



Merry Christmas, Kim!

I hope everyone had a wonderful Christmas; it comes and goes so quickly. :(This month I will list some of the Corvette milestones during the C5 thru C8 models.

1997 – The C5 is introduced, a true game changer. An all-new chassis moved the wheels to the corners for increased stability and interior room. The transmission and differential were combined in the rear forming a transaxle. Under the hood was the all new LS1all-aluminum engine, 44lbs lighter than the 1996 LT4.

2001 – The Z06 hardtop model is introduced, also known as the fixed-roof coupe. With a 385 HP LS6 engine they had a titanium exhaust system which was the first mass-produced car so equipped; all had 6-speed manual transmissions.

2005 – The C6 débuts with exposed headlights, the first model since 1962 without the pop-up style. Power increases to 400HP in the standard LS2 engine.

2006 – The Z06 returns with an aluminum-frame which was 30% lighter than its steel counterpart. A 427 CI, 505HP, LS7 engine was mated to a 6-speed manual transmission. With titanium connecting rods, it had a 7000 rpm redline.

2009 – A 638HP, supercharged LS9 made the new ZR1 a 200+ mph supercar. The carbon fiber hood had a polycarbonate window to show the engine intercooler.

2014 – The C7 is introduced at an invitation-only reveal in Detroit on 1/13/2013 (several QCCC members were invited). The LT1 engine made 460HP with perf exhaust. A seven-speed manual transmission with rev matching was standard.

2015 – The Z06 returns with a supercharged 650HP, LT4 engine. A convertible and an automatic transmission are now available for the first time on a Z06.

2019 – The ZR1 returns with a 755HP, LT5 engine, the highest HP engine ever offered by GM for a passenger car, only 2953 are produced; QCCC has 4 of them!

2020 – The first mid-engine Corvette, Zora must be smilingJ. With a Tremec 8-speed dual clutch transmission and a 490HP, LT2 engine, 0-60mph is under 3 seconds. VIN # 1 is auctioned by Barrett-Jackson on January 19th, 2020 for 3 million, donated to Detroit Children's charity, Rick Hendrick wins the auction.

2023 - The Z06 returns again, this time with a 670HP, LT6, flat-plane crank engine and an 8600 rpm redline; this is bonafide race car hiding in plain sight!

There are many more models and cars I could mention but these are some that are historic, at least to me. That's it for now; hope to see everyone at our January 14th business meeting at Victory Lanes Entertainment Center.







QCCC HISTORY

Hope y'all had a wonderful Christmas and as prepared as I am to usher in 2023. With all the new members we have, the challenge for us old guys is to meet everyone and form the friendships that this club invites.

I'm still thinking back to the Corvettes of QCCC's past that I would like to see in the "Golden Gears" car show display. This month we will feature Harry Jackson's 1966 Corvette roadster, (I love the word "roadster", it just sounds like a car that would be fun to drive).

The very first time I saw Harry Jackson was a warm summer Saturday afternoon in 1974 just before the monthly business meeting at the QCCC club house. I was sitting on the front porch as Harry came down Independence Boulevard with the top down and the side pipes singing the song of a 427 engine. He came in, introduced himself, instantly made about 30 friends and quickly became a fixture in the club. Harry's '66 was marina blue with matching interior, completely original except for a set of American Torque-Thrust mags. A stunning car to say the least!

Harry was a bachelor and really got into all the club's activities, participating in every social and competitive event with enthusiasm and dedication. You never saw him without a smile on his face. All the wives and girlfriends loved him, he was a big old teddy bear. To me and my southern cousins he was just a "good ole' boy". Harry was a large guy and for the club family Christmas party in 1975, he volunteered to be Santa Clause and was perfect. There must have been 30 of our own kids, nieces and nephews below the age of 10 at the clubhouse that day and they all believed they saw Santa.

It didn't take long for Harry to get into the National Council of Corvette Club competition program and he served as Governor for several years. Along with that, his racing ambition grew. Before long he and club member Billy Coates made the decision to form a team and use Harry's '66 to build a race car to SCCA A Production specs. Coates had been a line mechanic at the Chrysler dealership and had recently opened his own garage. He also had built NASCAR Sportsman cars with Bryant Wallace and SCCA race cars for Tony Drum, so he had the knowledge and experience. As far as I know, Harry never said "no" to Billy, no matter how extreme he wanted to take the '66. As an example, they took the bare frame, built a steel jig to mount it to and welded reinforcements at every cross-member. They also built adjustable front and rear suspensions, added a full roll cage, huge fender flares on the body and gutted the interior. This was a pristine driver that became a real race car.

