Politics: Let's not even go there. What a bunch of weasels on both sides. I refuse to watch 535 people ruin the lives of 320 million.



Remembering Carl Brown

Carl Brown, 68, one of the founding members of QCCC passed away Friday, March 20, 2015. He was a Charlotte native and attended Garinger High School and Furman University. His obituary in the Charlotte Observer stated that he had a passion for bottled Cheerwine (his father was the local Cheerwine bottler), guns, cars, and million dollar boats. He is survived by his wife, two children and seven grandchildren. He lived in Fort Mill, SC.

Carl was a year ahead of me at Garinger, and if I remember correctly, had the only Corvette in the school parking lot. I believe it was a 59 or 60. In 1966 he bought a new yellow Corvette roadster and it was a common sight to see cruising North Charlotte with the top down. In 1968, along with his high school buddy Earl Ferrell, who was responsible for the initial idea of forming the Queen City Corvette Club, they hammered out the bi-laws and were the first officers of the club. I didn't know Carl very well, he left the club shortly before I came in, but I spoke to him on the phone a little more than a year ago as I was researching the club's early history. He was excited to hear of the club's continued success and could not believe the membership numbers. Carl recalled with a laugh how he and Earl struggled getting members and some of the things they did to recruit. On days off, they would go by the Chevrolet dealers and hang out waiting to approach Corvette owners coming in for service. They had cards printed and placed them under the wipers of parked Corvettes. They studied Corvette News articles about other clubs to get clues about how to run a club. Not one of them had any experience with anything like this, so they were learning on the job. But as the club started to grow, some internal problems developed. The club struggled with it's identity and what behavior should be tolerated. At that point in time, open containers were common and a full cooler was essential. Many of the club functions looked like a rolling frat party, even tho I don't recall anyone being hurt or getting into serious trouble. Carl did say that when he resigned in 1970, it was because he felt that the partying had gotten out of hand. He apparently was more mature than his years back then. When I thanked him for his efforts in starting the club, he graciously gave Earl all of the credit, saying he was just glad to help.

As club historian, I feel it is important to remember those who were instrumental in the formation, growth and success of the club, as well as documenting the trials and tribulations of the club thru the years. Even tho he was a member only a short time, we should not forget the contributions of former members such as Carl.

Our condolences to the Brown family.
