





NATIONAL CORVETTE MUSEUM – NEWS AND UPDATES

OCCC CAR SHOW & THE NATIONAL CORVETTE MUSUEM

Each year of the QCCC Car Show, the National Corvette Museum attends. They have a tent and sell NCM and Corvette merchandise. It is a very popular stop for all car show attendees.

Last year the goal for the Museum sales at our show was \$4,000. Total sales were \$6,905, obviously well above the goal. So, this year we are making plans to greatly exceed last year's number.

The recent Myrtle Beach Corvette Club show has also had the Museum attending the past several years. But look here – Museum sales this year at their show was \$10,000! That's an impressive number.

So, what is QCCC going to do? We are setting a goal of \$15,000!! The MBCC show had less than half the number of cars that we will have. We pull cars from several states, while they are more of a regional show. There is no reason we can't pull this off.

I have been working with John and Carol Fort, members of the Cape Fear Corvette Club in Wilmington. They are longtime supporters of the Museum and work several shows with the Museum personnel. John is in full agreement that our goal is completely obtainable. He will work with us closely at our show to help achieve it.

Now what can we do. Here are some suggestions:

- First of all, make plans to purchase some items.
- Look through the Museum website. If you would like something special, let me know and we can have the Museum bring it with them for you to purchase. They will have lots of merchandise, but not everything.
- Consider selecting some Christmas gifts.
- As you see and meet people at the show, talk up the Museum and encourage them to visit their Museum tent.
- Remember, Museum members get a 10% or 15% discount! This discount will be calculated at the show.

Let's all work together to help reach this goal. This is a huge opportunity for QCCC and will show the Corvette community that we do things in a big way and in the right way.

QCCC HISTORY

In the formative years of the Queen City Corvette Club, 1968 through 1973, the focus was growth in membership and social activities. But it didn't take long after joining the National Council of Corvette Clubs that the competitive juices of the members started to show. NCCC was the national sanctioning body that established rules and provided insurance for all types of Corvette related events. The participants accumulated points, individually and as a club, that were rewarded at the end of the year. In the beginning, QCCC was in the Southeast Region along with many very active clubs from the entire southeast. To get the points, traveling to other club's events was a necessity and there was an event somewhere almost every weekend. There was so much activity throughout the southeast that around 1976 NCCC formed the "Carolinas Region", which kept the competition closer to home. There were strong clubs throughout North and South Carolina that provided a lot of friendly competition and many events. Our friends at Plastic Cars Ltd. in Statesville were very active in NCCC back then and we enjoy seeing them at our shows now.

The most popular sanctioned events were called "speed events" where drivers competed against each other in timed solo runs. Of course when we were able to use the Charlotte Motor Speedway it drew a large number of participants and you could use some top gears. But most of the events were held in parking lots where there wasn't much "speed" involved. Driver skill and being familiar with your car's ability was key to winning. Often a tight course was much better handled with a 300 horsepower small block than a 500 horsepower big block.

One such example was when QCCC was invited to a parking lot event held at UNC-Charlotte sponsored by a sports car club at the university. Ten or twelve of QCCC's seasoned racers accepted the challenge and showed up. The course was tiny and extremely tight. We complained a little, but since their club consisted of MG's, Triumph's, and other little European cars, it fell on deaf ears and we decided to just go with it. However, QCCC's heavy hitter, Mel Pace, had brought his '68 wide body 427 L88 out there which wouldn't fit thru the gates if we pushed it thru. On his run, he revved it up, let 'er go, and did this smokey burn-out straight through the first series of gates, pylons flying everywhere. The crowd cheered and the PA announcer said, "there goes your typical big block Corvette". Mel put his car back on the trailer and went home, enough fun for one day.

Not every event was as thrilling as the Corvette-Porsche Challenge, but each time we spent time together we became closer, forming long lasting friendships that remain strong. Even though we no longer race, event participation was the key then and remains important to the success of QCCC, even today.

So Now What Do We Do?

