



# VP Stuff, Ron Berst

In last month's newsletter I talked about Bloomington Gold. This month I will briefly touch on the other, the much more detailed and thorough judging organization known as the National Corvette Restorers Society (NCRS). The roots of this organization was started in the late sixties/early seventies by different men in various parts of the country as separate clubs interested in compiling, documenting and preserving information on how to repair, refurbish and restore their cars. In 1974 the different groups came together and chose the name NCRS as the name of their organization. Their constitution and bylaws stated the purpose of the organization was the "preservation, restoration and enjoyment of early Corvettes and related materials as well as to encourage and publish studies and research pertaining to their history".

By 1974 membership had grown to over 100 members and their first event was held in Wapakoneta Ohio on May 29<sup>th</sup>-June 2<sup>nd</sup> 1974. Judging was open to Corvettes from years 1953-1962 (known today as C1's).

Today, NCRS holds judging events or meets throughout the country. Chapter, regional and a national event judges evaluate Corvettes from 1953-2004. Some of the award categories are: Top Flight, Duntov Mark of Excellence, Chevrolet Bowtie, Concours and others. Cars are not judged against each other but against a standard, there are no 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup> place cars. All aspects of the car are inspected and any deviation from what the car was like when it left the factory will deduct points and reduce the final total. Cars in the Duntov Mark of Excellence category must attain a score of at least 97% out of 100% based on "as original as manufactured"... to date only 1,137 Corvettes have achieved this coveted award!!!

This info barely scratches the surface of what NCRS is about and the rigorous detail in which Corvettes are judged at the various events each year throughout the country. They have an excellent website at <u>www.ncrs.org</u> and if you have interest in what "original as manufactured" Corvettes are, check them out.

Finally, I found this little blurb on their website describing early Corvettes:

Owning and driving a Corvette was a statement in itself, but beyond that, the car seemed to beg to be modified, road raced, drag raced, wrecked, fixed and restored. For most, it was not a point A to B means of transportation, unless A was the starting line and B was the finish line. And, as they say, "If I have to explain, you wouldn't understand."

That's it for now; hope to see you at the next meeting, November 12<sup>th</sup> at the Speedway Club.



I just got home from the 11<sup>th</sup> Annual QCCC car show and I'm completely amazed that the club pulled this event off after postponing it for 4 weeks. I thought the postponement was the right decision, but with so many players involved, canceling and rescheduling seemed almost impossible. Hats off to Tommy, his QCCC team, the member volunteers and of course, the staff at Hendrick Motorsports and City Chevrolet for pulling off this classic event. I heard nothing but compliments from everyone I came in contact with.

I would also like to thank Bill Cruthis for all of his efforts in putting together the "Golden Gears" display, for owners who have owned the same Corvette for 50 years. Here are some details about that group:

Gary Spenser's beautiful blue 1975 coupe doesn't quite qualify yet, but since Gary purchased this car brand new off of the showroom floor 47 years ago and has no plans to sell it anytime soon, he deserved the recognition. His car is a true time capsule and still looks brand new.

Jim Holland's black 57 is another car that represents a bi-gone era. With period correct mag wheels and a drag racer stance, it looks like the bad ass boulevard cruiser of the sixties that was raced at the local strip on Sunday.

Paul DePascale purchased his 1957 Corvette in California in 1967 for the amazing amount of \$1375.00, and drove it cross country when he moved back east.

Special guest this year with his one owner, 68 Coupe was Melvin Pace, who purchased his big block Corvette from City Chevrolet in January of 1968 and first joined QCCC in 1972. We hope to see Melvin become active again and join the "Vintage Gang".

I purchased my 64 Coupe in 1970 at the age of 23 after it had been through 6 different owners in 6 years.

These are the five cars in this year's display, but we also have additional members that have achieved "Golden Gear" status but couldn't attend this year's show.

Steve Pelchat bought his 1960 Corvette in 1970 at the ripe old age of 16 for \$500.00 and stored it away for 20 years. The restoration began in 1993 and wasn't completed until 2002.

Walt Krupowicz's 1969 Coupe was purchased brand new in September of 1969 in Utica, NY and was a daily driver for four years. It is totally original and has won several NCRS awards.

The late Eddie Burt made his brand new 1966 big block Corvette a drag racer and raced extensively in Louisiana and Texas until he moved to the Charlotte area. His son, Eddie Jr., now owns the car and is an Associate member of QCCC living in Texas.

All of these cars and their owners represent a unique group of dedicated Corvette owners who for various reasons saw fit to hold on to these cars for 50 plus years. Obviously, you must start young to accomplish this and sometimes have to turn down attractive offers from potential buyers.

I don't know of any other car clubs that have this kind of recognition for long-term owners, and we have received some great response from spectators the past two shows that we have had this special display. Each of these owners have very interesting stories about the histories of their cars and I'm sure would be happy to answer any questions you may have.



More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



#### Generational Luck, Right Place Right Time, Our Turn was Great

Whether you agree or not, maybe you had to be there, but the Vintagers all say that you had the World War II generation said to be the greatest ever, certainly no disagreement for us, we the Baby Boomers had life, the best since mankind began. We had great music, it was relatively safe. Prices were low (especially gas) and we had the best cars money could buy. Automobile body styles changed yearly so that once a year it was a big deal to go down to the Chevy store and view the new models. It was a time of great advancement and even after you got a new ride, it was up for modifications. Sorry for those that follow. They have figured out to go with a style for 4 years then a swoope here or a different tail light there and call it your newest model. We used to trade up every 4 years for a different used car and thought that was exciting. Now you put a 15 Corvette next to a 19 and only us loyal fans can spot the difference. We had the joys of raising the hood and learning how this rig worked. Today we raise the hood and for most of us, we are lost and can't identify a thing. (Exclude Brin, Bill, Tommy, Eric, many more, still not a majority.)

Now, we don't apologize for having great music that is no longer in fashion, in other words, we could tell what the words were. We just got lucky. Likewise for 20 cent/gallon for gas with gas wars on an intersection with 4 stations. We were also blessed with safety. You went to the big house if you stole a car and my home town a murder would have been talked about for decades. Child abuse was non-existent or none that I ever heard about. In fact, if you missed the Vietnam War, you had a great youth. Then the world got crowded and technology shrunk the world, we sold out to the companies that make stuff for pennies on the dollar and those things we enjoyed in our youth may not be available for future generations. However, I won't bore you with further details. What we want to cover is some of the fun others will miss, for instance, the vast changes yearly to your favorite ride. Visualize the difference between the 55, 56, 57, 58, and 59 Chevrolets. All new molds for fenders, doors, main shell, and God knows what all underneath. If that was not enough, the engines changed almost as fast. Can you imagine buying a Z51 one year, Grand Sport, then a Z06 and ZR1 in the 4<sup>th</sup> year. But again I digress. 
