

Anyway, if you have attended any of the monthly meetings this year hopefully you have enjoyed the Corvette trivia questions I have been asking. Here is some more info that might even make it to my trivia question time at a future meeting.

The C1 Corvette (1953-1962) was never offered with Power Steering so Chevrolet used a very large steering wheel to help ease turning at slow speeds. They seem incredibly large by today's standards.

The 1963 (C2) split window coupe is one of the most valuable Corvettes ever produced but some foolish owners, including Zora Arkus Duntov hated it so bad because of the reduced visibility that they had body shops remove the middle brace and add a window from a 1964 model, greatly reducing the resale value.

The C3 (1968-1982) Corvette used the same basic frame as the C2, that equals 19 years of continuous production with the same skeleton.

The C4 (1984-1996) Corvette had a tilting front hood and fender section reminiscent of early Jaguar XKE's, this made working on the engine and front suspension a mechanic's dream.

That covers the C1-C4's, next month I will hit the C5-C8's.

Hope to see everyone at the July meeting at Billy Boats shop. He manufacturers some of the finest exhaust systems available today, made right here in NC. In addition we have a tour of the deBotech manufacturing operation (right across the street from Billy Boats) set up at 2:45, just before the social hour at the regular meeting, check the Blast that was sent out recently. They are an OEM for General Motors and produce the carbon fiber items used on Corvette and Cadillac... very cool.



In 1972 at the ripe old age of 25 I was elected President of QCCC and my wife, Sharon, was elected Secretary. The first thing we realized was that we were responsible for the monthly newsletter. We struggled through the first few months with help from our friends, but then member, David Morse, approached me with a proposal from one of his customers. Consolidated Press was a company, believe it or not, on Davidson Street in North Charlotte, that produced newsletters and magazines for trade and union organizations. They said they could do a "first class" newsletter for us and it wouldn't cost us anything. Of course, to finance such a venture required us to sell advertising to local businesses. I was all in, and David and I started calling on potential advertisers and did remarkably well. I didn't know what David sold for a living, but I figured out later that he was, as Mel Brooks puts it, a "bull-shit artist".

The next challenge was to provide text and we dug around and found enough stuff to fill the pages. Ironically, one of David's articles was one he lifted from a car magazine about the possibility of a midengine Corvette. Remember that was 50 years ago. We made the deadline and the 16 page "Queen City Corvette News" came out the first of April, 1972. Our sponsor, LaPointe Chevrolet, was thrilled and we distributed copies all over Charlotte. The printing company billed the advertisers and waited for the money to roll in. As Dave and I started preparing the material for the May issue, we got a call from the printer. It seems over half of the advertisers hadn't paid and they were looking to us to cover the expense or collect the outstanding debt. First of all, we didn't have any money, club wise or personally to do that, so we started calling on the delinquent advertisers with little result. The printer pulled the plug on the next issue, so we were back to generating our own newsletter after only one issue.

Sharon had typing skills and with my mom's portable Royal typewriter we did our best with what we had. Luckily, high school buddy, Tommy Mitchem had joined the club and was willing to lend a hand. He worked for a fairly large local company that had a Xerox copy machine and a Pitney-Boles postage machine, so for the rest of 1972 we would type up the newsletter and slip over to his office either early Saturday morning or late Sunday night to print and mail it to the members. Did I mention we didn't have money for postage and that was only \$.08 each? Sharon and I were very thankful that Tommy kept that job at least until the end of the year.

I plan on having a little "historic" display at the August anniversary meeting at Hendrick Motorsports and will have a copy of the one and only "professional" newsletter there for you to see.

More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



This month we will continue to give you our top 10 vintage stories of yesteryear with this being #9. I'll call it All in a Days Work at Greer Dragway in S.C. If you missed it before, here's your chance to read it.

Well rats, did not expect that to happen!

