

Meeting adjourned at 8:30 PM.





#### **Travel Tales**

#### "Road Trip to Kentucky"

Upon learning of The National Corvette Museum's 5<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration, I wanted to go. The planned activities sparked my interest and to make a long story short, I went. I would like to share my Travel Tales with you.

My 1963 Corvette Coupe will be 37 years old next week. It hasn't been on a marathon trip like this in over 30 years. I mean this is a 1,200-mile journey. I wanted to be brave and optimistic that the car would endure the trip unharmed. So, I recruited another old Corvette owner, David Carleton to ride shotgun and John Bayne to follow closely behind. We had a new set of 2-way radios to keep in close communication along the way. Here are some excerpts from our travel journal.

#### Wed. September 1, 1999 5:00 PM

Depart Charlotte heading for our first stop which was at the Mill House Lodge in Flat Rock, NC. We reviewed the premises for our upcoming QCCC November waterfall tour. After giving the location a thumbs-up, we enjoyed a steak dinner at Kelsey's in Hendersonville. We are now beginning to feel like Buz & Tod from the old black & white TV show Route 66. They were always seeking adventure out on the highway in an old Corvette.

#### Thursday, September 2, 1999 9:00 AM

Arrive in Asheville, NC to meet up with 16 other QCCC members and 55 other Corvettes from around the Carolinas. 30 Corvettes had departed earlier in order to visit a Muscle Car Museum in Severville, TN. We had a NC Caravan group picture taken in the Ramada Inn parking lot. Decision was made to team up with the Southern Corvette Club members on the caravan. 10:30 AM we all depart for Nashville, TN.

In route to Nashville, we stopped twice for food & fuel. At one point we had a single file line of Corvettes literally a mile long. The afternoon sun was beginning to take its toll on the split window's passengers when David saw a loose goat on the side of the road eating grass. David was the only one in our caravan to see the goat. Wonder why? Road construction caused a traffic jam. No problem, we just shut her down, opened the doors and coasted downhill. How many times have you seen a split window going down the interstate highway with its doors open? That's one advantage of owning an older car. No computer, no air conditioning, no power steering, no power brakes, no problem when it comes to coasting. Crossed in to the central time zone and backed our clocks up an hour. Next stop: Opryland Hotel.

This hotel is huge. Corvettes from all over the southern half of the country were parked everywhere. We saw Corvettes from Mexico, AZ, CA, FL. 240 Corvettes came in from Dallas, TX. It was truly an unbelievable sight. Only saw a dozen trailer queens. The remaining Corvettes

were all clean drivers. This was the final staging point for the entire southern tier of the USA. Tomorrow we will take the last leg of the caravan to Bowling Green, KY.

Chevrolet held a wonderful welcome reception in the Delta ballroom. Ice sculpted art of a Corvette surrounded by tons of hors d'oeuvres. A very talented 12-year-old girl sang live country music. Plenty of cold beverages and tee shirts for sale too. Some of us departed the party early to continue traveling on to Franklin, KY where we lodged at the new Days Inn. Only 22 miles to go and we will be in Bowling Green!

#### Friday, September 3, 1999

Begin seeing Corvettes pass by our hotel around 8:00 AM. Single file, all makes, all colors, simply put, it was a wonderful sight. Nine of us join in the lineup. We pulled over and stopped on an overpass to take a few pictures and video of this phenomenon. 9:00 AM we are pulling in the parking field of the National Corvette Museum. I decided to give John & Linda Meadows a call. They were just leaving the Opryland Hotel parking lot in Nashville, TN. Wow imagine that, 65 miles of uninterrupted Corvettes on the highway. Our group proceeded to the bus stop to ride over to take a tour of the Corvette manufacturing plant. Guess what? Seems everybody wanted to take the same tour and the waiting line was approaching 4 hours long. Luckily for us we had called ahead and reserved our own private tour guide. After watching the safety video, our guide began showing us the Corvette assembly process. We saw the entire plant! Quite fascinating seeing the chassis being attached to the body and watching them start a Corvette for the very first time. 1 million square feet under one roof, on 212 acres of land, building 150 Corvettes every day, Monday through Friday. Amazing! Lots of millennium yellow but, a shortage of newly designed polished wheels. Queen City Corvette Club logo patch is on display in front lobby. We also placed a QCCC autograph on the plastic dividers to the wielding room.