After years of effort the '66 was finished and raced somewhere almost every weekend. Then Coates dropped out of the club and apparently, he and Harry split ways. Harry had spent all his time and money building this car to satisfy Billy, and without him Harry had trouble maintaining the car. He finally gave up on the '66 and left the club. The last I heard of him was in the mid-eighties, he had a space in a flea market in Garden City near Myrtle Beach. The last time I saw his car was about 1983, it was sitting behind Roy Elgin's house, outside, uncovered, on four flat tires and in very rough shape. Where it is now is unknown.

There has never been a nicer, better liked guy in QCCC than Harry. I wish this story had a happier ending, but sometimes racing ambitions don't turn out well and this beautiful '66 Corvette paid the price. More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



Well, I did volunteer!

When I arrived in late 1974, I was pretty green, having been raised in a small farming community before shipping off to college. College in St. Louis helped prepare me for the world, but the job was still in progress when I got the urge to move to a warmer climate. Having gone the fraternity route in college, I was in complete understanding of the work it takes to make it a success. Thinking back to those days, I remember staying the last summer of school, working for my apprenticeship and decorating the frat house. This included stopping the water from coming into the basement thru the walls, painting the drab kitchen, and applying a flock wallpaper to the two large rooms downstairs. They had 12-foot ceilings. Therefore, when QCCC asked for a volunteer, I jumped at the chance as that was right down my ally, and that is how I became QCCC clubhouse chairman. I had been in Charlotte less than 30 days, and I was contributing to my fellow Corvette friends.

Some of you new members may not know, but QCCC had a clubhouse at the corner of Westover and Independence Boulevard, a 2-bedroom brick place that we rented from '72 thru '80. The front living room was hardwood floor, with only a vinyl sofa and a jukebox. It was made for dancing. An archway led to an empty dining room. We had no funds to even go to Goodwill. A door in the dining room led to the oversized kitchen which had a drab green paint. I don't remember any furniture there either. A door in the living room also led to a hallway which had a small bath with tub, sink, and stool. The hallway ended at a back bedroom plus another doorway into the second bedroom. That bedroom had a door leading to the back yard. Summing it all up, you had a functional front room, dining room, kitchen, and one bedroom which stored all the QCCC junk, timing equipment, pylons, signs, and other items rarely needed. QCCC converted the second bedroom into a bar. It was nicely done by President David Morse. He provided the wood and upholstery and built it all by himself. Much to the surprise of QCCC members, as they thought it was above his paygrade. So, the place was very useful; it just needed a facelift. The bathroom was a disaster. The sink and stool and tub had a patina of dirt that would not come clean. Beer in the club house means sticky floors throughout the house even in the bathroom and I know it was not beer on the bathroom floor. I found some old tubes from the juke box. It would break periodically, and you had to take the tubes out and go test them at the drugstore to fix it. There also was a mop in the back bedroom which was so dirty that when you tried to clean the floors, it was not worth much. It had more dirt than the floors. There was a lock on the bathroom door which I fixed multiple times, but somehow it kept getting broken. I think the guys liked it that way so they could walk in on some of the ladies. There was also a door leading to a two-foot stairway to the unfinished attic. There we put crates and small barrels to sit on as that is where QCCC meetings were held. Hot in the summer, and cold in the winter made us want very short meetings. An attic fan in the summer worked well but it turned so fast that it would suck any loose papers off the table. I thought I had great help as they told me they would assign two other couples every month to help me keep the house in order, by working an assigned weekend. They would publish their names in the monthly newsletter. I did not realize that some months the newsletter would not get to them until the listed weekend was already past. Sometimes, I was told they just forgot.

Anyway, I found myself cleaning solo on many Sunday afternoons. I did manage to paint the kitchen as well as the two front rooms, which were adorned with red and blue racing stripes. The rest was just clean and kept in working order. The President and I were the only two in the club that had keys to the clubhouse. It was a long year but a rewarding one as I got to know my new friends. I did meet the wine-o that lived in the old garage out in the backyard. He was harmless and once he knew he would not be given money for wine, beer, or liquor.

The clubhouse was like a shrunken frat house, just missing the 2nd and 3rd floors full of bedrooms. It was a great attraction to new members. Anytime you drove by, if there was a Corvette parked there you knew to stop and have a beer. Wednesday night was beer night. Hump day ended after you had a few too many and then we would travel down Central Ave. to I-Hop for breakfast before heading home. As Travis says, he never scheduled much to do on Thursday. Look at the room Hendrick provides us with compared to the hot attic. It was the right place at that time, and it helped us grow our membership and let us become like brothers. You see the results now with 376 members! The early days of QCCC were great just as our experience now is also. Wish you could have been there.