Several months ago, we covered what was our favorite Corvette wheel trim from the old days and today. One of the top two choices was the old '68 thru mid 70's rally wheel, with trim rings and center caps. One issue that kept it out of first place was the mounting hardware for both pieces. The center cap was simply forced on over a small rise in the casting of the steel wheel. This covered the lug nuts and accompanying dirt at the axle end point. The problem with this was you had to push one area in, then hold it in while striking the other side (180 degrees) with either the palm of your free hand, or with a rubber hammer. Often this leads to the first side popping back out of place. Figuring this a simple task would be an underestimation, especially given these are made of pot metal then chromed. As such they can easily be dented, dinged or otherwise, knocked out-of-round quite easily. Once you have cursed this process, you may turn to the trim rings. Two major problems arise. One, they are made thin out of the most aggravating aluminum alloy. This lends itself to extremely soft and non-scratch resistant conditions. Even a small mishit will lead to a little dimple showing up on the perimeter of them. Secondly, they should have had a minimum of 8 clips to hold them tightly to the rim. The design of the clips is not good. Take your 3 middle fingers. Curve the two outer ones slightly but make a hook out of the middle one. The two outer fingers hook over the rim between the rim and the tire while the hooked finger goes on the outside edge of the rim putting pressure to keep the other two clips in place. (I will try to include photo). The problem occurs with only 4 clips per rim. This allows the trim ring to bow out away from the rim on occasion. While not noticeable from 6 feet, up close inspection shows this to not look good. Every time you change tires you have to remove and replace these rings. It was worse in the old days as many would use a screwdriver to pry them off, adding dents, scratches, and distortions of the clips. Once held slightly in place, you would once again hit the ring with the palm of the hand or a rubber hammer. These clips like most GM clips are not going to work well with repeated use. If you hit the ring with the clip not lined up just right, it bent the hooks on the clip and made it not hold snuggly. Many a youth have found out the hard way that you need to know where the wheel weights are before you start beating on the ring as they are not going on if the wheel weight lines up with a clip. There is little leeway as the hole for the valve stem can only go where the hole in the ring is.

Now enter one of the vintage gang who as an early teenager had taken on a position of helping out in the body shop at LaPointe Chevrolet. One day a new '67 Corvette arrived. The trim pieces a.k.a. hubcaps are shipped inside the car to avoid theft at the railyard. His boss instructed him to take the caps out of the car and put them on. '67 caps though smaller, worked in the same manner. So, having no experience he thought you just take them hold them then bang them on. After having beat the crap out of the first one, the learning process began. By the time he got to #4 he had a system which left it looking less like it had been beat to death. It's one of those things that looks so simple, but until you have mastered it, you have no idea how tricky it is. You really must treat them like they are made of china if you want them to stay nice. They are just poorly designed. I hope many of you have had the joy of giving this a try. It is easy slowly on, then take a small crowbar end wrapped in a towel, place close to one edge of the clip and very gently pry off. Once

on, they are a breeze to clean compared to today's wheels. They give a lot of depth to the C-3 rims and you can't beat chrome for shine.

It is amazing how easily the group gives up these tales on ourselves. I surmise that we know the rest of us have stories just as bad. In this case that overzealous youth was your Historian, Travis Meredith.

And now you know the rest of this story. . .the good ole days

During the heavy racing in the mid 70's, QCCC had two favorite drag haunts, Shuffletown in the Mt Holly - Rozelles Ferry area and Greer, SC, which is a small town between Spartanburg and Greenville. Greer was a hot spot for us as it was just a short drive down I-85 and the South Carolina Corvette clubs were good competition.

This particular weekend involved 4 of QCCC's most avid drag racers. Travis Meredith, who cut his teeth in North Charlotte with a Mercury Comet, Melvin Pace of "Pop Top" fame (monster big block '68), Big George

Mcleod (early '70's radical big block), and Bill Henderson (a.k.a. Spiderman). Big George had one wicked big block and just whipped everybody on a regular basis. He showed up in Greer with a huge set of drag slicks and once again pounced on all. Late in the day a discussion came up involving Melvin wanting to try the big slicks on his '68. Now Melvin already had huge fender flares on "Pop Top", so he rolled the car part way up on the trailer and proceeded to try to get the slicks on. It turns out they were too big to fit without rubbing. Someone said that was too bad as they really thought Melvin could match George's time with the slicks. If you know Melvin you know he does not like second place, so he proceeded to

borrow a hack saw and right there in the staging lot whacked a whole hunch more fender off "Pop Top" until those big ol' tires would clear.


After all, you can't kill fiberglass. During this trip, Travis had brought his newest effort. Trav had, and still has, his '64 coupe. But once we started the Portche Corvette Challenges, he had picked up a basket case '68. He had Billy Coates (a.k.a. 'the Car Doctor.') build a stout motor, then bought an old trailer and this was one of his first outlings. Spiderman also had

installed a radical rat motor in his '72 coupe. Spider fell victim to racing's "go fast or go broke", and he blew the darn thing up that day. Now the problem, he had driven to the strip. So spiderman asked Trav if he would trailer the broken '72 back to Charlotte. Travis was always willing to help but said he had no tag or insurance on the '68. "No problem" said Spider, "we will just put the tag from my '72 on your '68." So Trav had Bill drive the '68 behind Trav who towed the '72 on the trailer on the 2 hour trip back to Charlotte. Trav told Bill if he got caught, HE was going to jail, not Trav. To this day Trav says he was nervous as a long tail cat in a room full of rockin' chairs. Luckily, Trav had some header mufflers with him that day, otherwise Bill would have had to drive the '68 back with open exhaust.
