



Going back to the sixties the biggest car event in Charlotte, not counting the World 600, was the annual International Show Car Association car show each February. This was a national organization of real show cars that went all over the country. Their members displayed full custom cars, you know, the ones on turn tables with mirrors underneath, chrome everything, angel hair coming out of the exhausts, and dummy engines (no fluid in these things). The shows were also open to a limited number of local car clubs and gear heads that had worthy street machines. In 1983 Charlotte's new Civic Center on East Trade Street was the location for the show. Previous shows were held in the old Coliseum (now Bojangles) which was smaller and considered obsolete. Ironically, the downtown Civic Center is now long gone and the old coliseum is still here. Anyway, QCCC was invited to participate. The local cars were displayed on the large second floor that required taking the cars, one by one, up and down this very snug freight elevator, which was very time consuming,

By the early eighties, QCCC had matured, the cars had changed and lots of members had come and gone. The average age had increased to the late thirties, but Clayton and Ruth Williams were the exception. They were in their late sixties, had grown children and even with their "advanced" age, were very active in the club. They had a new metallic red Corvette, and even though Clayton had some physical limitations, he kept the car in immaculate condition. At some point he had lost full use of his legs that required him to use crutches, but that didn't slow him down one bit.

By 1983 my involvement in the club had become very limited, but Melvin Pace gave me a call and said they needed a few more cars and asked me to bring my '64 Coupe to the show. I agreed as it gave me an excuse to clean it up. It took almost all day Thursday to get all of the cars upstairs and the displays set up. The show lasted the entire weekend, so when it ended on Sunday evening, we broke the displays and lined up to take turns going down the elevator,,,,slowly. For the most part, everyone was patient and polite, waiting their turn. Clayton was next in line and as he awkwardly tried to position his car to go in the elevator, he accidentally hit the gas instead of the brake while in reverse and backed into this beautiful '63 Impala Super Sport, severely damaging the right front fender and bashing in his rear bumper. The young man who owned the Chevy came rolling out of his car ready to kill somebody. We all came running as Clayton struggled to get out of his car. Thankfully, we got there in time to restrain the young man and explain the situation. He finally cooled down and we got Clayton's car downstairs. I'm not sure Clayton ever quite got over this incident, and even though the cars were repaired, every time he looked at his car he saw it as damaged.

In all of my years with QCCC this is the only time I can recall a member being seriously threatened. And throughout our club's history there have been arguments, heated discussions, poor decisions, torn-up cars and bruised egos, but to my knowledge, no one ever got hurt.

More "Adventures" from QCCC of Decades Past



"Charles in Charge"

One of the more colorful characters from the latter half of the 70's decade was Charles Outlaw. He was built like a rock, just solid with arms bigger than my thighs. Charles was an electrician and owned his own company in the Monroe area. If that was not enough he was married to a doctor's daughter. They built a huge house in the area where he was working. When I say huge, I mean really huge. He was partial to C-2's and had a couple of them in the garage, I think a '65 and a '66.

Charles only had one flaw. He was a brittle diabetic and this was long before we had good drugs to help maintain his health. I had not gotten to know him as it seemed Monroe was a distant speck to the big city of Charlotte. QCCC planned one of the many beach trips in the fall of '77. Frequent beach trips seem to have gone the way of our youth, but it was possible back then to have as many as ten tips per year. When I checked the list, I noticed Charles was going with his wife, Vicky. We rented a big house with about 10 bedrooms and began our usual path to the ocean. The ladies had made enough food to feed twice the group size. Upon arrival we all called dibs on a bedroom and before much unloading happened it rushed to the beach. I had started a conversation with Charles and we were in discussion and did not jump in the water. Let me insert here that I am an easy target for 7-layer cookies: graham cracker crust, chocolate and peanut drops, pecans, a layer of some kind of filler, and coconut. What's not to like about that. As we sat at the bar in conversation, Charles noticed a familiar Tupperware container. Inside were dozens of 7-layer cookies; enough for the whole group for the weekend. As we talked, we both dug in and before long you could see the bottom of the bowl. About this time, I asked him about it. He was almost defiant that he could whoop the disease as he had tackled most things in life. I did not pursue it further as I sensed his mind was made up. We had a great time that weekend and was happy to make another QCCC good friend.

Sadly, Charles succumbed to that dreaded disease, but he looked it in the eye and dared it to try to take him. Thus, the basket of supers sweet cookies. The last time I checked with Darrell, the Corvettes were still in the garage. They were tied up in court as Vicky had laid some claim on them. Charles had told Darrell he would give him one of them. However, word of mouth was not worth much then as today. Not much was known about diabetes, but I felt an admiration for Charles. He was a moose of a man and he just said to the disease, "you want a piece of me, bring it on." So QCCC lost another member too soon. If I remember right, he wired the bar room so we could put a huge window a/c unit in. I say rest in peace, big fella. It was great to know ya.

A couple of notes:

• Some have inquired about last month's article about Darrell Kirkley. Yes, that is about chapter six in the book that he and I wrote about the crazy life of a young Mr. Kirkley.

•With reference to our historian's article last month regarding Vette Vues magazine, for two decades that was the Bible for most of us. It was a big honor to bbe selected to have your cars in the centerfold full color. It was a nationwide publication. In 1976 I took a flyer and sent him photos of my '74 brown coupe 454 and my split window coupe. I was just sure it was a winner. Turns out I made it to the back cover which was really a poor consolation prize. I don't even remember what was in the centerfold. I still have the proofs and mock ups Mr. Prather returned to me plus about 3 copies of that month's magazine.
