

And while you can, get out there in that left lane and hammer down!!!






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'Twas the Month We Had Christmas









Insider trading gets juicy in the





More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



Club Cars of the 70's: C-3s

This month we look at some of the C3 Corvettes that were owned by QCCC's members in the 70's. Obviously these cars were very popular since they were the current models, but true to the personality of the club, they were as unique as their owners.

Many of these were high option cruisers equipped with automatic transmissions, air conditioning, leather interior; loaded. These cars were great for road trips and as daily drivers, but it was not unusual to see them participate in competition events where they became very competitive in their own classes. It was the best of both worlds for these owners. Jim Whitley's 69, Wayne Marlowe's 71, Darrell Kirkley's 73, Shad Alberty's banana, and many others fell in this category. But the club also had its share of high performance C3's.

Melvin Pace ordered a brand new red on red 1968 coupe loaded with performance options: 427 435 horsepower engine, 4 speed with a 4.11 rear end. His tag said "POP TOP"; not sure if that was because of the removable roof panels or his devotion to Budweiser. When he joined QCCC in 1972, he immediately started modifying his car with Hooker headers, wider wheels and tires, L88 cam, Edelbrock intake and a huge Holley 4 barrel carb. He raced the car in our drags, autocross, parking lot events, and still didn't miss any road trips, cruises or gas stations. Later he added L88 flares and hood, a rear deck spoiler and had the car painted maroon with black stripes. Always a crowd pleaser, all he had to do is fire it up with open headers to attract attention. His burnouts were famous. At a parking lot event at UNCC sponsored by a student car club (MG's and Datsun Z's), he recognized that the course was so tight that he had no chance. When it came Melvin's turn, he revved it up, turned it loose and cleaned out the first four gates. Pilons everywhere. The pa announcer said," there folks, goes your typical big block Corvette". We weren't invited back. Melvin still owns this car and we are trying to get him involved in the club again.

George McCleod had a 1970 coupe with a highly modified 454, with a 4 speed and chrome side mounted headers. He was crazy (see September 2010 Vintage article) competitive and gave Melvin his most competition. At a drag race in Spartanburg he shows up with some slicks. So Melvin borrowed some slicks for his car to remain competitive, except they were too tall for his L88 flares. No problem, he takes a hack saw and saws off the bottom of the flares for clearance. I don't remember who won, but it got serious for a while.

Current President Bill Cruthis had a beautiful silver 1970 coupe with a 350 horsepower 4 speed. I saw it on the road twice, it was that nice. Jerry Daugherty bought a brand new '73 silver roadster, L82 4 speed; Richard Breyare had a fast 69 350 HP 4 speed with 2 tops, and Bill Henderson, his C3 painted maroon with black cob webbing, hence his handle "Spiderman", had a wild Billy Coats built small block. Dan Warren had a black on black '69 coupe with a 427 435 4 speed with red pin stripping all over. Danny Canup had a '69 roadster with a black vinyl hard top, 350 HP and 4 speed

with chrome Hooker side exhausts. Don Francis had a nice '67 big block coupe when he moved south in 1971, but the new car fever got the best of him and he ordered a bright yellow '72 coupe with an LT1 4 speed. It was impressively fast for a low compression engine.

But the best LT1 in the club at the time belonged to our own "Dollar" Bill Ingram. He found a loaded gray 72 coupe that was very rare as it had factory air conditioning. He won his class in the Corvette Porsche Challenge and was very competitive in every event he entered.

But the C3 to end all, was a full custom built by Steve Burleson as a contender for the ISCA show car circuit. This car was so radical that we will explore it in detail in a future vintage article complete with a video.

The club cars of that era were frequently modified to suit the owners' whims, paint and body as well as mechanically, not many remained totally stock. Engines and mechanical parts were used and abused, replaced and modified. And no one ever mentioned "matching numbers". It was a different time and the young Corvette owners in the club in the 70's did a lot without a lot of resources. But we recognized that the times were changing and that included the price of our toys. As I had a whopping 2,300 dollars invested in my '64, I remember seeing Jeff Tatar's brand new '75 Corvette's window sticker, way over \$7,000.00, and commenting, "what in the hell is the world coming to?" I didn't have a clue.

We have full access to the track for as long as the soldiers want to ride, usually until lunch. We usually had 15 cars go out at a time. The only rules on the track were no stopping and no passing. Since you sign the waiver, you can drive at the speed you are comfortable with unless limited by the driver in front of you. The track will humble you if you decide to get stupid beyond your capabilities. The reaction of these young soldiers riding in several generations of Corvettes is worth the trip by itself. All drivers enjoy a free lunch at the museum and then tour the factory if signed up for that option. Our guest speaker at the luncheon was Gerald York, grandson of WWI hero Alvin York. This year the dinner after the first day was hosted by the local VFW.

The museum schedules several activities on the second day for those that choose to participate. This year we had the option of touring Shaker Village or Jefferson Monument. Both tours then met for a fantastic lunch at Federal Grove. Friday night they hold the banquet at the museum. This year the speaker was former Corvette Plant Manager Wil Cooksey.

The event culminates on Saturday with all the Corvettes participating in the Bowling Green Veteran's Day parade. It is quite a sight seeing all these Vettes decorated and driving in two rows downtown with the crowd waving and taking pictures.
