

A little bit of knowledge... What is Active Fuel Management? Active Fuel Management AFM was designed to provide maximum fuel economy under light load driving conditions by **deactivating the <u>lifters</u> on specific cylinders**. On V8 engines, half of the cylinders are deactivated and on V6 engines, two of the cylinders are deactivated. Active Fuel Management (AFM) aka Cylinder deactivation aka V4 mode, was first introduced on the C7 and was retained for the C8. There is a lot of information online regarding AFM and its function and possible impact.



QCCC HISTORY

The best thing about the Wednesday dinners or anytime QCCC members get together to eat a meal is getting to better know the members you just say "hi" to at the meetings. Since most have relocated to the Charlotte area from other places, the most asked question is "where you from?". And when I respond that I am a native of Charlotte, many questions about growing up in the area usually follow. Recently at a Wednesday night dinner, I was asked if there was any street racing in Charlotte back in the day. Since the statute of limitations has hopefully passed, I'll tell what I know about the subject.

To understand what the streets of Charlotte looked like in, let's say 1965, the year I graduated from high school, there were no expressways, with a few four lane roads and the main artery was Independence Boulevard, which had a stop light at almost every intersection. Getting the picture? So primarily the street racing my friends and I were involved in usually occurred when you pulled up next to a worthy challenger and went through a few gears to the next red light. Sometimes those spontaneous street races got a little more serious and that led to going out of town to a rural road to settle things once and for all.

I feel to better understand this era, here's some facts about Charlotte in the sixties. In 1960 the population of Charlotte was a little over 200,000 making it the 59th biggest city in the US by population. By 1970 we had added another 80,000 or so without counting the neighboring communities outside of Mecklenburg County. The Lake Norman area was undeveloped and still called "the river". There were a few good restaurants that were permitted for brown bagging, but since there was no liquor by the drink, the bars were really just beer joints. The only mall was Charlottetown with the downtown area anchored by Belk's and Ivey's. But in the late 70's major growth started with IBM coming to town along with other national corporations and the migration started. Also, we finally got liquor by the drink in 1978. Today, Charlotte has a population of over 900,000, without counting the suburbs, making it the 16th largest city in the country. Obviously, life in this area changed quickly! Independence Boulevard became an expressway, Brookshire and Belk freeways were built, traffic became a nightmare. But that wasn't always the case.

So, like most other towns in the USA in the sixties, hot cars and cruising around town was a major form of entertainment. In Charlotte, we had a very definite route we followed every Friday and Saturday night and Sunday afternoons. For us in North Charlotte, it started with Shoney's on The Plaza. Then to Shoney's on Independence, thru South 21, down Independence, to the Shoney's on Morehead, on out to BarBQ King on Wilkerson Boulevard. Since cruising back then usually involved having a beer or twelve, knowing where the cheapest and coldest take out places were was essential. Our favorite on the north side was a small store we called "Joe's" off the Plaza behind the Dairy Queen. On the west side you could pull into Town and Country Drive-In and the car hop would come to the car as you pulled in, take your order as you circled around the building, and deliver it to you as you pulled out the other side. Other hot spots were Babe Maloy's Drive-In, Big George's and Harold's BarBQ on Kings Drive. As you can tell there were lots of great spots to see and be seen while cruising and the roads in between these places left plenty of opportunities for a spontaneous street race. The Charlotte area was loaded with modern muscle cars and cool hot rods on the street, so cruising in Charlotte was like a rolling car show. It was a great place to grow up in the sixties.

Well after this lengthy trip down memory lane, I still haven't said much about racing on the streets. We'll leave that for next month.



More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



Wow, can Donna put on a banquet or what! 200 that is ½ the club and by far the largest attendance ever, which brings us to today's article. At the banquet Travis and I were discussing the evolution of the club and the way in which it has all come together. . .from his Presidency of 25 to 40 members to ten times that many now. A slow but steady growth pattern was seen until the C5 hit the sales lots. Then, walloweee, owners were looking for us instead of us looking for them. Credit GM and the C5, C6, C7, and C8 Corvettes for the uptick. We both acknowledged aging of the tooth as it were and especially when the C8 arrived, lowering the average age of our members from the 70's back to at least the lower 60's. GM was wise to recognize their demographics were changing and the older customers may not be their target audience anymore, generally speaking. But they sure nailed it with the next generation with the EuroVette*. I think the car is super although I due take a few issues with front vs rear engine. The old dog new tricks thing. Plus the C7 is so well done and I can still shift it. I don't need anymore temptation to prove my lack of race driving skills, but I digress, the C8 is a stunner and is the choice closing in on the majority of the club owners. Thanks to John Meadows, Q, Robert Morgan, and a few other Presidents that kept us around before the C-5 arrived.

This QCCC started with a bunch of folks we will affectionally call Gear Heads. The Corvettes were cheap and easy to modify to our own liking. It was by far the sexist car on the road with each new model year eagerly awaited. Yet, building membership in the club was slow. While there were many gear heads around, you had to connect them with QCCC. This proved to be for whatever reason, a difficult task. What has changed with our growth is we are bringing in all levels of membership, including those new to Corvette who until the brand showed these intense changes to European styling, really never gave Corvette a second glance. These are some great folks so thanks to GM. Rick Accurso and his group have sent us more members in one year than the whole membership during Trav's Presidency. Add to that the effort of Mr. H and his team to the car show success and you see the results. The rest is easy as it is up to us. You come because of the car but stay because of the people.

The C6 was big, but the C7 bigger as it was a very new car. GM knew that the 2019 ZR1 got all the bite of the apple. Here was a car with front engine and rear wheel drive, so the mid engine was a "gotta be" and lucky for us. I'll bet there are some meeting notes about that target audience. The C6 to C7 conversion reminds me of the C2 to C3, a smooth swap to a more polished upgrade, not so with the C8.


