





More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past

QCCC Vintage Member Profile: David and Lydia Morse

It was 1971 that car enthusiast David Morse was selling cars part time at the Lincoln-Mercury dealer in Charlotte, when he purchased a 1966 300HP 4 speed Corvette trade in. The blue on blue one owner roadster had about 20,000 miles and was completely original and unmolested. Later that year Dave and wife Lydia learned about QCCC and joined.

From the very beginning, Dave was a very active and enthusiastic member and as the club's racing involvement grew, his competitive nature was revealed. QCCC had at that time some very proficient autocrossers, unfortunately Dave wasn't one of them. He always drove





beyond his and his car's limits and it wasn't long before he earned the CB handle of "Capt'n Crunch". His poor 66 took the brunt of the abuse even after he modified it with special suspension, wider wheels and tires and engine up grades. And to make it worse, after one of his accidents, he had the car painted a color he described as "bronze", but it was only two shades lighter than turd brown. At least it made him easy to identify on the starting line so you could get out of the way.

He bought Lydia a new silver C3 automatic and at a low speed parking lot event at Eastland Mall (while his 66 was being repaired) he slid broad side into a curb and folded both left side wheels under the car. Another Morse car in the shop. Even though he tore up more cars than Kyle Petty, he never got upset or discouraged, he would just smile and talk about how much fun he was having.

At an event at Charlotte Motor Speedway, we learned by accident that ole Dave was follically challenged (he was just in his late 20's). Always willing to help out, he jumped in the back of a pickup truck to go to the scene of a problem on the track. With 6' 4" Dave standing up in the back facing the wind, his hair piece did a "wheelie" to the middle of his head. When the truck stopped the rug gently laid back on top of his head and he was never the wiser. Later that year, on the club's annual beach trip, someone slipped into Dave's room and stole his attachment tape, covered it with sand and put it back. The next morning, Lydia came down and said that she and Dave would skip breakfast with the club, and she left. Later that morning Dave came down, every hair in place, perfect in fact, and he never said a word. Those responsible were never caught and prosecuted.

When QCCC acquired the clubhouse on Independence Blvd., Dave was tireless helping fix the place up, and when it was decided to build a bar in the back room, he volunteered. We were skeptical at first not knowing if he had any carpentry skills (and equating that to his driving skills), but when he said he would pay for all the materials, he was given the approval. It turns out the only thing he could drive was a nail. He did a beautiful job and the first toast was to him.

David contributed greatly to the success of QCCC in those formative years. He represented the club at

National Council and was elected QCCC's President in 1975. He was one of the main organizers of the NCCC convention held in Charlotte in 1978. His tireless leadership was contagious and it was with great sorrow for the club that he took a career path that moved him and Lydia to Texas, where they still live today.

And the "cherry" 66 he started with? He spun out racing at Charlotte Motor Speedway, backed into the guard rail, spun back around and went head first into the opposite guard rail. The only parts not damaged were the two doors. It was eventually repaired, but its fate is not known. I like to think it's one of the "all original" examples being sold at Barrett Jackson.

Corvette Racing's next event is the Mobil 1 Twelve Hours of Sebring presented by Fresh from Florida on Saturday, March 21.

CORVETTE RACING AT DAYTONA: Rolex 24 GTLM Win for Corvette C7.R

Corvette Racing returned to Victory Lane for the Rolex 24 at Daytona on Sunday, scoring a hard-earned GT Le Mans class victory in the opening race of the 2015 TUDOR United Sports Car Championship. Antonio Garcia, Jan Magnussen and Ryan Briscoe won in their No. 3 Chevrolet Corvette C7.R in Corvette Racing's second race back at Daytona since 2001.

Garcia crossed the finish line by 0.478 seconds. The winning trio completed 725 laps – 2,581 miles - for the team's second Rolex 24 victory. Corvette Racing captured and Rolex 24 overall win 14 years ago but



didn't race at Daytona again until last season in the first race for the TUDOR Championship as well as the Corvette C7.R.

GTLM pole-sitter Oliver Gavin, Tommy Milner and Simon Pagenaud placed third in class following a strong run.
