





More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



The lost decade

This month we will dive into the forgotten decade. I do not believe any member was here for the whole decade. Some of the vintage gang was here for the beginning, and the Zimmers might have been here for the end of the decade therefore, I am relying on much of the information acquired from Richard Craig. By the way Richard has sold his home and moved to Rock Hill, South Carolina. He worked very hard inside and outside to freshen it up and he got a good price, so best of luck in the future. Some may want to send him an email and tell him atta boy Richard.

The decade of the 80's was off to a rough start. First, we lost the clubhouse due to the rent rising. This had been our meeting and drinking frat house sort of, kind of like animal house. This hit about the same time as the racing vs social was raising its ugly head again. The 70's had been great to QCCC as we saw major and constant growth in new members. Having the clubhouse greatly impacted this. We had some members with show cars, some who had daily drivers, and some had race cars on trailers. Many of the weekend racers cordially enjoyed the social events plus many of the social and weekend trip folks enjoyed helping out at the racing events. In the last half of the 70's we had become a serious race-oriented group. The clubhouse had been the base where all the groups would come and discuss racing and social events over some cold brewskies. Make that many cold brewskies. Much like Cheers, you felt right at home. Instead of Norm it was Travis who upon arrival would comment "have one or be one". Nobody knew what the hell that meant, but it was a staple.


Not until it was gone did we realize what we had lost. We started meeting at apartment complex clubhouses, and members houses. (see Jane Burt who held club meetings more than once in her living room.) As the decade moved on racing was actually the dominant theme of QCCC. I guess it was easier to keep racing however fragmented, but social slipped even worse. It seems impossible that we flourished on the track so well. A lot of the holding of QCCC together fell to then President Sam McGee who was not afraid to put his foot down when one side or the other got out of control. As we grew, new members were less keen on having to pay the required QCCC dues and pay to send our auto rep. to quarterly meetings all over the U.S. There were some really intense discussions at some of the meetings.

The racing was just dominant. QCCC won the championship of the region almost every year of the decade. On top of that we were National Champions in 1988. (see attached shadow box of jacket patches for winning). Remember we were a club of about 20 couples and Charlotte was still a small berg at the time. You won points for entering a speed event, then you won points for winning a speed event. We went to speed events in New Orleans, Roebling Road in Georgia, Rockingham, Darlington, Statesville, Greer Drag Way in SC, and many others. Helping us win the Region and National awards was the fact that we were in the hotbed of racing in Charlotte and many of the events were close by. Additionally, the QCCC women loved to race and almost all of the spouses raced and earned points. I know Richard Craig would get off work Friday at 5 pm, go home and pack his 85 coupe with clothes for the weekend plus put his hoosier tires in the back of the 85 and some tools on the passenger seat and head to Roebling Road. Once there he would park outside the gate as it was locked up by the time he arrived and would sleep in the car until someone arrived Saturday morning. That is how serious the racers of QCCC were.

More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



A lot of credit goes to the Presidents of the time starting with Sam McGee in 1977, Roy Elgin 1980, Bill Pegorch 1981, Jerry Rhinehardt 1982, Dave Stiles 1983, Scott Jordan 1984, Melvin Pace 85 and 89, Larry Gunter 1986, Donna Helms 1987, and Jerry Stevens 1988. These were the folks in charge during the rocky decade of the 80s. Other than the beginning years the 80's were without a doubt the riskiest time where we might not have survived. The racing for the most part waned on its own in the 90's as social entertainment took over with Jane and Eddie Burt leading the way. As the price of the cars, parts, and labor was just too much for a weekend hobby. This is why today we all marvel at Brian Kruse, Craig Perry, Eric Matthews and Bill Ingram as they take today's hot rides on the track.

Even though we don't have organized racing now, there are plenty who would like to take a lap or two at V. I.R. (especially in someone else's Corvette). We lack insurance to cover us now, but when the SCCA invited us to an autocross at Z-Max, Darrel Kirkley was first to get there. He also was the first to get sent home for breaking 10 seconds in the quarter mile with no roll bar.

You never know, QCCC may get to race again one day. It was fun in the 80's, but it would be more fun with today's Corvette.

See photos of Richard Craigs 1967 and 1985 that he raced. Melvin Pace still has his 68 427 "pop top" and promises to get it running again. A timed lap of Charlotte Motor Speedway is a Walter Mitty moment for sure.

No doubt racing also held us together for the decade. Those who did not race sure wished they had once the opportunity was gone. Some raced seriously and the others benched raced at the bar.

Bill Henderson, a member in the 70's was invited to the August meeting at Hendrick in 2016. When we asked him what he thought about the QCCC that he helped get started, he said "this was a poor man's club when he was a member". He could not believe all the new and shiny Corvettes. That sums up what happened to racing. The cars just got so pricey and repairs out of site. If anyone challenged us to a race we were there.
