



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

This Triple-Diamond Awarded 1958 Corvette Owned by Tommy and Brenda Loftin, Shined Bright at the 2024 Muscle Car and Corvette Nationals

The MCACN show in Chicago never fails to attract extremely rare and highly desirable cars and this 1958 Corvette is a perfect example. It was ordered new at a California dealership called Bakersfield Three Way Chevrolet with all available options, including fuel injection, Powerglide transmission, power operated folding top, auxiliary hard top, power windows, whitewall tires, windshield washers, park brake alarm, courtesy lights, heater, two-tone paint, and AM radio.

It's worth noting that 1958 Corvettes were offered with two different fuel injection options: a high-output 290-horsepower rendition and a milder 250-horsepower version. They were priced the same, at a substantial \$484.20, and not surprisingly over twice as many buyers chose the more powerful iteration – 1,090 versus only 504. Our featured '58 is one of the 504 fitted with the lower compression, hydraulic lifter, mild cam 250 horsepower engine. While we can't be sure what motivated the car's first buyer to choose this it's likely that his desire to have an automatic transmission was a factor since 290 horsepower fuelies were not available with a Powerglide.

The original owner reportedly sold the car to an employee of his named Elvin Glen Hammonds in 1968. Hammonds, who was only 16 years old when he bought the Corvette, drove it until 1974 and then began a comprehensive restoration. Over the following 15 or so years he completely disassembled the car, rebuilt its engine, transmission, and differential, prepped the body and sprayed it with primer and then two coats lacquer paint in the original Charcoal color.

Before he finished paint and reassembled his Corvette, Hammonds lost interest in it. More than 30 years later he gave the car to a nephew, who transported it to North Carolina. After some time had passed the nephew realized it was too large of a project, and he offered the disassembled car for sale. Long-time collectors Brenda and Tommy Loftin bought the car, which was located only about a mile from their home. By the end of 2019, after about a year of diligent work, the Loftin's had the car back together and show ready. Since then, it has earned a coveted NCRS Duntov Mark of Excellence award and a Bloomington Gold Certificate. The Loftin's completed the trifecta a MCACN with a highly desirable Triple Diamond Award on November 22nd, 2024.

Thanks to all QCCC members that helped me achieve my goal.

We just finished up our club's charity events for 2024 and November was our busiest month! Thank you to all you members who participated.

22 cars attended our friends at Roadrunner Vettes annual Corvette Angels toy drive for kids on November 2nd. We donated an estimated \$100 worth of toys per car and enjoyed beautiful sunny weather.

Then we held a food donation drive at our November 9th member meeting at feedNC. You members donated 1,350 pounds of food! Using \$1.25 per pound as an estimated value, that's \$1,800 contributed.

On Monday, November 18th, 23 QCCC cars met at the Team Center at Hendrick Motorsports campus to attend Jeff Gordon's "Corvette for A Cure" giveaway. QCCC had special parking and two reserved tables. Jeff even gave QCCC a shout-out from the stage for our amazing annual Car Show. In 2025 the Jeff Gordon Children's Foundation will give away a red mist C8 Corvette. Funds raised from the sale of raffle tickets go toward researching treatments for childhood cancer.

Next up on November 23rd, QCCC attended for the first time, an annual car show at the Lincoln County Airport to support the Veterans and Community Alliance, who provides low or no cost car repairs to veterans and their spouses. The show included a fly-in of small planes. What a cool sight it was to see all the classic cars mixed in with the airplanes. We had a first for QCCC – 25 Corvettes, and 2 airplanes flown in by members Lynne & Louis Dunn, and Christopher Farrell & Sandra Csanyi! QCCC donated \$250 from our 50/50 funds and we passed the hat with attending members kicking in another \$250 for a total of \$500 donated. A very common phrase associated with the Corvette hobby is "you came for the car and stayed for the people". In my fifty four years as a Corvette owner and enthusiast I can vouch that this statement is very accurate. When Sharon and I first joined QCCC in late 1970, I was a twenty-three year old hot rodder who caught Corvette fever. I always loved my cars with a passion even though they never really loved me back. My friend and co-worker Jim Whitley had just bought a '69 coupe, had met some QCCC members at a party and encouraged me to join with him. It's ironic how that decision in many ways changed my life. While maintaining other friendships, it didn't take long for many of our weekends to be spent with the club at all kinds of activities. Of course, there were the monthly meetings, which usually involved sharing a meal afterward, as well as the car events and parties. It didn't take long to form friendships that remain to this day.

But since Sharon stayed pregnant for most of the 1970's, we were juggling our limited spare time with the demands of raising three small children and being active QCCC members. As the kids grew and their activities increased, our involvement in QCCC slowly decreased to the point that in 1982, we finally dropped out. Of course, this was a common story back then as many club members in their late 20's and early 30's did the same thing. In most cases the Corvettes were long gone, but the friendships remained. In my case, I stuck my '64 coupe in the garage under a cover and pretty much forgot about it. Between annual state inspections, she averaged between 50 and 100 miles. The tires were on there for over 30 years. The most important job that car had was hiding Santa Claus gifts (except bikes) at Christmas time. But all of that time I had never really lost the Corvette fever and for some reason, I hung on to the '64. In 2004 what started off as some much needed maintenance, snowballed into a body off the frame restoration. My reasoning was that I needed to make the old car as good as she could be while I was still able. That took a while, and I finally completed the job the summer of 2010. By that time the kids were grown, educated and employed, so I finally could resume my hobby. In 2006 I bought my C5 Z06 which I truly love to drive. So there I was, with the '64 finished, sitting beside my great driver, while I sat in my garage and wondered "what next".

