More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



#### Car Shows (Then and Now)

As I was listening to Tommy address our car show needs last night at the QCCC meeting, my mind drifted back to my beginnings as a car show junkie. By our average age, it is fair to say most of us began our car care days in the late fifties or early sixties, peaking out around the mid-seventies. For me, the serious effort started with my first car after college, a 1968 British Racing Green Corvette convertible.

So let me start with the exterior, the big to-do in car care. Back then this was the procedure. Never wash and wax in the sun as the quickly drying soap will leave a scum you cannot remove. (Don't lie, I know you have done it.) So I had to park under the shade tree in the front yard. Then go to the garage and get the one gallon bucket, into the house for the Palmolive dish detergent soap. Add about 1/2 bottle of soap to the bucket, then take the garden hose (I believe Southerners call it a hose pipe. How do you coil a pipe?), put it on high volume and fill the bucket giving you about 3 inches of water and the rest soap suds. (Done that too haven't you?) Then wet down the car and take the same old sponge and scrub the tree sap, dirt, and bugs deeply into your paint. Next take a dozen old bath towels and try to dry the car before it air dries (water will run out from under many places for hours). The glass actually cleaned easier and better back in the day, due to less crap in the air and the fact that you could reach it all. The windshield rake was only 5%, so take out the t-tops, use the Windex and dry with newspaper ink. Now the fun begins. In 1960 if you worked at a Johnson Wax assembly line, 1. You would see cans of wax getting a yellow/brown label stating Johnson Wax for Hardwood Floors (the kind you spread on the floor then did the twist on top of a rag to shine the hardwood). 2. The assembly line would change over to a green label that said Johnson's Car Polishing Wax. I am positive the wax was the same. Both had the translucent appearance of an eighth grader's snot rag on about the 7<sup>th</sup> day of a serious head cold. Next we must note in America bigger is always better, (two pills will cure it twice as fast even though the dose is one pill to be effective - I know you did this one). With that in mind we would slap on the paste wax like icing a cake (your memory is good, yep you did it). Of course no one had the common sense to do a small section at a time, so we went with the body breaks, i.e., hood, top, deck, sides. Keep in mind the longer it set on the car, the harder it got and you thought a chisel might be necessary. The optimal applicator was to cut the long sleeves off an old shirt (remember, for the

paint safety, to always cut off the cuff button). Smearing it in circles, the thicker the better. Growing up in Illinois where the humidity is around 612% one would think sweat dropping from the arms and forehead would keep the wax soft. I say nay nay. Sweating on paste wax then rubbing it yields the same little goobers as pencil eraser on paper. Little shards that you cannot get rid of. Keep in mind in later years some genius produced a mild version of a body shop orbital buffer. Backed by a guarantee that since it was orbital it would not burn thru the paint. I say nay again, especially on the edges. (I have watched some of you do this) If we still waxed cars this way we would be a much stronger country. You see Johnson's Floor and Car Wax was not PC. No matter sex, race, religion, or political persuasion, you had to rub hard and long to remove it. I am not sure today's youts could do it. I know we welcomed the arrival of Astro Shield, which was a liquid white boat wax that you could wipe on and off similar to today's detail sprays. Except it was white so if you got it down in the vents you had to Q-tip it out. So now we have the shine and are exhausted, we must turn to the tires. After using Mom and Dad's one inch white walls as a training ground, the '68 Corvette came with raised white letter wide ovals. Goodyear PolyGlass Sports Car 200s. I believe the first white letters we scrubbed with the steel wool pads with the soap in them (SOS pads). Then another genius put bleach in a bottle and called it Bleach White and raised the price tenfold. Bleach White did a great job of cleaning the white letters, but left the black tire dull. Then perhaps the smartest guy of his time put black shoe polish in a big can and made the top an applicator sponge so as you smeared this polish on the tire you would not get it on your hands. You had to keep your hands clean so when you took a soft cloth to polish the black goo you could then get your hands all black as well as smear some on the white letters and you got to start over, the chicken or the egg thingy. (Ruined a lot of pairs of blue jeans getting black polish on 'em, didn't you?) After a few years the black polish build-up made your tires wider.

Now we would raise the hood. Wall ah, you can see the ground past the engine. This means the car runs hotter than today's, and all that dirt and dust on the road gets to come past the engine. Then we get a few fuel and oil leaks around gaskets, etc. and bingo we have goo on the engine. Then since you can see the ground that means the tires can splash rain and mud and puddles into the engine bay. Keep in mind cars back then were driven. So to get ready to show, it took a can of Gunk Engine Cleaner, a good rinse job, steam if you had it. Low and behold some of that Chevrolet orange engine paint is peeling. Get a can of that orange spray paint, spray it into the cap, take an artist brush and touch up your intake. (I got this idea from some of you, so I know you did it.) Of course the goo is still there, so your touch up will flake off soon. So many nooks and cranny places you need Darrell Kirkley patience to deal with it all.

Last the interior. In our uneducated youth we bought into the Armour-All sales pitch. We sprayed it on everything inside. It probably prolonged the life of dash pads and door panels as those cars were in the sun a lot, but it left the interior slimy and sticky feeling, plus it collected dust at a rapid pace. (Steve H. still does this one.) I have learned just a slight damp cloth on all interior parts gets the dust off. We would use the house vacuum to do the carpets. All sorts of little hand-helds were on the market, but as Trav says they did not have enough power to pull a greasy string out of a cats behind (his standard answer when it comes to anything power). And that is how you got a car ready for the car show in 1969.

Now we are being told that car interior parts give off benzene and we should never start the car with the air on, particularly high power as it forces us to inhale toxic levels of benzene. I am seeing a pattern here and feel a little like a test dummy. The wax people, the shoe polish guy, the Armour-All man, and the car companies, improve everything after I have a full dose up the snoot. Where was all this knowledge when I was out under that shade tree wearing my hippy head band to keep the sweat out of that paste wax? Now that they have made prepping your car so much easier, I am not really up to it. My best car show days are behind me. But secretly I really enjoyed it.


