What began in 1968 as a small gathering of Corvette owners sharing their love for America's sports car has grown into a dynamic organization boasting over 470 members. A Commitment to Giving Back



QCCC AND "Vette Vues" Magazine

I hope you have seen the excellent article about QCCC in the February issue of "Vette Vues" magazine that our "Supreme Exalted Ruler", better known as Ron, has described in this newsletter. If you are not familiar with this Corvette-only publication, you are missing a lot. Each month for fifty three years, they have covered Corvette racing, shows and expos, classified ads and "how to" articles. Literally, there is something for everyone in the Corvette community. Going back to the origin of Vette Vues, I have some personal history I'd like to share.

As QCCC's President in 1972, my name and address were included in the list of Corvette clubs throughout the country published in Chevrolet's "Corvette News" magazine. As a result, I received a lot of flyers, solicitations and correspondence from all over the country. A postcard came one day that caught my attention. It was from a guy in Atlanta named Jim Prather asking my opinion about starting a Corvette-only magazine. I responded that I thought it was a great idea and Jim sent me another postcard in appreciation of my support. A couple of months later I received a complementary copy of volume one number one of the first copy of "Vette Vues" magazine. It was very crude, produced on an antique mimeograph machine and the content was several pages of classified ads for Corvettes and Corvette parts. To be honest, even though I thought it was a great idea, I wasn't sure this crude publication was going to succeed. The monthly issues continued to come to the club and you saw refinement and improvements with each one. Later that year, when he moved to using a professional printer, my confidence increased to the point that I subscribed.

If I remember correctly, Jim's full-time job was with the U.S. Post Office and he was a "died in the wool" Corvette enthusiast and an active member of Corvette Atlanta. In QCCC's early days as a member of the National Council of Corvette Clubs, our club was included in the huge "Southeast Region" which included the entire southern US except Florida, which had its own region. Anyway, QCCC competed with Corvette Atlanta. They attended some of our larger events and we went to some of theirs. I'm sure Jim and I crossed paths but we never met face to face. Vette Vues continued to grow and improve with the addition of some very knowledgeable Corvette people as contributors. Jim finally quit his job and devoted all of his time to the magazine, which by then was very successful.

Jim finally retired in 1997, when he sold Vette Vues magazine to William Wolf and his family. Jim continued to contribute to the magazine with a monthly article on Corvette scale models and die-cast replicas, which became his hobby. Unfortunately, Jim passed away in August of 2022. The Corvette community lost one of their biggest advocates and his contributions to the Corvette hobby can't be measured.

One of the photos with this article is of a garage wall hanging I made many years ago displaying Volume One Number One along with one of the first professionally printed issues and one of the first shiny all-color issues. Also, there is a postcard from Jim to me when he took the leap to start the magazine. I also have a four-teen-foot long shelf with my collection of Vette Vues magazines and after over sixty years of receiving various car magazines, it's the only monthly subscription I still have. The other photos are of an article I wrote, EXACTLY fifty years ago, that Jim put in the February 1975 issue about QCCC's 1974 "Sandkhana" event at Myrtle Beach.. The last page is of the classified ads in the same issue. Ironically the ad in the top left corner is of a '66 coupe Bill Ingram bought to flip. The reason he bought it was to get the set of five original knock-off wheels off of it to trade to me for the set of five 1967 bolt-on wheels I had that Bill wanted for his '67 coupe. I wouldn't sell but only trade for a set of knock-offs so he bought the '66 just to get the wheels. The knock-offs are still on my '64 today just as we removed them from his '66 fifty years ago, hammer marks and all.

I would encourage you to check out this magazine as it's one of the best publications dedicated to one mark and is a source for a lot of resources and information unique to Corvette owners. They can be contacted at Vette Vues Magazine, PO Box 511874, Punta Gorda, FL, 33951.

THE 1974 QUEEN CITY CORVETTE CLUB SANDKHANA

OR

A RACE ON THE BEACH PUTS SAND IN YOUR SCHLITZ


In the entire Southeast there is probably no one area better known for pleasure than the "Grand Strand of South Carolina". These resort beaches are a favorite for a vacation or road trip for "Vette" owners, but a speed event at the beach ?? Well, The Queen City Corvette Club of Charlotte, North Carolina, in cooperation with the North Myrtle Beach "Police Department, sponsored the most unique event of the year at Ocean Drive Beach, South Carolina - - A "Sandkhana"!

What is a Sandkhana you might ask? Perhaps a little background on the birth of this event is in order. Ocean Drive Beach is some 180 miles from Charlotte and the Queen City Corvette Club makes a week-end or two a year at this resort on the Atlantic. These are usually your typical Vette Club week-ends at the beach with the standard amount of swimming, sunning, cruising, volleyball and 12 oz. curls, but on occasions these have been very eventful trips; like the time twenty unsuspecting clubbers were stopped for parading without a permit in 1971, and the time a club member cut off the end of his toe on the pool sliding board and the race to the hospital in several vettes made "Vanishing Point" and Bullitt" look like "Bambi", and of course, the off-season trip in February 1973 when a club member could not resist a "spin" on the beach. After about four minutes of donuts, figure eights and assorted tail spins, the heavy hand of the law rested on the pilot's shoulder. Without harsh punishment, the understanding police chief explained the laws concerning driving on the beach off season (20 MPH) and within his lecture he casually said, " If you guys want to run on the beach, give us some notice and we'll close off an area for you!!" Well, that's all it took to get the cogs meshing in the heads of several QCCC members and voila, a Sandkhana! Club President, Tommy Mitchem, corresponded with Chief Belamy and acquired October 5th and 6th as the date for this event. Then the ball was rolling as Governor Dave Morse got a special two day sanction from the National Council of Corvette Clubs. Social Vice President, Wayne Marlowe, acquired The Internationale Inn as headquarters and set up reservations and pre-registration for the event. All parties cooperated big week-end.

Friday the 4th saw the Queen City Club arriving at the Internationale where final preparations were made and the participants started arriving. Friday night the host club threw a party for the early arrivers at the Internationale's fabulous lounge. By Saturday afternoon some 140 rooms were occupied by Corvette owners from nearly a dozen clubs. Tech began at 11:30 A.M. and by 2:00 P.M. the tide was out enough to set up the course.

The course was a modified figure eight with a single start/finish line. To keep the speed down, the course was a little on the tight side, as the close times reflected. The sky was clear and the sun was bright. Ideal conditions, except for the timing equipment; however, after about an hour delay, all was ready. There were 64 participants, each making three runs. All of this took place in a little over three hours, which is proof itself the Queen City Corvette Club had it all together, running about one car per minute. Three to four hundred vacationers and residents lined the beach to witness these plastic cars blasting through the course.

With the event over, most proceeded to the nearest car wash to remove the sand and salt water. Later some 35 vettes paraded to Calabash, North Carolina, a favorite eating spot, with the aid of an official police escort. After supper, everyone once again headed for the lounge where a live band performed as the vetters danced and refreshed themselves. President Tommy Mitchem then awarded trophies with Frank Zeigler from Corvette Charleston and Margaret Walker of Classic Corvettes, Rome, Georgia, receiving the Fastest Times of the Day and Plastic Cars Ltd. of Statesville, North Carolina receiving the award for Best Club Paritcipation.



The enthusiasm of all concerned was reward enough for those who worked to make the event such a success. It is the Queen City Corvette Clubs' hope to make this an annual event. We certainly hope so and look forward to seeing "ya'll" next year!