While showing the '64 at the Labor Day Matthews Car Show in 2011, I had a chance meeting with two old QCCC buddies, Richard Craig and Bill Cruthis. I didn't know Bill had returned to the Charlotte area after relocating to Arkansas with his job and I had lost touch with Richard. To my surprise, they both still had Corvettes and had gotten back into QCCC. With their encouragement, my "what next" question was answered and Sharon and I got back in the club later that year.

It's funny how you can go thirty years without seeing old friends and pick right back up where you left off. It's been great to have a purpose for owning the Corvettes, but the best part is spending quality time with old and new friends with similar interests. What a ride!

More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



Breakin' it Down, then Movin' On

QCCC's history can be broken into 6 major groups. I will discuss them briefly in this article as we are moving more into the eighties. For our newer members you can access the decade of the '70's on our website under newsletter archives. There you find about 150 articles of stories of our early days.

1968 -1979 Group One: The pioneers, this was the start up crew. They came on board mostly not knowing anything about the members except they loved Corvettes. Looking back it was really throwing caution to the wind to take a chance. Surely it was most difficult for the charter three members. Can you imagine going from 3 members to six and doubling the size of the club. Those original 3 were quite visionary to make this all work. Think about taking two of your friends and go start a club and see how that works out for you. We picked up some early breaks by getting some great people and great leaders: Jim Whitley, Bud Landacre, Butch Bingham, Don Francis, Travis Meredith. Then along came the second wave: Dave Morse, Joey Hunter, Tommy Mitchem, the rest of the Vintage Gang, Bill Henderson, Buzz Cagle, Wayne Marlowe, Robert Scognamillo, Rick Wilson, Larry Gunter, Melvin Pace and Sam McGee.

What this group accomplished is incredible: Jim Whitley found the clubhouse to rent. We hosted the 1975 South east NCCC Regional high speed event at Charlotte Motor Speedway, hosted 3 years of the Porsche Corvette Challenges '75, '76, '77, where 100 of each raced at Charlotte Motor Speedway, then hosted the National Council Of Corvette Clubs week long National Convention '78. For the most part the group really clicked and a solid foundation was formed. Folks in the Carolinas were beginning to hear about QCCC.

1979-1992 Group Two: The racers edge! Losing the clubhouse was a tough blow. QCCC turned to some serious racing for over a decade. It was led by Melvin Pace, Larry Gunter, and Richard Craig and several more. Other names showing up about this time were, Bill Pegorich, Clayton Williams, Roy Elgin, the Freemans, Don Yost, and Mike Catoe. This group raced hard every weekend and they were very good at it, winning Top Regional Champions almost every year of the decade including a National Championship. QCCC was growing but had to find new members. These racing members probably saved QCCC without knowing. The numbers were shrinking due to those dropping out because the clubhouse was gone and we were aging into midlife and the cars took second place after babies and careers. It was still good, only different. Again the timing was probably good as we may not have made it without racing. So congrats to those folks that kept us afloat with a directional change. And yet they still managed to host another national NCCC Convention in 1991.

1993-2002 Group Three: The Bounce Back Years! What happened to our racers? As the cost of Corvettes was rising quite rapidly, it was hard to keep one Corvette for social and one just to race. Most could not yet afford to do that, so the social side was gaining attention. To this point our race cars were not show cars. Now the shift was starting to be we drive to eat giving us a more gentle side to enjoy our cars and the cruising the Carolinas began leaving the racing to the pros. Here are some names from this era that you may recognize today; Jon Elliott, Finocchi, Jerry Rhinehort, Jerry and Jenny Stevens, Dave Styles the Zimmer's, and Rick Witcher. (of note: our racing was insured by the National Council of Corvette Clubs) Back then you

could not afford to insure a race car by yourself. When enough members balked at paying the required NCCC due, we would lose our insurance. This was the end of QCCC club racing. That was about the early '90's.

1990 – 2007 Group Four: Technology Rears It's Ugly Head and the C-5 Arrives! The new members were Clark Belvin, Wade and Sue Stickles, Walt and Wendy Krupowicz, Robert Morgan, John and Linda Mead-ows, Q and Margo Gross, and Boyd and Susan Kurt. Also enter Eddie and Jane Burt, to name a few. Eddie served 14 straight years on the board as V.P. and membership while Jane was Secretary and Social for 6 years. Jane and John Meadows undertook updating the entire newsletter. The opportunities for this group were two fold. First, the world was going online, creating havoc with distribution of the newsletter, half got it by mail and half got it online. You can imagine the turmoil this created. They worked themselves diligently every month to get the info out to the members. Next the C-5 hit during this timeframe and GM had a hit and membership was growing fast. However, there were two new clubs coming to Charlotte that would cut into QCCC growth temporarily.
