Corvette Racing is Back

A new era for Corvette in IMSA Racing

The Chevrolet Corvette Z06 GT3.R is making its racing debut this weekend, marking the third phase of IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship race car since the introduction of the mid-engine C8 platform. The previous C8.R GTLM was modified to align more closely with GT3 machinery used in GTD PRO and GTD.

To adapt the C8.R for GTD PRO racing, changes were made including the addition of ABS, a ballast box, and an air restrictor for the engine. The differential had to be changed from a trick differential to a limited slip. Overall, the car was a compromise, and it presented initial challenges for Corvette Racing and its drivers in GTD PRO.

In contrast, the Z06 GT3.R is a completely new ground-up car developed by Pratt Miller. It differs from the GTE/ GTLM concept and is designed for customers to compete in GT3-based series globally, such as GT World Challenge and the World Endurance Championship's LMGT3 class. Therefore, it is built to perform well on a variety of tires from different manufacturers, as opposed to the exclusive use of Michelins in the WeatherTech Championship.

Although it may not appear substantially different at first glance, the new car is designed to be suitable for various drivers and easier to service and repair. Fortunately, the Z06 GT3.R does not feel drastically different from the GTE car.

Nicky Catsburg, part of the WEC GTE-Am-winning trio for Corvette in 2023, and partner with Tommy Milner in the No. 4 Corvette Racing by Pratt Miller Motorsports Z06 GT3.R, comments that from a driver's perspective, the new car feels almost the same. It incorporates some small changes, with ABS having a significant impact on how it feels when entering corners.

Ken Brown, Pratt Miller's technical director for motorsports, emphasizes the importance of considering aspects such as ease of driving, ergonomics, tire handling, and performance across different track temperatures in the design of a customer race car. He also stresses that the car must be enjoyable and easier to drive for different levels of drivers.

Despite the complexities involved in designing a GT3 car, the engineering team was able to retain key features of the successful racing machine while adding weight intelligently, allowing for increased reliability and durability. Additionally, a robust support structure has been put in place to meet the needs of customer teams requiring technical support or parts.

The Corvette Z06 GT3.Rs set to compete in the 62nd Rolex 24 At Daytona are all-new cars built with a different concept, yet the ultimate goal remains the same: winning races. The global expansion of the car presents numerous opportunities for victories across various racing series.

Be sure to watch Sebring in March to see how the never die Corvettes race.



NATIONAL CORVETTE MUSEUM – NEWS AND UPDATES

Paul Mitchell - QCCC Ambassador to the NCM

February 2024

The National Corvette Museum has for several years held at the Museum the Vettes for Vets event on Veterans Day in November. Last year the Museum changed this event to Military Appreciation Month in May. This event was not well attended for several reasons, mostly because it was held right after the Bash. Some veteran members of the Museum sent in comments and asked for the Vettes for Vets event to be changed back to Veterans Day in November. QCCC member Bob Chichester was one of those members that supported the change. Due to the received input from around the country, Museum management has decided to move the event back to November, so the event will continue on its original schedule. Thanks to Bob for helping this take place. Bob has attended this event for many years, so talk with him if you would like more information.

We have got a few new Museum members at the end of the year, but we still need more to join. Here are the rates for membership –

Individual - \$65 per year

Family - \$100 per year. 5 years for \$350.

Lifetime - \$2,000

Senior individual - \$750 for 20 years (for over 65 years old)

This month we'll take the way-back machine to the year 1974 and take a look at the Queen City Corvette Club fifty years ago. Club membership had grown to about forty members with the average age a little less than thirty years old. The club had become very active in the National Council of Corvette Clubs sanctioning program, along with other Corvette clubs in the Carolinas, so there were plenty of events to choose from almost every weekend. The Corvettes were about an even split between C-2's (mid-years) and C-3's, with only one or two C-1's (classics) represented, with most driven daily. Tommy Mitchem was elected President with his wife, Aretha, Secretary. That happened a lot in this period since the rumor was that the President always slept with the Secretary and the wives quickly volunteered. It was the Seventies!

Probably the most significant thing about QCCC in 1974 was the Clubhouse located on Independence Boulevard and Woodland Avenue. By 1974 the interior had been painted and an old Rock-Ola juke box had been acquired with resident shagger, Shad Alberty, providing a bunch of old beach 45's. But most importantly, the bar had been finished, a refrigerated beer tapper installed and the first of many kegs of Schlitz purchased. The club was depending on the profits from the bar to offset the expenses of the house. When the rent came due, everyone was encouraged to "drink-up and have another". To say money was tight is an understatement. Every Wednesday night was open bar night and participation was high. It never dawned on any of us we were selling beer without any ABC permits, insurance of any description, and being an unincorporated organization, the liabilities we could have faced. But looking back, everyone had fun and nobody got seriously hurt. It must also be noted that one of the most frequent uses of the clubhouse was for baby showers, and there were a lot of 'em during that time.