We had gotten spoiled. The clubhouse had been such a fun place, but we did not think we could make the new rent. The attic for meetings, the bar room for social, the front yard for car cleaning (a lot of Corvettes back then were daily drivers) and the front room and street (Hwy 74) for dancing, all would be hard to replace. These big hurdles were magnified by the fact that we were all turning 30 and life was changing for all of us. A big chunk of members were beginning to house hunt and raise a family. For them a two-seat car would no longer work, although I have seen 3 small urchins ride in the back of a C-2 coupe with another on mom's lap up front. You have all made sacrifices to keep your Corvette. Others faced career opportunities, often not in Charlotte giving away to old U-Haul runs.

So, when exactly did we lose the clubhouse? From old newsletters we can find discussions about it as early as late 1976. Sam McGee, aka "Father Time" was a transplant from Michigan, who moved in and was very active. He became QCCC President for 1977. He makes several mentions about forming the committee to look for a new club house in early '77 as we had been informed that the rent was going up. Sam was busy trying to heal some old wounds about our ladies and voting rights that Travis had fixed in '76. The rest of the old newsletters in '77 mention many cleanup committees at the club house. As there was no replacement found, it was in the August '77 newsletter that stated Sam would notify Nixon Realty that we would vacate by the end of August and he put in the newsletter that August 27 was to be house cleanout day and all furniture and club items could be picked up by members who donated them. A small group showed up and got the job done filling Melvin Pace's van and Travis Meredith's El Camino with the leftovers most of which were donated or trashed. Hard to say how much of our history we lost that day. We are very fortunate that we saved as much as we did. Of note, Joni Ingram was thanked that day for her effort in helping out. Jenny Hunter Stevens bought the juke box.

We ended an era without realizing what we were losing. Looking back we would learn our lesson, but it now became harder to find and keep members. Travis had close to 30 members in 1976 and reviewing the 1985 newsletters we were still only averaging 28. Currently, we only have newsletters from '85 thru '90 and most of the Vintage Gang were occupied with the other side of our lives. Racin' and waxin' kept QCCC going. First, with no clubhouse where do you meet? Several members offered their homes and here is a familiar name from our current membership, John and Jane Freeman offered their Freeman Car Stereo store for meetings. Of note J & J finished first in points in 1984 for the Carolinas Region, and that is no small feat. Also, I find a mention of John's old blue being sold, a 1969 convertible. This is the same car that he decided a few years ago to set out to find and buy back after some 35 years. He found it in a barn in New Mexico not driven for decades. It is now a restored restomod. a great story! Also, we find reference that current members, Carolyn and Don Zimmer, took first place in a fun rally. Also someone ask him about his nickname, "Tarzan Don". Something to do with swinging on a vine. You can't hide from your past. Treasury averaged \$3,000 and the monthly raffle ran between \$10.00 and \$25.00 and was split with half going to the spina bifida charity.

Racing was what saved us. Led by Melvin Pace (president 85' and 89'), Larry Gunter, Jenny Hunter, Dick Craig, Earl Ferrell, the Freeman's and a few others, we set out to be NCCC national champs which we won in 1989. Melvin was the point man with his '68 427/435. I believe he had a big hand in keeping us going. He was a member since the early 70's and when he spoke you listened. The newsletter listed events in the region for the month and there always were events every Saturday and Sunday. From Greer Dragway in South Carolina, Roebling Road in Georgia, a track in New Orleans, to NASCAR tracks and parking lots all over the area, they really showed up and raced. Members opened their homes to gather and we often used the club house at some member's apartment complex. It was just hard to keep members with no central command center. Our numbers became stagnant until the C-4 arrived. They really took off when the C-5 debuted. The next struggle would start to fester in the nineties when the cost of having and racing a new Corvette pushed most of us off the track. More about that later.

We all missed the clubhouse, but that was going to happen anyway through outgrowing it. Like having a fraternity house in college, you are there for your 4 years then you move on, but you take the memories with you.


