



When I sold my '63 coupe I thought I needed the money to buy the '06 convertible. About 5 years later I realized I could have sold the '87, kept the '63 and it would all have worked out.

If we are going to do some of this we better get going. The sand in the hour glass is leaking like thru a hairnet. I plan to spend my final two articles showing my appreciation to all of you, my Corvette family, for the love and kind words you have given me. It has been a pleasure to serve as your President and you have always made me feel welcome. Any of you that someday volunteer to serve on the Board will experience one of the most rewarding times of your life. I have grown to know so many more of this large group and it has been terrific.


















Tales and Trails from Up Yonder

More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



Sister Rose and the Cornelius Brothers

This month we take a look back at 1978 where QCCC was the host club for the National Council of Corvette Clubs annual national convention. QCCC was small then with about 30 couples. We were able to put on a national convention by garnering help from all the surrounding Corvette Clubs with each hosting a special event. However, one of the main high points had to be the entertainment. For those raised in the South the names will be very familiar as everyone will recognize some of the music. Checkout this lineup: Rockin' Ray Gooding, Bill Deal and the Rondels, Cornelius Brothers and Sister Rose, The Spontanes, Harley Hogg and the Rockers, and J.T.S. Boogie Band, plus WBT 1110 radio host H.A.Thompson. That is quite a lineup for a club of 30 couples to land. Let's break them down a little bit.

Bill Deal and the Rondells: formed in 1959 in Portsmouth, Virginia, crossing blue-eyed soul with beach music. Their rise to national recognition came with three hit singles, "May I ", "I've Been Hurt" and "What Kind of Fool Do You Think I Am". They disbanded in 1975 but reformed several times until Deal died in 2003. This was the era of large bands and they had eight members at the time. Of note, tragedy struck in 1979 when sax and bass member Freddy Owens was murdered in a robbery and rape of his wife at a Richmond motel while the band was playing in that city. Here are some songs on one of their albums that you may recognize: "I've Been Hurt", "Touch Me", Hooked on a Feeling", "I'm Gonna Make You Love Me", and "Harlem Shuffle". They shared the stage with the likes of Fats Domino, Bo Didley, Maurice Williams and the Zodiacs and the Tams.

Rockin' Ray was a well known record spinner in Charlotte on WBT 1110 and became best buddies with H.A. Thompson, who in the 70's was the legendary daytime talk show host at WBT. The Carolina Beach Music Awards Hall of Fame inducted Bill Deal and the Rondells in 1995 and Rockin' Ray in 2003. Rockin' Ray was the hip side of soul music in all the Carolinas in the 70's.

The Cornelius Bothers and Sister Rose also rose to national fame. Rose appeared on the Ed Sullivan show in 1967. In 1970 she added siblings Carter and Eddie to form the act. Before great success set in, another member, childhood friend Cleveland Barrett, was killed in a car accident. Think of these songs when you think of Sister Rose, "Treat Her Like a Lady", "Too Late to Turn Back Now", "Don't Ever Be Lonely", "I'm Never Gonna Be Alone Again", and "Since I Found My Baby". A 1974 hit. In 2011 they were inducted into the Carolina Beach Music Awards Hall of Fame and also received the Joe Pope Pioneer Award.

The Spontanes and Harley Hogg and the Rockers formed in 1960, another big band beach music with 8 or 9 members. They formed in Gastonia, N.C. with Randy Whitesides' parents becoming their managers. Songs you may recognize: "Where Did I Go Wrong", "Ain't No Big Thing", "Don't You Care", and "This Heart of Mine".

So while we were blessed to have a lot of beach music and big band sounds around Charlotte, it was still quite an accomplishment for a small club to land all these big national names in 4 consecutive nights.

The line up: Sunday night kick off wine and cheese party with Bill Deal and the Rondells. Monday night disco at Carrowinds with Rockin Ray Gooding. Wednesday night B.F.Goodrich Party with the J.T.S. Boogie Band, Stohing a party on Thursday night with Strohs Beer, the Spontanes and Harley Hogg and the Rockers. Friday night final night banquet with dancing to Sister Rose and the Cornelius Brothers from 10 p.m. to 2 a.m.

We are not sure who lined all this up, but as usual QCCC did it right. See some of the photos on the following page.