Another significant thing about 1974 was QCCC's relationship with the Charlotte Motor Speedway. The club had been having a rally before the Saturday Sportsman Race during the World 600 Weekend since 1971. With the rally ending at CMS, we got in free for the race and they even contributed a case of warm Miller High Life to the rally winner. So after a meeting with Richard Howard in late 1973, we were permitted to use the entire facility for \$200 a weekend. Only problem was we didn't have \$200. So it was agreed that the club would clean up the infield after the NASCAR races in exchange for the use. We had no idea what a difficult task that we had agreed to, and even with everyone complaining, President Tommy made us fulfill our obligation and the task was completed. After that experience we finagled a way to come up with the \$200. As a result, the first big event hosted by QCCC was the NCCC Southeastern Sectional Speed Event that brought in over 200 participants from all over the East. That event really established QCCC as the premier club in the region. The success of that event also gave many of our members the racing bug and the cars started reflecting changes that made them more competitive. It also set the stage for the Corvette-Porsche Challenges and other competition events in coming years. When Bruton Smith and Humpy Wheeler took over CMS in 1976 we lost our \$200 privilege and the price went up significantly, limiting our use.

But I think the most significant thing about 1974 were the many close friendships that hanging out in the clubhouse and traveling to the many events brought. Many remain to this day, even after fifty years.

More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



Wasn't Always A Lock

At QCCC we have generally been blessed with great leadership; thus, we are start our 56th year. Each president had different challenges but each successfully overcame them. Let's work our way back. There have been 39 presidents counting Ron Berst. There are nine and I list them as current members: Ron Berst, Dick Gwilt, Paul Mitchell, Bill Cruthis, Steve Pelchat, Boyd Kurt, Q' Gross, John Meadows, and Travis Meredith. So, out of 430 some members 8 of the past presidents are still enjoying QCCC. Let's look at some areas where we struggled. Finally, we have lots of members stepping up to fill the spots.

Robert Morgan was a 3-year president with the 3rd year one where he was asked, "please run, we have nobody else." Drafted! I can attest that it is very time consuming when you are president. There are a lot of issues that arise but handled internally. Keeping the membership growing is job one. As hard as the job is, Robert had to deal in one year with resignations from his vice president, automotive director, newsletter editor, and 2 committee heads. These blew a huge hole that is hard to fix on the run.

Keith Cross: In 2013 lost his vice president to cancer and was not able to fill. Think it takes time to do one job, try doing two.

Q and Boyd Kurt were around when a gentleman and his wife had been on the board and decided they should be king and queen or V.P. and secretary in spite of not getting enough votes. That ended with them leaving and starting Generations Corvette Club which I think has now ceased to exist. Guess it did not work there either.

Jay Freeman, son of current member, John, was probably in office about the time we were drifting away from racing towards just cruisin'. Anyway, mid to late '90, racing was getting expensive and those not racing did not want to pay for insurance with club money to cover them. Many arguments ensued.

Travis Meredith: Early year growth challenged him. Getting incorporated to protect members was important. With just 20 couples, how do you put on events like the Corvette-Porsche Challenge at the Charlotte Motor Speedway. He also had to get us through getting the ladies the vote which was huge as they needed to be involved. The clubhouse, for all the fun we had there, it was in need of constant this or that. Trav and Sharon would type the newsletter every month, make copies, fold and staple then address and mail. This was very time consuming. This will be a two part article. Next month I will cover some major contributions of some of the past presidents plus some photos.

- Darrell Kirkley was your 1982 Vice President, 1975 Social Director 1975, Chairman High Speed Event at CMS for the 1978 NCCC Convention, and 2016 Membership Director.

- Long time member, Scott Hamilton, was Vice President in 1999.
- Last year's secretary, Kathie Finocchi, was your Vice President in 1997.
- John Meadows, besides being President in 2002, was 2001 Public Relations Director, 2000 Vice President and 2008 Automotive Director, while his wife, Linda, was Treasurer in 2007 & 2008.
- Another long time member, Jim Campbell, was Public Relations Director for 1993 & 1994.
- Jane Burt was Social Director 2003, 2004, & 2005.
- Keith Cross was 2012 Vice President & 2016 Member at Large.
- Travis Meredith was 1973 & 1974 Vice President.
- Sharon Meredith was 1972 & 1976 Secretary.
- Bill Ingram was 1975 Treasurer.
