it as "like another woman". He sold it when the new cars came out, and went back to purchasing traditional Oldsmobiles and Cadillacs

My Dad loved that car, but would not let me (a teen-ager at the time) drive it with the top down, because it would get dust inside. I think he let me drive it only a few times. And he finally let me drive it with the top down once or twice.

Today he says it was a great car, and brags that he sold it for more money than he bought it. Back then, GM employees got a tremendous discount on fleet cars. An employee could place an order for a specific color car, with any or all options, that would be ordered and placed in the GM fleet, to be driven by privileged executives. Usually after a few hundred miles, sometimes less, the company would then remove it from the fleet and sell it to the employee that ordered it. Dad got a new car every year and, in most years, he ended up selling the car for more than he paid for it, or at least breaking even. In essence, he got the use of a new car for free, year after year. It was always fun to sit at the kitchen table and pick out the new color exterior and interior and the optional features!

He never bought another Corvette until after my Mother died. He bought his silver and burgundy 1982 Corvette after moving to Charlotte in the late 90's. His son-in-law, my husband, Stephen, drove with him to Ringgold, GA to pick it up, after finding it on-line.

I attribute my Dad's longevity to the fact that he stays active, has an incredible memory, and loves to have a drink, and laugh.

He is still adamant about driving. He argues with me that he is a better driver than a 16 year old. The jury is still out.
