

Love 'em, cherish 'em, drive 'em. It'll make you and your car smile.





More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



Vintage QCCC Cars of the 70's

Even as the new C3 Corvettes were selling like hot cakes in the Chevy showrooms, enthusiast knew that the C2s, or mid-years as they were referred to, were something special. These cars were very affordable, plentiful, easily maintained and relatively cheap to modify to suit the owners' wants. And members of QCCC backed then owned a bevy of great C2's. So let's look at some member's cars in the mid 70's.

As the C2's evolved, the 1967 model was always recognized as the cream of the crop. QCCC member Robert Scognamillo (the same that works on your Vette at City Chevy today), purchased a nice 427/435 67 roadster in 1970. It was blue with blue interior and a vinyl removable hardtop. He did not like the color so his buddies in the body shop went to work. He chose a 69 Chevy color, autumn gold. The blue interior was died black and a moon roof was cut into the vinyl top. He had an American flag painted on the rear deck and buried it under many coats of clear lacquer. As the car was nearing completion, he was offered the unheard of amount of \$600 for the engine. He sold it and rebuilt a 396/375 engine he had out of his 69 Chevelle that had been totaled and installed it in the 67. It had the 67 bolt on aluminum wheels which he later sold to purchase a set of original 66 knock offs and factory side exhausts. He drove the car daily and participated in every kind of club event, from car shows to drag racing, autocross, and even road trips. If you go to the "Vintage" articles in the February and March 2014 newsletter, you can read about the adventure Robert had going to the NCCC convention in the summer of 1972. Unfortunately a divorce forced Robert to sell the 67 to a former QCCC member, who we believe still has the car.

Another QCCC 67 was the red coupe belonging to Ward "Buzz" Cagle. Buzz found this car sitting in the back lot at Young Ford, a rejected trade in with a blown 427/435 engine. It was yellow with factory bolt on wheels and side exhausts. NASCAR engine builder Jim Newcomb built Buzz a monster 427 for the 67, and he had the color changed to rally red under tons of clear lacquer. Buzz was in the car detail business, so the finish on this car was unbelievable. He had an aftermarket air conditioning unit installed in the back of the coupe. This may sound weird now with vintage air units available, but this under the dash unit fit well in the back. Like Robert, he swapped the bolt on wheels for 66 knock offs. At the time no one liked the bolt ons because the feds outlawed the ko spinners. This car was voted "most popular car" for years at the annual QCCC awards banquet and Buzz finally got an offer that he couldn't refuse and sold the car. He has tried to locate the car for years to buy back, but to no avail.

Finally, short time member Doug McSwain had a black on black 67 2 top roadster with a gold stinger

and factory side exhaust. Doug was employed at the GM parts warehouse that was on I85 back then and had access to all the good stuff. He installed a crate 1970 LS7 454 and a M22 rock crusher 4 speed transmission. One of the few events he participated in were the drags at Charlotte Motor Speedway in 1972 where he had fastest time of the day by over .5 seconds. In the low gears, you could hear the transmission whine over the side exhausts. When GM closed the I85 warehouse, it is believed he moved to Atlanta. The competition was glad.

In the rich history of QCCC, there have been some unbelievable cars, as unique as their owners. These modern classics were played with with no regard at the time of their future potential value, just a bunch of gear heads having fun. Next month we'll look at other fantastic club cars from the 70's.


