

QCCC Garage/Corvette Cave of the Month for June

Tommy and Brenda's Garage Story

My love for cars and Corvettes goes back to my childhood. My Father was a Chevrolet guy and that is all he ever drove. During my childhood, he drove a 1953 Chevy truck and Mom had a new 1956 Chevy car, which they gave to me some 10 years later as one of my first cars. Brenda and I started our lives together very young and our very first car was a 1954 four door Chevrolet which we paid \$300.00 for. In high school, we were at the top of the hill as we were one of the few students that actually had their own car. We had to get special permission from the principal to drive the car to school because we both had second shift jobs and had to go to work after school. The car had a few glitches to it and when you went up a big hill and the car was put in a strain the distributor would rotate and then you would have to stop, get out and put it back in time as best you could. Brenda got really good at this and It was nothing to see her on the side of the road with her head under the hood adjusting the distributor. Our next car was the '56 from Mom and Dad, what an improvement over the '54, everything worked on the '56 and we could now go on trips farther than 10 miles from home. During high school, I had a number of 1955 and 1956 Chevrolets including a 1955 drag car which never saw the drag strip, but almost resurfaced Hicks Creek Road with rubber.

We bought our first Corvette around 1975 which was a 1969 silver convertible with a factory hard top. As you may remember the silver on those cars back then faded very fast, as did on this car. We bought the '69 from a neighbor who had lost his driving license indefinitely, probably because of the Corvette. At this time, we had 3 children and on Sundays we would put them in the cubby behind the seats and off for a Sunday ride we would go. I even talked about putting a small seat in the rear for the kids to ride in. Remember this was in the mid 70's and we were young and crazy. We kept this car for about 13 years. Our second Corvette was a 1978 Frost Blue with low miles and was Brenda's daily driver, as this was a chick color.

By this time, I was in the car restoration and repair big time. I had a two-bay garage with a dirt floor and a chain hoist hanging from the rafters with a single 100-watt light bulb in each bay. I was taking Volkswagens and cutting them in half, welding a motorcycle front end onto it and making three wheel motorcycles out of them. I started painting the 3 wheelers with exotic scenes on the gas tanks and then got into painting drag cars with flames and op-art designs. The next natural thing for me to do was start painting cars, so I would wet sand, tape and prime the car and on paint day I would roll the car outside and wet the ground to reduce the dust and start spraying. Believe it or not I had some really good paint jobs, or that is what I remember. Oh, I forgot to mention that Brenda kept grease under her fingernails and paint on her elbows most of the time and we did all this in the afternoons after a full 8-hour job. I guess you could say this was our hobby, or not.

With all this running in our blood it is easy to see why we built The Loftin Corvette Garage. After living on Lake Norman for nearly 20 years and having the love for cars we found ourselves in a 3-car garage house with 5 cars in it and 2 more Corvettes in trailers and my vehicle parked outside, so we decided it was time to either sell some cars or build a garage on The Stradley Farm. Brenda grew up on this farm which was a large Dairy Farm and when her parents passed she inherited the farm. At this time, we had owned the farm for nearly 30 years, so we decided to build a garage on the farm.

In 2011, we built a 48 feet by 100 feet garage for the Corvettes and extra cars we had. The garage has 14 feet ceilings with a full kitchen, bathroom with a shower and a large closet. The garage area has a 2- post lift and two 4-post lifts with enough room to park 10 cars and an additional bay large enough to park our 45 foot motorhome. The wall is covered with Corvette signs, posters, and placards and most of them have been donated by our dear Corvette friends and family. In one corner is an Elvis shrine, in another is Texaco and

Sinclair in memory of my uncle and Brenda's which each had one of these stations. I have a display of vintage license plates from all 50 states, a banner from the Corvette assembly plant in 2013, Corvette Caravan Banner, QCCC Banner and too much more to mention. 