Queen City Corvette club had a portable shade tent set up in the vendor area of the Museum. After the plant tour we proceeded back over to our tent. At this point we were hearing attendance estimates of 6,200 Corvettes all in one place. While standing under the shade tent two clean Corvette truck transporters pulled in to the Museum parking lot. This gave us 22 additional C-5's to drool over for the weekend.

At the end of the day we returned to the hotel, and freshened up to go out to dinner. Bob Denney received directions to a good, cheap, fast Italian restaurant. We followed Bob right out in to the middle of nowhere KY before we realized his directions were given to him by a hotel manager, that was from India decent, and spoke very poor broken English.

The Museum hosted a Hall of Fame banquet Friday night for it's new Hall of Fame inductees and lifetime Museum members. Jim Perkins was one of three people inducted into the Corvette Hall of Fame.

#### Saturday, September 4, 1999

Saturday was a big day. Eight Corvettes started out by taking a beautiful ride on the older 2-lane country highway, 31-W, to the Museum. We spent a lot of time meeting Corvette owners and

enthusiast from all over the country. Several visitors stopped by to say hello, including our tour guide from Friday and the Plant Manager. There were plenty of Corvette performance seminars scheduled for folks to attend and plenty of Corvettes to see. We saw 2 of the 15 Aztec Gold Corvettes built in 1998. Calloway displayed a C-12 with a window sticker of \$204,000. The C-5R racecar that ran at Daytona was also on display. A limousine arrived carrying 1996 Miss USA. I met her and she gave me an autographed picture for both of my girls. However the exciting part of Saturday happened as I was visiting with some folks under the shade and I noticed an unusual hubbub around the '63. I decided to go over and ask if I could answer any questions and before I knew it some weird sticker showed up on my windshield. These ladies asked if I knew the owner of the tan split window. I said, "As a matter of fact I do." They replied they've just been selected to receive a celebrity choice award, can you introduce us to them? I introduced myself to Barbara Perkins, Jim's wife. She was one of approximately 80 celebrities that were asked to go out and select their single favorite Corvette from the sea of 6,200. Other celebrities included Elffie Duntov, Reeves Calloway, Doug Rippy, and the mayor of Bowling Green, KY.

The line to tour the museum finally dwindled to the point where we could bear it. Upon entering the Museum, you can find our QCCC commemorative brick and tile laid in the walkway. Lots of interesting historical Corvette artifacts and memorabilia to view in the Museum. One can see plenty of Corvette concept cars, race cars, & special limited edition cars. NCRS & NCCC have special information displays inside of the Museum.

On the way to dinner, we stopped to purchase fuel. While minding my own business who would drive up in a millennium yellow C-5 but Jim Campbell, Corvette Brand Manager for the G.M. Chevrolet Division. He was very cordial and took the time to meet John Bayne, David Carleton, Ralph Cornaccia, Ken & Lois Watts.

Our dinner reservations allowed us to have a table for 17. The food service and atmosphere were wonderful. The entire restaurant seemed to be filled with Corvette fans. As we were finishing our meal, the wait staff began one of those obnoxious birthday clapping and marching routines. Unbeknownst to me they all stopped at my chair began singing and delivered a wonderful tasty piece of birthday cheesecake. Happy Birthday wishes and congratulatory comments started pouring in from all directions. Thanks to David Carleton for setting me up. Only one problem, my birthday is in November!


#### Sunday, September 5, 1999



Arrived home with lots of fond memories at 4:45 PM. A sigh of relief. We did it! The '63 & driver were glad to be back home. A safe trip, without incident or accident.
